Update on the Parrott House

The Parrott House is a landmark in the Village of Schoharie and a monument to Schoharie County's role in tourism and hospitality at the turn of the century. The Parrott House was acquired in 2019 with the intention of renovating and reopening the property as a boutique hotel and restaurant.

The Schoharie Economic Enterprise Corporation (SEEC) reported at the February village board meeting that the current owners have reaffirmed their commitment to restoring the historic hotel to its former glory despite pandemic related setbacks. SEEC has been working with the village and the owners to secure grant funding that was previously awarded to aid in the redevelopment of the property.

SEEC went on to report that the owners had to reevaluate the project costs to account for pandemic related increases and that they were just waiting for Mechanical, Electrical, and Plumbing (MEP) plans to move forward with their search for contractors.

In the prevailing time between the onset of this project and the update provided by SEEC there have been building improvements to ensure that there is no further degradation in the structure. A new roof and windows have been installed in the Parrott House and masonry work is underway to stabilize the building and repair some of the building's façade.

All parties involved are excited by the project's potential and to begin work in the coming months! Jennie Flagler is living her best life.

Despite the uncertainties wrought by the COVID-19 pandemic, Flagler has managed to keep the doors open at her restaurant, The Farmers Beef and Brew, located at 305 Main St. in Schoharie. She and her team are weathering the storm, and adapting as they go.

"We've gotten so much support from the community – it means a lot," said Flagler, who will celebrate three years in business this August.

Being in the food industry is something Flagler knew she wanted from an early age, and the restaurant becoming a family affair is a bonus.

The young bussers may look familiar to some, because they're Flagler and husband Robert Smith's daughter, Allie, and niece, Skylar. Smith and son RJ are both a frequent presence at the restaurant as well.

Flagler and Smith bought the building in the heart of the village in 2018. It was damaged during Tropical Storm Irene, and Smith did much of the renovation.

"I worked here in high school when it was Tom's County Seat as a dishwasher," Flagler said, "and the kitchen is set up the same as it was when I worked for him."

Flagler – who makes all of her own sauces, salad dressings and desserts – also works hard to source food and brews locally as much as possible.

Passion on Main Street in Schoharie, c 1920

The Wright House on Main Street in Schoharie was commissioned to be built by J.D. & Mae (Vroman) Wright in 1920. The couple owned the Taylor Block, which housed their dry goods business.

The Wrights, who had lived on Grand Street, liked the grand new homes of the time in the Albany suburb of New Scotland, and contracted with a builder from there to design and build such a place on a Main Street lot they'd bought in the village.

As their daughter Elizabeth remembered it, the plan was to house the crew at the Parrott House. However in that period in history the owner would not allow a dark-skinned Haitian man on the crew to stay there, so a decision was made to erect the carriage barn on the property first, and put all the men up there.

To take care of meals, a makeshift cook stove was brought in and vented out a window, and the crew slept on cots in the barn. Mae Wright designed a menu, and sent the family's young female cook to prep the meals in the barn each day. A couple of the men on the crew developed a crush on the young woman, and wound up having a duel with pistols behind the Wright property (on land that is now Brookside Drive and Hilgert Parkway) to settle the "lovers triangle."

Miss Wright recalls that one of the men indeed shot the other, and that her older brother drove the wounded worker into a hospital in Albany in his roadster. Elizabeth recounted how the drive took two hours, and how the victim bled all over the backseat upholstery of her brother's car. She did not mention the severity of the wound, nor what became of the pair of suitors or their intended romance with the cook. Miss Wright, who never married, has passed on, so unless one of her relatives knows these details, this is a mystery lost to time.



NOTE -- Tom Smith and Elizabeth Apgar-Smith bought the house from the Wright's daughter Elizabeth in 1978, shortly after the death of her parents. They are just the second family to live in the home. This account is as Elizabeth Wright presented it to them in 1978, when they purchased the house.
