The Village is updating its water reading and billing software. This has caused a delay in the water/sewer invoicing. Please note your next couple of water/ sewer invoicing may also be delayed. DPW is in the process of changing water meters and will contact you if your meter needs upgrading.

Citizens Advisory Board

The Schoharie Village Citizen Advisory Board met on April 26, 2023. Sgt. Jason Temple reported that there have been no major incidents or personnel complaints so far in 2023. Two Radar speed signs have been acquired through grants, and were installed. However, State DOT needed additional paperwork, so temporarily they were removed. Each sign records the speed of vehicles passing by. That computer log shows that the signs do work in reducing speeds along the Main Street corridor.

Our local police are remaining compliant with all trainings which are required. The employee manual has recently been updated with regard to hiring procedures, to bring it into compliance with the Professional Policing Act of 2021. So far in 2023 our officers have responded to 86 calls for service, and have issued 34 traffic tickets. Two arrests were made based upon outstanding warrants, and there have been 4 vehicle accidents in the village.



The Turkey Vultures



They're not swallows and this isn't Capistrano, but the Schoharie vultures are back. Turkey vultures (often called turkey buzzards) are federally protected by the Migratory Bird Treaty Act.

They're not exactly a pretty bird but are relatively harmless. With their 6 foot wingspan and bald heads,

they can give people an eerie feeling as they soar on thermals of warm, rising air.

The species has superior intelligence and a highly developed sense of smell. Turkey Vultures can live for upwards of 20 years. They subsist predominantly carrion (dead and putrefying flesh) and help clean-up our environment.



They do have some

rather unattractive habits including vomiting as a defense mechanism and excreting onto their own legs to cool off on hot days. Their acidic droppings can destroy surfaces besides making quite a mess.

Before roosting at night, they sometimes play tag, soaring into the air playing follow the leader. In the morning you may see them sunbathing with their wings spread out to increase their body temperature after the cool night.

The turkey vulture migrates long distances in early winter, often returning to the same area. They are gregarious and roost in large community groups (called a committee), often in dead, leafless trees. They break away to forage independently during the day. A committee have taken up residence in the trees at the intersection of Depot Lane and Main Street and have been returning each year.
