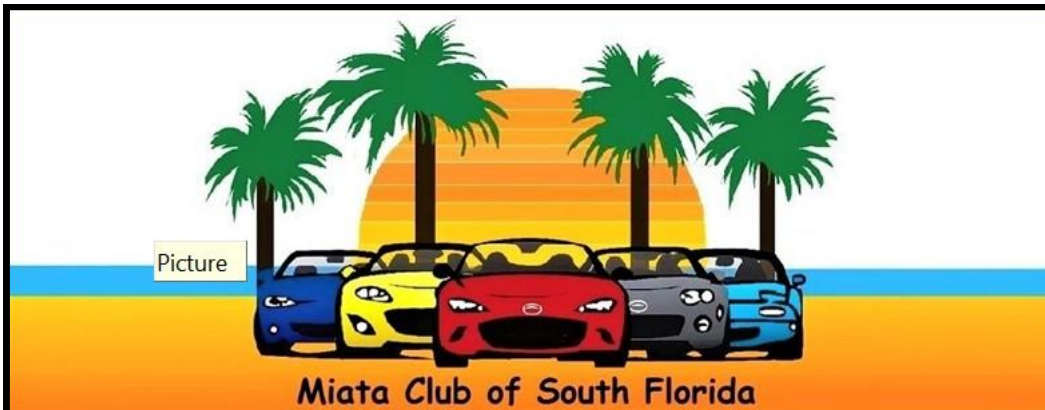

How the 2022 Mazda Miata Uses Its Brakes to Reduce Body Roll

Kinematic Posture Control makes the 2022 MX-5 Miata corner flatter without changing any suspension components or impacting ride comfort.

[The current Mazda Miata](#) is unusual among modern sports cars in that it has a lot of body roll in cornering. Where most sports cars use stiff suspension to maximize grip, the Miata leans a bit in fast corners. Mazda



tuned the Miata this way for a variety of reasons, including better ride comfort and more feedback in spirited driving. But for [the 2022 MX-5](#), Mazda has found a way to reduce body roll without harming ride quality, accomplished in an incredibly clever way.

As with so many things in the automotive world, a carmaker's choice in anti-roll bars represents a compromise—in this case, between body roll and ride comfort. Stiffer bars give flatter, faster cornering, but ride quality suffers. Some high-end automakers use [active anti-roll systems](#) to offer the best of both worlds, though these are big, heavy, and expensive. The sort of thing you'd never see in a Miata.

So Mazda engineers invented a new system called Kinematic Posture Control (KPC), which uses braking to reduce body roll. Some cars, including the Mazda 3 hatchback, will lightly brake an inside wheel while cornering to create torque vectoring. KPC is different, though, as Mazda North America vehicle dynamics engineer Dave Coleman explains to *R&T* in an email.

"We are using a very slight amount of braking tuned to give a specific

downward pull on the inside rear suspension," Coleman says. The ND-generation Miata has anti-squat rear suspension geometry. "When the rear wheel moves up and down, the rear suspension geometry is laid out to guide the wheel on a diagonal path, moving backward as it moves up," Coleman says. "So, if you pull up on the rear wheel, it will necessarily move backward a bit. The converse is also true. Pull backward on the rear wheel, and it will also have to move up. This is how the backward force from the brakes ends up exerting a little upward force on the wheel as it tries to follow that diagonal line."

The braking forces at play here are tiny. "We would have to use much stronger braking if we wanted a meaningful yaw response from the differential braking itself," Coleman explained. "Though physics dictates that any differential braking must produce some yaw moment, the amount of direct yaw response created by KPC here is too small for us to differentiate from background noise."

Specifically, Coleman explained that KPC applies a maximum of 45 psi of braking pressure to the inside rear brake; Coleman says that a typical a brake-torque vectoring system applies a minimum of about 450 psi of braking pressure to a single wheel.

Coleman tells us that KPC is not activated by driver input the way brake-based torque vectoring would be. KPC is instead triggered when it senses the difference in speed between the two rear wheels while rounding a curve. "This little software trick behaves as if it were just a mechanical characteristic of the chassis," Coleman says. "We're basically tricking the rear suspension into doing something it couldn't do through geometry alone."

Subtle software tweaks aimed at improved dynamics are becoming a Mazda hallmark. A few years back, Mazda introduced [G Vectoring Control](#), which briefly reduces engine torque during turn-in to create a tiny moment of deceleration, triggering weight transfer to the front tires to improve cornering grip and response. The fraction-of-a-second deceleration happens automatically and it's totally imperceptible from the driver's seat, but as we showed in 2016, [the effect is measurable in cornering forces](#).

A few years ago, Coleman once told this reporter that it's important for a Miata to ride well. The way Coleman put it, "good roads are often bad roads"—the most winding, remote routes are often the most poorly paved. You can't enjoy this kind of driving in a car that's too stiff to bear.

KPC is ingenious in that it cuts down on body roll without spoiling the ride. It also involves no additional hardware, which is crucial in a light-weight, affordable Miata. Naturally, we can't wait to try it ourselves.

Dents in my Miata by Dennis Laslo

I took my Miata in for my complimentary oil change at Ed Howard Mazda and before they take the car, they have a “greeter” who checks the car for any damage (so they don’t take responsibility for preexisting dents and dings). And my jaw dropped when he pointed to a dent in the passenger door. I had no idea where it came from and I only have a few thousand miles on the car.

Anyway, it was the right height for a shopping cart dent and below is what it looked like.



The Ed Howard sales manager told me they use a paint less service, “The Dent Eraser,” in Sarasota for small dents. I gave them a call, and the co-owner, Mickey Quinn agreed to come to my house and fix it for \$90.

I wish I had video taped it. He pulled out a case of tools which all looked custom made and got to work. He first slid a large steel plate in the door next to the window (so as not to break the glass) and then he had a tool which looked like a sharp punch or awl. That’s when I almost changed my mind, but he said the trick is to just work the metal back and forth gently and that’s what he did. I short time later the dent was gone and the surface looked as pristine as the day I bought it.

While he was doing that, I noticed something not quite right at the paint near where the convertible top folds in. Mike said sure enough there was a ripple that appeared to be caused by some sort of pressure directly down.

How is this happening??? Who’s beating up my car? Argh !!!

Anyway, he said that since he was here, he’d fix that as well and for free. We are talking about a ripple here. Not a dent. Anyway, he convinced me all was well. To get at this problem, however, he removed one of the rubber grommet from the door and drilled the hole slightly larger. He then magically removed the ripple in a similar fashion. Then he had another rubber piece to fill the larger hole he drilled.

Dashcam

A friend of mine was rear ended shortly after he bought a brand new car. He had always had a dashcam in all his cars, and when the police arrived he was able to show them the video of what happened and there was no arguing as it was obvious what happened.

On his way home, the insurance company from the woman that hit him called and said he could get a rental car and get the damage fixed at the dealer. They surrendered immediately.

After seeing his video, I decided to put a dashcam on all my cars. I was happy to see that there is an inexpensive adapter for the Miata so

that you can use the power in the mirror for the dashcam (or I suppose radar detector) and I ordered one from Amazon. I also got a small Garmin dashcam and talk about easy!! I had the adapter and the dashcam

installed and working in less than 10 minutes.

Note these adapters are only valid with the higher Grand Touring trims with Homelink and self dimming mirrors. And also there's an amp limit you can steal from the mirror.

Ticking noise on ND models only

I found this on the MX-5 Miata forum; I had this ticking noise and didn't know where it was coming from. I found the solution for the ticking sound from the passenger side behind the ear/roll hoops. The ticking is coming from a plastic connector in the trunk area. I think This connector is for Sirius XM/ radio. I am not sure as I didn't focus on the wiring etc.

In order to fix it you need to remove the trunk carpeting and the plastic cradle for the inflator and document holder. Just above it you will find a white box kind of thing with wire connected to it. That plastic connector vibrates while driving causing that ticking noise. I just used some foam between the plastic fastener and the metal which eliminated the ticking. Both Convertibles and RF

There's also a ticking-like noise caused in the NDs by the seat back rubbing against the rear bulkhead plastic trim panels. A Quick solution is, if you have the seats pushed back all the way, against the panel. Just move them about one click forward on the seat rails so the seatback does not touch and rub against the rear bulkhead trim panels.

Another source of ticking sometimes comes from the seat belt mechanism anchorage. People eliminated these ticking sources by loosening the related anchor bolts and then torquing them back on to proper factory specs.

We had a good cry and were moping around the house for a couple of weeks as this was the first time in a very long time that we didn't have a dog.

Now we really needed to do something. I was looking for a road trip idea on line and happened on the SW Florida Miata club web site and pictures of the Key West Christmas.

That's it! Key West.



We had been to Key West on a day trip (before the pandemic) via the Key West Express boat and didn't have enough time to explore. So it was settled. I was worried about packing everything into the trunk for a week's worth of clothes and such. We had a medium sized duffle bag and we bought a small soft side cooler and tested by packing the trunk. Everything fit like a glove. Also got my camera bag in there and some beach towels and there was just enough room for maybe one or two small mementos of the trip.

My other concern was when I drove the Miata for any longer trip, my left knee couldn't find a good spot to rest. But, I figured if worse comes to worse, I'd just stop somewhere for a break. We also bought some memory foam cushions for both seats.

I had accumulated quite a few frequent flyer miles when I was working and started looking for hotel ideas. Amazingly, the pandemic had created some fantastic deals. The normally expensive resort hotels (over \$1000/night) were available for clearance pricing. So I booked the entire trip without putting much of a dent in my miles.

Day 1 - Shark Valley

We decided to avoid I-75 as much as possible and keep the top down and the noise down. We took 75 to Naples and then US41 to cross the state. It turned out to be a scenic route and by keeping the speed at 55-60 we could keep the wind noise down to bearable levels.

The Everglade's Shark Valley was our first stop. I had made reservations on line for the tram ride – several hours of touring the wild-life. The tour was OK, but we had arrived in the dry season and there was not too much to look at. We definitely will return in the rainy season for a second look.





Then we had Miata troubles. The Entertainment system went kapoot. I guess it was OK since most of the time, you can't hear the radio anyway. But the rest of the trip, the factory navigation and radio – including Sirius XM didn't work.



[when we got home, we found out there is a firmware upgrade to fix the radio and I waited an hour and a half at the dealer for the very slow upgrade to get everything working again. All is well with the world again.]

Next on the trip was Baker's Cay resort in Key Largo. We simply crashed and enjoyed both their pool and private bay with some gorgeous sunsets.



Now we were off to Bahia Honda State Park. Although it was billed as a beautiful beach, we didn't think so. *(editor's note: the beach at Bahia*



Honda is a State Park and they leave it in it's naturel state which means there is almost always lots of vegetation washed up on the sand. However, rent snorkel gear and get 100' off the beach and what you'll see is amazing, sponges, gorgonian corals, tropical fish and more!)

This is typical of what the Oceanside beach at Bahia Honda State Park looks like. It's kind of yucky. But 100 yards to the north-west is a beach that faces the Gulf of Mexico and it's usually very clean. BTW, note the crystal clear water!



Next was Key West. Since we had recently been to Key West, we spent most of the day in the hotel swimming pool. We also managed a little time to get a delicious sloppy joe sandwich at Sloppy Joe's.



We ended up skipping our next stop. We had bought tickets to the Gulf-stream thoroughbred race track / casino but decided to head home instead.

One final note, the least expensive hotel, the TravelLodge in Florida City was

the cleanest hotel we were at. It looked like someone cleaned it by hand with a toothbrush.

The Marriot in Key West was the opposite. Probably labor shortages during the pandemic.

We took some back roads home and it was great (Rt 29 to Rt 82 to Ft Myers). No traffic and wonderful Miata top down weather.

Looking forward to a repeat.

Trip to Shark Valley (and more) April 11th & 12th or just the 12th

After reading about Dennis & Martha's trip, Elaine and I are inspired to consider doing a trip to the Everglades for the Miata Club. We've done a trip like the ones below and we will do one this spring whether it's with the Miata Club or on our own. There are lots of possibilities.

We could do just a simple day trip to Shark Valley in Everglades National Park. Maybe we could add a stop or two along the way. Like a stop at the Oasis Visitor Center at the Big Cypress Preserve or the Kirby Storter Roadside Park & Boardwalk on the way there and a stop at the Clyde Butcher Gallery or Joanie's Blue Crab Café on US41 or a restaurant in Everglades City on the way home.

The other possibility is an overnight trip with a stay in Everglades City. Maybe do a Ten thousand Islands pontoon boat tour (\$36 to \$40) out of Everglades National Park (just south of Everglades City) the first day, have diner at a restaurant in Everglades City, spend the night at the Ivey House in Everglades City (rooms are \$179/night) and then visit Shark Valley the next day.

There are a lot of other things we could do as a group or individually while in the area as well. There are air boat rides, the Museum of the Everglades, the Big Cypress Bend Boardwalk, Fakahatchee Strand State Preserve Park, the Miccosukee Indian Village Gift Shop and a number of other restaurants as well.

We'd like to go before the rainy season starts in mid May. In March through May there should be lots of birds to see as that is when they are building nests, mating and raising their chicks. Shark Valley (\$30/car entry fee) has a 17 mile loop you can travel by Tram (\$28), rent a bike (\$22), bring your own bike or walk (yeah, right). We did the tram last year and it was a nice couple of hours with a stop at a big overlook structure halfway through. The next time we expect to rent bikes and just ride up and back on the canal side of the tram loop. That way we can stop for as long as we like to try and capture better photos of birds and other wildlife.

If you have any interest in either of these potential trips (a single day trip or the over night trip) PLEASE let me know. If we get enough interest, I'll make it happen, if not, Elaine and I will do it ourselves.

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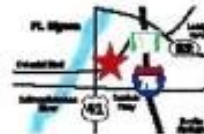
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TRACK DAYS AT TALLADEGA SPEEDWAY

Late in 2020, I received emails from a few organizers that were trying to set up a Miata Day at the Talladega Speedway in Lincoln, AL. Plans were made, Miata Clubs signed up, things were looking good until . . . COVID! Plans were rearranged, organizers set up different dates and events and . . . plans had to be cancelled again due to a lack of staff to man the events.

Now, it is back on the schedule in 2022! Well, almost. It's early in the planning process and four possible dates have been identified. I hope to get more information in a week or two. Here is what I know so far -

Possible dates are:

March 19th or 26th (Only date they are finalizing)

June 18th

August 13th

December 2nd

The event organizer says that Track days will include:

- Two laps around Talladega Superspeedway

- We will have food and drink available to purchase

Also included is a race ticket to either the GEICO 500 on April 24th, 2022 or the YellaWood 500 on October 2nd, 2022. All attendees will sit together for the race, Sections have already been blocked off to keep everyone as close as possible.

Cost is \$35 per person + \$25 per car for the track days. The \$25 will support local charities in East Alabama.

Once we get final details and the actual date, we can find out if we have any interested members that would like to attend. We can caravan to the area - probably this will be a 3- or 4-night trip - and we might find other places to visit on the way or in the area. So, keep this in mind - it could be pretty incredible, I think. Imagine driving your beloved Miata on the Talladega Super Speedway, with a photo to prove it! 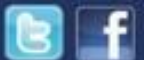

Key West City Tour with Road Scholars

Here is an outside the box idea for a Miata Club trip. Elaine and I have been taking vacation trips with a outfit called the Road Scholars. We have already done 5 trips over the last few years. We've been southern California for hiking in the desert, kayaking on Florida natural springs, up to Hudson Bay to see the Aurora Borealis, to Utah to photograph canyons and arches and to Albuquerque, NM for the Hot Air Balloon Fiesta. And we have 5 more scheduled over the next 18 months. We'll be kayaking in the Everglades, hiking in the Grand Canyon, back to the Balloon Fiesta, to Yellowstone for more photography and to Bryce Canyon and Zion National Park for more hiking!

But we were looking for a simple trip to take later in 2022 and found one that goes to Key West for a 6 days and 5 nights. They will visit the Mel Fisher Maritime Museum, the Custom House Museum, the Butterfly & Nature Conservatory, the Florida Keys Eco-discovery Center, the Hemingway House, the Tennessee Williams exhibit and the Audubon House & Gardens. They will also do a sunset at Mallory Square, an hour long street walk of Key West's architecture and 2 or 3 morning presentations related to Key West. They include 12 meals during the trip that includes 5 breakfasts, 3 lunches and 4 dinners. They also have some 'free time' one afternoon and a couple of evenings. And they have the group staying at the Opal Key Resort & Marina (formerly the Margaritaville Key West Resort. It's located near Mallory Square and is on the water. BTW, the cheapest rooms at the Opal is \$600+ per night and we'll be there for 5 nights. For those who struggle with math, that's over \$3000 for just the hotel stay! And keeping your Miata or whatever you use to drive to Key West for this trip can be parked at the hotel for free!

OK, well here is the good and the bad, the cost for the entire trip with Road Scholars is \$1699, take that as either good or bad. It's not cheap, but then it is a heck of a deal for Key West prices! Remember, just 5 nights at the Opal would cost over \$3000.



Also, getting around in Key West would mostly be done by walking. Road Scholars makes this a 3 out of 4 in terms of activity. They say, *"Walking two miles daily on paved sidewalks; some stairs and standing at museums and historic sites."* Finally, you need to sign up with Road Scholars fairly soon as the Key West trip do sell out. They have 8 Key West trips scheduled for before the November trip and all but one are already sold out! They will also require some kind of deposit, I think is like \$200. And should you change your mind or have some other issue force you out of taking the trip, there is no refund, but you can apply the money to any other trip they offer. We had to do this with several trips during 2020 and early 2021 due to our risk avoidance for COVID. Oh, and Road Scholars REQUIRES all participants and staff be both vaccinated and have their booster shot!
