Logan is a member of Troop 43 in Versailles, Kentucky, where he received his Eagle award. He is the son of Jeff and Laura Tanner, and an active member of Versailles Baptist Church.



Logan's Eagle project involved establishing a quarter mile walking trail at the Jack Jouett Historical Site in Woodford County, Kentucky. The trail had been "rough cut" but was not used as intended. The project widened the path, so that the county maintenance crews could maintain it. Logan and his volunteers placed mulch along the trail to mark it and help keep grass from growing to retain the trail long term. Logan also built two benches to place along the trail for guests to rest and relax.

Logan's leadership roles in Scouting included Patrol Leader, Quartermaster, and Senior Patrol Leader. He was Senior Patrol Leader for three years during COVID years.



Scouting opportunities have been memorable. He attended Philmont with his father and brother in 2021 where he hiked Baldy Mountain, a 12,441 feet elevation climb. He learned leadership skills at the National Youth Leadership Training at Tunnel Hill Camp in Indiana. Whitewater rafting on the Ocoee River and many weekend adventures with fellow scouts are times he will never forget.

Logan is currently working as a Warehouse Manager at Quality Feed and Pet Supplies while he attends Bluegrass Community and Technical College to study Law Enforcement. He plans to serve local communities in law enforcement.
