Schoharie and a Bale of Cotton

Around 1925 Manly Bellinger of Schoharie had one of very few vehicles in our area and would act as a delivery man from the Schoharie railroad station to local residents. One day he received a 500 pound bale of southern grown cotton to be delivered to a local resident with a \$25 delivery fee. With the state of economics during the Great Depression era, the resident could not pay the fee. Mr. Bellinger took the bale home and kept it in his carriage barn for over 50 years.

When cleaning out the barn around 1980, his son Duncan found the cotton bale which arose his curiosity. His research led him to the Agrirama in Tifton, Georgia. The museum was very interested in the cotton bale and the Bellingers decided to donate the bale. The bale was delivered for display, returning it back down south nearly 60 years later in 1982.

Fast forward to 2023, Diana Bell Jackson, now owner of the historic Bellinger home heard of the story from Duncan and decided to track the bale down. Contacting the Georgia Agrirama, now the Georgia Museum of Agriculture (GMA), the curator was interested in finding the mysterious bale of cotton. Although her research took her to 11 cities, 4 states, 2 countries and 2 continents as well as inspection of all the cotton bales on display at the GMA, Schoharie's bale of cotton could not be found. If it wasn't lost in a cotton gin fire, it had probably deteriorated beyond saving in an old storage building many years before the Agrirama became the GMA.

Although the bale wasn't found, the complete story, along with the picture, and all its documentation are now preserved forever, even if the physical object is long gone.

Whereas my wife Jane has eloped my bed and board, this, therefore, is to forbid all persons from harboring, or trusting her on my account, under pain of prosecution; as I am determined to exact the law upon any who may be found guilty in the premises.
