

#### Celebrating the Fall Season



Fall has arrived and October brings several important events to the top of the calendar: Cursillo #156 happens the first weekend of October and St. Paul's has five pilgrims in attendance as well as four staff members; and there is a Cursillo Reunion and potluck on October 19 for all Cursillistas. The common thread in many of these events is our love for one another and for our church family. Fellowship, worship, and study opportunities bring us closer together and make us stronger in faith. As the temperatures cool and the days shorten, we celebrate God's many blessings.



"All Creatures of our God and King"

Dear Friends.

October brings with it cooler temperatures and golden light, and the celebration of one of the most beloved saints in our tradition: St. Francis of Assisi. The Church honors this humble man famous, in part, for seeing every creature — from the smallest sparrow to the fiercest wolf — as members of God's family. He preached to birds, made peace with animals, and lived as if all creatures were kin.

Our Indigenous brothers and sisters, the Lakota people of South Dakota, live deeply into this truth. Their tradition teaches that all living beings are interconnected in a sacred web of life. Animals, humans, plants, and even water and sky — are all relatives. As the Lakota say: Mitakuye Oyasin — "All my relations." This phrase speaks of unity and respect, reminding us that to love God is also to honor God's creation, and to treat them all — two-legged, four-legged, winged or scaled — as family. St. Francis and Lakota tradition teach us a wisdom that brings peace.

Many of us know the joy and peace that comes from loving our pets. We feel joy in the purring and in the cuddles, and in the gentle barks and licks. In the squeaks and squawks we hear the echo of God's love. Through them we remember that love is the will of God and the surpassing value of the universe. Our animal friends teach us to love across differences.

With this spirit of unity and reverence, we will gather again this year for a *Blessing of the Animals* on Saturday, October 5. Bring your pets, your photos, your memories — and your gratitude for the creatures who walk this life beside us. In a time when the world feels heavy with sorrow and division, our pets bring something different: joy, trust, affection, loyalty, and a quiet and simple form of companionship: love made simple. In caring for our pets, we learn to slow down, to notice, to listen — and to give ourselves to another being without expecting anything in return. In their trust and loyalty, we glimpse the kind of love God desires for all creation. We are meant to carry that love forward to the sometimes more difficult animal to love: our fellow human beings.

Proverbs 12:10 says, "The righteous care for the needs of their animals." This is not just about kindness — it's about holiness. It's about living in right relationship with the world and all who dwell in it. In this same spirit of care and remembrance, I am honored to announce the opening of the St. Francis Garden, a sacred space within our Memorial Courtyard for the burial of the cremated remains of our beloved animal companions. It is a space to honor their lives, their love, and the deep bonds they formed with us. Please contact me or the office to arrange a burial service.

Let us walk gently on this earth, following the example of St. Francis and honoring the wisdom of those who see all life as sacred. May our pets in their playful and loving ways continue to teach us how to live in harmony with God, with one another, and with all creation.

#### Stewardship Season Begins



Did you ever have news that was so exciting that you could not wait to share it with others? The Good News that fills our spirits with joy is about the radical abundance, abiding love, and healing power that Jesus shares with us when we respond to his call to follow him. All of the gifts that we have been given are ready to burst forth to serve our neighbors and share our love with a world in need. The church, our church, is an essential part of that journey. In order for the church to be healthy every member must give a portion of their time, talent, and money. Giving back to the church makes possible our mission of proclaiming the Gospel, forming disciples, and reaching out into the world. The old saying is true: no money, no mission.

Membership in the church is about participating in the worship and life of the church as well as giving financial support according to each member's means. This year we really want to stress that all of us ought to make a good faith pledge. The church needs to know what it has to work with in order to make a responsible budget and to

be good stewards of it. God knows that our financial circumstances can change. That's okay. God does not expect us to be perfect and neither does the church. Still, any pledge is better than no pledge. 100% participation is our goal.

Also, reminder to please complete our 2025 pledges as the year is winding down. Quarterly statements are going out the first week in October; please be sure to check yours and let the office know if you have any questions.

#### Tax Advantaged Giving

With stewardship season upon us, and tax season around the corner, this may be a good time to think about tax advantaged giving. This is the gift of appreciated securities such as stocks or bonds which allows the giver to make a significant contribution to the church while offsetting their own taxable income. To avoid capital gains tax, gifts of appreciated assets must be given directly to the church. For purposes of tax deduction, the donor receives credit for the value of the stock on the day the transfer is complete. There are considerable benefits for donating appreciated assets which you should discuss with your tax planner or accountant when you consider your year end tax planning. Charitable gifts of life insurance are another way to participate in tax advantaged giving. The church can be designated as beneficiary, or co-beneficiary of a new or an existing life insurance policy. In many cases these gifts are tax deductible, but as always you should consult your attorney or accountant for advice best suited to you.

#### **Ministry Spotlight: Prayer Partners**



You may often see Magdi Ferguson or perhaps a member of the Daughters of the King, kneeling at the prayer rail in the children's chapel at the 10:30 service each Sunday during Holy Communion; A prayer partner generally involves people praying for each other in the belief that agreement in prayer amplifies its power. A prayer partner respects confidentiality, is authentic, and shares prayer requests, challenges, and joys honestly. No matter who is at the rail, Matthew 18:20 tells of Jesus promise that "where two or three are gathered in my name, I am there among them."

# Worship

#### Altar Guild Words of the Month



This month, the Altar Guild offers five words-of-themonth: Chalice, Ciborium, Pyx, Host, Wine.

A **Chalice** is an open vessel which displays a cross on its base and is used for consecration and distribution of **wine** during Holy Eucharist. The **Ciborium** is a vessel shaped much like a chalice, except that it has a fitted lid topped by a cross. It is used for

consecration and distribution of bread during Holy Eucharist. A **Pyx** is a small lidded container used as a "bread box" in smaller services at the church, or to carry consecrated bread to those unable to attend services.

The consecrated bread of the Eucharist is called the **Host**. The term is from the Latin hostia, "victim." Use of the term reflects an understanding of the Eucharist in sacrificial terms relative to Christ's death on the cross. The individual wafers of the Eucharist may be called People's Hosts. A larger Priest's Host is displayed by the celebrant during the Eucharist.

#### Youth Sunday School: Worth Sharing




Youth Sunday School began a new year September 7 in the McRae Lodge, led by Kim and Will Duncan. The theme of the first unit is "Worth Sharing."

#### Sacred Ground Begins October 15



Our first Sacred Ground study group has been formed and will have their first meeting on Wednesday, October 15 following the Wonderful Wednesday meal. Levi Brendle is the leader of this 11-part session.

Sacred Ground is a film- and readings-based dialogue series on race, grounded in faith. Small groups are invited to walk through chapters of America's history of race and racism, while weaving in threads of family story, economic class, and political and regional identity.

The 11-part series is built around a powerful online curriculum of documentary films and readings that focus on Indigenous, Black, Latino, and Asian/Pacific American histories as they intersect with European American histories.

#### Praying The Gospel: A Scriptural Rosary Prayer Book For an Evangelical Heart




Our own Levi Brendle <u>has a new book</u> which you can purchase on Amazon.

Prayer Beads and the Rosary have been around in some shape since the beginning of the Christian Faith. There are several differing views on the origin of the Rosary but many scholars have been able to trace it back to the practice of using a knotted prayer rope by the

Desert Fathers in the 3rd and early 4th centuries.

This book is to help fellow Christian Brothers and Sisters pray without ceasing and come into a greater understanding of God's grace by praying and meditating on the Gospels and life of Jesus. Our hope is that through praying the Rosary daily and reflecting on the truths of God's Word, we might see a change in our lives and use it as a springboard to motivate us towards change.

#### What is Fr. Michael Reading?




Fr. Michael always has a book in his hand; what is he reading right now? Right now he is reading *Battling to the End* by René Girard.

Carl von Clausewitz (1780–1831), the Prussian military theoretician who wrote On War, is known above all for his famous dictum: "War is the continuation of politics by other means." In René Girard's view, however, the strategist's treatise offers up a more disturbing truth to the

reader willing to extrapolate from its most daring observations: with modern warfare comes the insanity of tit-for-tat escalation, which political institutions have lost their ability to contain. Having witnessed the Napoleonic Wars firsthand, Girard argues, Clausewitz intuited that unbridled "reciprocal action" could eventually lead foes to total mutual annihilation. Haunted by the Franco-German conflict that was to ravage Europe, in Girard's account Clausewitz is a prescient witness to the terrifying acceleration of history. Battling to the End issues a warning about the apocalyptic threats hanging over our planet and delivers an authoritative lesson on the mimetic laws of violence.

The third season of St. Paul's Players kicks off this month with the hilarious British comedy, *The Butler Did It!* 



The organ has not been functional at full capacity for quite some time; this restoration project was desperately needed and is good stewardship to ensure the longevity of this masterful instrument. Our organ was designed to emphasize bright and articulate speech, clean principal choruses, and well defined ensemble voicing that allows each pipe to retain its character within the chorus. The organ comprises fifty-four ranks and over thirty-two hundred pipes, all controlled by a three manual console. It is the same type of organ that is in the Kennedy Center, also a Casavant organ, but which is slightly larger than ours.

Following the concert a reception was held in the Parlor.

#### **Vestry Highlights for August**




