Focus on Schoharie



There's a little bit of everything at Generations

Generations, A Vintage Consignment Shop is focused on the future while offering a glimpse into the past.

The historic building at 397 Main St. in Schoharie is filled to the brim with antiques, vintage collectibles, household items, jewelry and unique pieces of art from more than 350 consignors. Exploring the two floors of the 1820s home and outbuildings feels like walking into the past.

Owner and antique dealer Ruth Ann Wilkinson, whose family has lived in Schoharie for generations, cultivates that link to yesteryear.

"I opened Saltbox Antiques many years ago with my mother and father (Honey and Bob Sumner) as partners, and those were happy times," said Wilkinson, who is also a real estate agent with Century 21 Rural Estates. "My sister Joanie (Marciniak) and I opened this shop in my mother's memory, and now with over 350 consignors, I can barely fit my stuff in here anymore."

Marciniak stepped back from the business after it opened in 2006, but Wilkinson kept right on antiquing and partnering with consigners, filling the first floor with items, then the second, and then spilling out into the barn and Fibber McGee's Closet.


In addition to running Generations, Wilkinson also manages the Antiques in Schoharie show, a two-day event held in the spring and fall. It's presented by the nonprofit Schoharie Colonial Heritage Association, which operates the Schoharie Valley Railroad Museum, the 1743 Palatine House Museum and its Children's Summer Theater Program, with funds raised at the annual antique shows.

"Colonial Heritage is a big piece of my heart, and I think it's important to preserve Schoharie's history," Wilkinson said. "This area is such a wonderful place to raise children, and people stay because they love it."

Did you know that at the turn of the century many business enterprises existed in Schoharie, including a monument maker, a cigar factory, a hat factory, a furniture dealer, and an umbrella factory situated near the Schoharie depot. Judging from the existing photographs, the umbrella factory employed some 30 men and women. All that remains of this enterprise are a few photographs — nothing is known about the owner.



Did you know that in 1928 Gertrude Spawn Leininger presented to the Schoharie Central School Board the canon that sits on the school lawn. It was said to be from the USS Constitution. USS Constitution, also known as Old Ironsides, is a three-masted wooden-hulled heavy frigate of the United States Navy. She is the world's oldest commissioned war ship still afloat. She was launched in 1797, one of six original 44-gun frigates authorized for construction by the Naval Act of 1794 and the third constructed. The ship was made famous during the War of 1812. The ship is now in Boston harbor. Research by Louis Tremante showed that this canon is a replica cast at the Boston shipyards in 1906 to raise funds in 1928 to restore Old Ironsides.
