A Blast from the Past

Imer and the Bear by Ruth Bellinger

Many of Imer Bellinger's customers became his good friends. He went to Quaker Street, Delanson and Duaneburg on one day; Central Bridge, Sloansville, and Howes Cave on another day; and Gallupville, West Berne and Berne on another. One customer of his was uninvited and unwelcome, however.

He was chugging along in the Model T when a bear jumped into the road directly in front of the car. There was no way to avoid it so the car knocked the bear down and went over it.

The car swayed from side to side and Imer had difficulty keeping it from tipping over. The car stalled, which meant that he would have to get out and crank it to get it started again. The car had no doors on it, and Mr. Bear could have reached in and messed Imer up very nicely. However, after grunting a few times, getting up and shaking himself, he decided to amble across the road and into a field. After he had gone quite a distance, Imer got out and cranked the Model T and continued on his way.
