SECOND BIENNIAL GAME REPORT

Washington today has the best Game and Game Fish Laws of any State in the Union. This is not the mere claim of a possibly prejudiced official of this State, but it is a fact admitted by those national authorities who have had occasion to study the laws of all the States. The laws are well obeyed by the people and the officers charged with their enforcement have, during the past two years, been zealous in their efforts. The highly intelligent citizenship of the State makes the work of law enforcement easier with each passing year.

Control of the Game and Game Fish and Food Fish by a single head, as recommended to you in the previous biennial report, was accomplished by the passage by the 1915 session of the Legislature of an act effecting this. The reasons making this desirable were set forth in the last biennial report. Actual practice has shown it to be desirable from every view point, particularly the economical one. Today there are twenty of the State's salmon hatcheries of which partial use is being made to hatch trout for planting in the waters of this State. It is only by making use of these hatcheries that it is possible for many of the counties in the State to receive trout fry, for it would be a physical impossibility to transport fry from the place where the eggs are taken to the places where they are liberated, while it is very feasible and economical to transport the trout eggs to the county where we desire to hatch out the fry and liberate it. Trout fry, almost invariably, is obtained in sections of the State remote from the lines of transportation. This makes it necessary that the egg rather than the fry be transported to those places from which distribution is possible. I hesitate to state what it would cost to accomplish the planting of the number of trout fry annually placed in the waters of the State, were it not possible for us to make use of our magnificent salmon hatchery system to assist in this work. For one thing, it would be necessary to construct many more trout hatcheries than are in existence today and this would be duplication without any better results being secured. In fact, I think the results would be poorer than those now obtained.

This is just one of the items that makes single control much more preferable than dual control. The administrative cost under single control is a great deal less than under dual control and, in a day and age when responsibility is being centered rather than scattered, it would seem that it would be taking a backward step to have the Game and Game Fish work divided from the Food Fish work in this State.

County Game Commissions Satisfactory.

The County Game Commission plan continues on the whole to prove satisfactory. This Department is continuing the policy adopted in 1913 of assigning the Game Fish and Game Birds to the County Game Commissions and charging them with the responsibility of planting and liberating them in those places in which, in their judgment, they will best thrive.

The County Game Commissions have effected a State organization, which in 1915 and again in 1917 recommended to the Legislature those changes in

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the Game Laws which they deemed advisable. These recommendations were made after careful discussion and were the result of the practical experience of the persons making them. The 1915 and 1917 sessions of the Legislature both enacted into laws, practically every recommendation made by the State Association of County Game Commissioners and Game Wardens.

Following the enactment of the Game Code in 1913, in which the State was virtually divided into two districts—Eastern and Western Washington—there was formed in each of these districts an Association of Game Commissioners and Game Wardens. They continued separate entities until February, 1916, when consolidation was effected at Spokane. By consolidation is afforded a unity of purpose quite essential to the betterment of game conditions in this State.

Larger State Game Fund Needed.

The experience of those counties in the State that have attempted the propagation of game birds has, as a rule, been far from satisfactory. In the first place, the expense of game bird propagation has been greater than could be borne by any of the counties, with the possible exception of King, the largest in the State, and in King County the operations of the County Game Farm has caused much criticism. Snohomish, Thurston and Island counties have all three abandoned their attempts at operating County Game Farms. The four counties above mentioned are all in Western Washington and I think that it must be admitted that climatic conditions in Western Washington are not nearly so favorable for the propagation of game birds as in certain sections of Eastern Washington. While the attempts in game bird propagation by the counties in Western Washington have, almost without exception, proven disastrous or at least expensive beyond the ability of the counties to withstand, the State on the contrary has been able to get highly satisfactory results at the State Game Farm established in connection with the State Penitentiary at Walla Walla. This will be referred to in greater length later on in this report and is mentioned at this time for the pointing out of the fact that a way should be found for increasing the State Game Fund so as to permit the State to engage more extensively in propagation work, both of game birds and animals and game fish, for while the counties, which have put in trout hatcheries, have not met with the degree of failure they have in attempting to operate game farms, nevertheless, the larger number of the counties owning trout hatcheries look, in great part, to the State for their egg supply.

Four years of experience forces me to the conclusion that game and game fish propagation should be the work of the State rather than of the counties and that the counties should confine their efforts more to the police work and the proper planting and distribution of the fish and game birds received, furnished by the State. The State is permitted to operate in those sections most advantageous, from climatical and other view points, while the several counties are necessarily limited to their own areas and sometimes attempt the accomplishment of those things much better and more economically performed elsewhere. The State has been constantly enlarging its propagation operations and will perforce need more money for this work.

On the other hand, some of the most populated counties in the State have more money than they really need. The tendency in such cases is

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sometimes toward extravagance. Inasmuch as many of the larger counties are not called upon to do more police work than some of the smaller ones, the law should be changed so as to permit some of the excess fund of the larger counties to go into the State Game Fund to be used for greater propagation operations and for assisting in the policing of some of the smaller counties which do not have a sufficiently large game fund to effectively police themselves, but which nevertheless furnish many of the game fish and game birds taken by the sportsmen residing in the larger counties who resort to them for this purpose.

The 1915 Legislature acted favorably upon the recommendation, which was previously made, of appropriating moneys for the maintenance of our State Trout Hatchery from the State Game Fund rather than from the General Fund, thus lifting this burden from the shoulders of the general taxpayer and placing it upon the person who profits by reason of the operations of the State Trout Hatchery by reason of his enjoying our Game Fishing opportunities.

Best Game Fishing in Years.

Game Fishing in this State has been more satisfactory in the last two years than in many preceding ones. Undoubtedly this is due in a good part to the increased effort which has been put forth by this Department during the last four years in propagating trout, the only game fish which is hatched in this State. Again, the better conditions partly result from the better protection given trout during the spawning season.

Another factor contributing to the improvement in both fishing and hunting in this State—for the hunting is also showing signs of improvement—is the growing sentiment for smaller bag limits, which sentiment in Washington has been translated into statutes. It is this translation of enlightened sentiment into effective laws that is responsible for the statement that our State of Washington has the best Game and Game Fish Laws of any in the Union.

Great Increase in Trout Propagation.

During the biennium just closed, the total fry planted in the waters of this State from the State's hatcheries was 21,433,376. In addition to this there were 134,650 fry of other varieties of game fish planted. Also there was 2,759,885 salmon fry planted in the lakes of the State, as experience shows they will make excellent game fish. This gives a grand total of 24,327,311 fry planted in the fresh waters of the State to replenish them for the sportsmen's profit and pleasure. These figures do not take into account at least an equal number of Steelhead Salmon (Rainbow Trout) fry liberated in waters of this State which are also subject to taking by the game fishermen. Practically every other State classes the Steelhead Salmon as a Rainbow Trout but because of the quantities in which they are found in this State, our own laws arbitrarily places him in the salmon class. Were he to be classed as a trout, the record would show that during the last two years some 48,000,000 trout fry were placed in the waters of the State of Washington by its hatchery system. This is a record not equaled by any other State in the Union.

It is well that the small bag sentiment continues to grow. The great increase in our population and the better hunting and fishing equipment

would soon result disastrously were it not for protective seasons, artificial propagation, and the willingness to accept small bags.

Supreme Court Upholds Constitutionality of Game Code.

The tests of the constitutionality of the Game and Game Fish Code of the State continued during this biennium, but each attempt at its overthrow resulted in failure. In one of the cases which went before the Supreme Court, that body held that County Game Commissioners and County Game Wardens are in effect State officers.

Game Bills Prepared for Legislature.

At the meeting of the State Association of Game Commissioners and Game Wardens, held in Tacoma, December, 1916, a number of changes in the Game Laws were recommended to be enacted by the 1917 Legislature. The Association requested that I have these bills prepared for introduction, and in accordance with this request I have asked the Attorney General's office to draft them. In addition to the changes requested by the State Association, I have requested the Attorney General to draft a bill creating a Game Preserve in Okanogan County for the protection of mountain sheep and goat. One of the few remaining bands of these are to be found in the northern portion of Okanogan County in the Mt. Chopaka Range. The Dominion of Canada has created a Game Preserve of that portion of the British Columbia territory adjoining it and just across the international boundary line. The United States Government has endorsed this request and favorable action from the Legislature is much to be desired.

The 1917 Legislature also has before it a bill recommended by the State Association of Game Commissioners and Game Wardens for the protection of black and brown bear, when not predatory, and providing for a trapper's license. The better thought of today favors the protection of these varieties of bear. It goes without saying that trappers should be licensed, as only by so doing can any check of their activities be made.

New Trout Hatchery Constructed on Tilton River.

During the biennium I exercised the authority conferred by the 1915 Legislature and constructed a trout hatchery in Lewis County on the Tilton River near the city of Morton. The bill provided for the construction of a hatchery in case the spawn supply should be found that would permit of its operation. A reconnaissance carried on at Packwood Lake, situated further into the interior of Lewis County, showed that under favorable conditions a considerable quantity of spawn could be obtained with which to operate the hatchery on the Tilton River. By locating it at the point where it was placed, use of it as a salmon hatchery can also be made. It is one of the neatest and most complete hatcheries so far constructed, albeit not quite so large as some of the others. The amount appropriated for the construction of this hatchery was \$5,000.00.

Concrete Rearing Ponds Constructed at Walla Walla.

Another appropriation made by the 1915 Legislature and expended during the biennium, was that of \$2,000.00 for the construction of concrete rearing ponds at the Walla Walla Trout Hatchery. In order to have a

sufficient number to care for the output of the hatchery it was necessary to construct forty.

The total capacity of these at a given time is about 1,000,000. The appropriation made by the Legislature was not sufficiently large for this purpose and the balance, \$696.73 was furnished by the Walla Walla County Game Commission composed of Messrs. John H. Pedigo, Frank B. Sharpstein and T. H. Drumheller. These rearing ponds are without doubt the best ever constructed by the State for trout culture, being of solid concrete set upon a concrete floor and foundation.

County Game Farms Generally Unsatisfactory.

By the first of January, 1916, the number of Game Farms in the State operated by the counties had reached a total of five. However, there were no new County Game Farms constructed during 1916 and during 1916 from those County Game Farms in operation, only 720 Chinese Pheasants were liberated according to their own reports. Of this number 27 were liberated in Spokane County in Eastern Washington and the remaining 693 in Western Washington. Of the 693 alleged to have been liberated in Western Washington, 663 are claimed to have been liberated from the King County Farm. There has been considerable dispute as to whether or not anything like this number were liberated that year from the King County Farm.

These same five farms are alleged to have liberated 1,621 in 1915 and of this number 1,568 are claimed to have been liberated by King County alone. Again the accuracy of the figures quoted from King County has been challenged. No discussion of this need be entered into here, further than to say that according to the reports of the operators of the farms, the number of Chinese Pheasants liberated in 1916 was not half so large as during the preceding year of 1915. The result has been that every county possessing Game Farms, with the exception of King County, has discontinued its operation and, in passing it may be said that no attempt has been made to liberate any other kind of birds save Chinese Pheasants. While some other varieties have been grown for show purposes, no attempt has been made to propagate them on a scale sufficiently large to attempt liberation.

Most of the counties have found it far cheaper to purchase their birds for liberation than to attempt to raise them. In 1915 the total of birds purchased and liberated by the several counties in the State was 4,428. Of this number, 1,111 were liberated in Western Washington and 3,317 in Eastern Washington. These included Chinese Pheasants, Hungarian Partridges and several other varieties.

In addition to this, in 1916 Spokane County in Eastern Washington purchased and liberated fifteen White-tailed Deer.

In 1916 the total of birds purchased and liberated in the entire State was 4,023. Of this number 1,801 birds were liberated in Western Washington and 2,222 in Eastern Washington. In addition, 16 deer were purchased and liberated in Eastern Washington.

The Experimental Game Farm Highly Successful.

While the counties have been unsuccessful in their attempts to propagate Game Birds, the State has fared much better. In 1916 there was operated on the grounds of the State Penitentiary at Walla Walla what was

termed as an Experimental Game Farm. The moneys wherewith the experiment was undertaken were donated by the several counties of the State under an agreement that the output of the Farm was to be divided pro rata among the counties in proportion to their donation. All told some \$2,200, or \$2,300, was raised and the services of Mr. L. J. Esses, Game Warden of Grays Harbor County, were secured to superintend the work. A limited amount of equipment was purchased and eggs were secured from Mr. Gene Simpson of Corvallis, Oregon, one of the most successful Chinese Pheasant breeders on the Coast. As a result of the experiment, 1,836 birds were distributed to the several counties in the State contributing to the enterprise. When the cost of equipment and the cost of distribution be deducted, the actual cost of hatching and rearing these birds to the age of liberation was in the neighborhood of some 50c each. It is hardly necessary to say that the birds raised by the County Game Farms represented a cost of several dollars each.


Walla Walla was chosen as a scene of the experiment for a variety of reasons. The principal two was the ability to secure the inmate or convict labor of the penitentiary without any cost and the climatic conditions favorable to game bird propagation, possibly unexcelled elsewhere in the United States. Climatically, Walla Walla is favorable because there are no sudden changes of temperature, such as occur in many of the States. Economically, nothing is left to be desired. Labor is one of the principal items going into the operation of a game farm. That of the penitentiary inmate costs nothing. At the same time the inmate is permitted to do the kind of work he likes above all others; namely that of the out-of-doors. It was considered an especial privilege among the penitentiary inmates to be permitted to labor upon the Experimental Game Farm.

The result of the experiment was universally satisfactory and it challenged attention throughout the State. By reason of its success an attempt will be made to secure an appropriation from the 1917 Legislature that will permit of the permanent establishment of a State Game Farm in connection with the State Penitentiary.

Washington's resources of its game and game fisheries is one of its greatest assets and all attempts to perpetuate them are deserving of encouragement. Up to the present time all attempts along this line have been to preserve the game fish supply, but the time has arrived when the supply of game birds must be increased. To make use of a portion of the convict labor of the State along this line is everywhere conceded to be a good idea from every point of view.

Not the least of these considerations is the humanitarian aspect from the point of view of the convict. He will be given the opportunity to labor out in the open, with all the advantages which this implies to health and morals. The Legislature can take no better step to conserve our wild game life and at the same time the health of a goodly number of our penitentiary inmates than appropriating for the establishment of a State Game Farm in connection with the State Penitentiary. The establishment of this Game Farm has been unanimously endorsed by the sportsmen of the State and by every organization for civic advancement to whose attention it has been called.

Lake Whatcom Silver Trout Eyeing Station.

During both the years of 1915 and 1916 the State joined with Whatcom County in the taking of spawn from the so-called Silver Trout in Lake Whatcom. Some 14,500,000 eggs were secured there during this biennium. This trout has proven one of the most popular of any to be found in the State and the 1917 Legislature will be urged to make an appropriation for the establishment of the State Hatchery on this lake.

*** State and County Game Commissions Operate Jointly.**

The Game Commission of Okanogan County joined with the State in the construction, on the Methow River near the town of Pateros, of the Pateros-Methow Hatchery. The hatchery is to be maintained by the State on an agreement with the Okanogan County Game Commission that trout may be hatched there whenever there is room or whenever the hatchery is not being used for salmon hatchery operations.

The State owned a hatchery on the Methow River forty-five miles further up the stream which was of no value by reason of being situated above the point where it was possible to secure a good supply of eggs. The abandonment of this hatchery had been virtually decided upon when the offer from Okanogan County was received. The new hatchery has been operated with most excellent success. The State joined with Okanogan and Ferry counties in 1916 in the operating of an eyeing station for the securing of trout eggs on Curlew Lake in Ferry County. While the result in 1916 was unsatisfactory, another attempt will be made at this point before the experiment is given up.

Game Birds Destroyed by Severe Winter of 1916.

The winter of 1916 was the most severe in this State in at least twenty-five years. Snow fell to a great depth and lay on the ground for weeks. I at once telegraphed to the Chairmen of the Game Commissions of the several counties of the State urging that steps be immediately taken to provide food for the birds. In practically every instance this request was heeded. However, it was impossible to prevent a great loss and, Professor Trevor Kincaid of the University of Washington estimates the mortality of the bird life on Puget Sound of at least twenty per cent that winter.

Trouble With Elk and Beaver.

As a result of the law preventing the killing of elk, the herds have increased very rapidly. In several of the counties of the State, elk had been imported from Wyoming and Montana and were liberated comparatively near civilization. Rather than going back into the hills, they seem inclined to become bold and forage off the farms. In Snohomish County there is particularly bitter complaint from the orchardists and farmers from the destruction they are wreaking.

From several sections of the State come reports of damage done by beaver. The killing of both elk and beaver are prohibited by the laws of the State; while I am opposed to any change in the law which prohibits their being killed, nevertheless, it would seem to be a part of wisdom to provide some way whereby the State Game Warden may, acting through the County Game Warden, give relief in particular instances where it is clearly shown that individuals are suffering from the depredations of these animals.

Some of the complaints are made by parties who think they may obtain permission themselves to destroy these animals, and oftentimes the complainants are not nearly so emphatic when it is suggested that if the animals need be killed that this work will be assigned to the County Game Warden.

The severe winters of 1915-6 resulted in the death of many of the Roosevelt Elk on the Olympic Peninsula. The heavy snows promoted their successful attack by wolves in certain instances after they had been so weakened that they could not escape from their enemies, hindered as they were by the depth of the snow. It is reasonable to suppose, however, that protected as the elk are by the law, this loss will be rapidly overcome and in the course of a year or two the herds will be as large as formerly.

Slight Decrease in the Total Number of Licenses.

In 1915 the total number of licenses issued, State and County, was 124,691; of this number 121,490 were Resident County Hunting and Fishing Licenses; 941 were Non-resident County Fishing Licenses, while 2,220 were Resident State Hunting and Fishing Licenses and 40 were Non-resident State Hunting and Fishing Licenses.

The total cash received from the issuance of licenses for the year 1915 was \$134,872.00, in addition to this there was received from fines, \$7,647.45.

World war conditions were undoubtedly responsible for the falling off in the number of licenses issued in 1916, when the grand total in the State was 120,629, a decrease from the previous year of 4,062. Of this total 116,843 were Resident County Hunting and Fishing Licenses; 944 were Non-resident County Fishing Licenses; 2,803 were Resident State Hunting and Fishing Licenses. The grand total of receipts in the year 1916 from the issuance of licenses was \$133,138.50, and in addition to this the sum of \$6,135.37 was received from fines.

Arrests and Convictions.

In both 1915 and 1916 the percentage of convictions obtained from the arrests made was 79%; in 1915 the total number of arrests was 1,074, from which 848 convictions were had, while in 1916 only 613 arrests were made, from which 487 convictions resulted. It will be seen from these figures that the number of arrests in 1916 was barely 60% of those in 1915—a marked decrease. From the 848 convictions in 1915 the total fines collected was only \$7,647.45. Of these 848 convictions obtained 651 were in Western Washington and 197 in Eastern Washington. Of the 487 convictions obtained in 1916—286 were in Western Washington and 201 in Eastern Washington. More persons were fishing without a license than for any other violation of the Code; the next largest number of violators were those shooting water fowl after sunset; this was closely followed by those catching fish of less than 6 inches in length. Fourth on the list of the greatest number of violators were those who hunted during the closed season. The violations of the above mentioned sections of the Code in their respective order follows:

In 1915 the total amount of receipts in the County Game Fund was \$120,823.93; of this amount the total receipts from Western Washington was \$75,298.94, and from Eastern Washington, \$45,524.99. In the year 1916 Western Washington receipts were \$71,696.64, and Eastern Washington, \$46,023.34—a total of \$117,719.98.

At the close of 1916 there was on hand in the Game Fund of all the counties in the State \$37,069.05, of this amount there was on hand in the Western Washington counties, \$19,741.94, and Eastern Washington, \$17,327.11.

From a financial point of view the cash balance in the County Game Fund, taken as a whole, was most satisfactory, while, when it be considered that this money is raised for the purpose of restocking and replenishing the game and game fish supplies, as well as protecting it by law enforcement, it is seriously to be questioned if it is good policy to permit moneys to accumulate in these funds. My own judgment is that the moneys raised from the sportsmen of the State from hunting and fishing privileges should be expended in the rearing of game fish, game birds, and game animals, or in their purchase and liberation, rather than keep it on hand merely for the purpose of accumulating a healthy Game Fund. In short, each year sees its toll taken of our game and game fish and the purpose in raising the money by our license system is to replenish the supply thus made use of.

The meat supply furnished by our game fish, game birds, and game animals lessens the demand to just that extent upon our domestic supply.

The receipts of the State Game Funds during 1915 were \$27,803.98, and in 1916, \$23,456.26—the total for the two years being \$51,260.24.

At the beginning of 1915 there was a balance in the State Game Fund of \$25,882.48.

I desire to recommend to the 1917 Legislature that the moneys in the State Game Fund be expended for the purposes for which they are derived. I trust that the Legislature will see fit to do this, for if it does, it means that we will have a State Game Farm and additional fish hatcheries.

Decrease in Sharp Tailed Grouse.

(Western Prairie Chicken)

The Sharp Tailed Grouse (Western Prairie Chicken) continues to decrease in those districts, where formerly they were so plentiful. Those counties in the State, which are fortunate and still possess them, are Okanogan and Ferry, where there still remains a good many hundreds of these birds. Walla Walla, Whitman, Spokane, Asotin, Garfield, Columbia, Lincoln, Ferry and Stevens at one time boasted of their great Prairie Chicken shooting, but as the soil has come to be more extensively tilled each year, the nesting places of the birds have been broken up and they have been driven to small patches of scab land, which is becoming smaller in quantity each year. It is claimed by some that the disappearance of the bird has been hastened to some extent by the action of the farmer in his attempt to kill ground squirrels which were destroying his crops. In order to do this, poison was put out, which unfortunately is destructive alike to the game bird as well as the ground squirrel.

Ducks Increase.

From best information at hand, it would seem as though the water fowl have slightly increased during the past two years. There is no data upon which to base such a statement except reports and observations. Undoubtedly our State Laws have been of great assistance in bringing about this condition. The Federal Migratory Bird Act, intended to assist, has been practically a dead letter on our statute books. The United States District Attorney has been instructed not to institute prosecutions for the violations of its terms until such time as its constitutionality shall have been passed upon by the Supreme Court. This decision has not been forthcoming and the sponsors for this law are undoubtedly responsible for the action of the Government of the United States and the Dominion of Canada in making a treaty which seeks to accomplish the same thing as was desired by securing the enactment of this law.


Hungarian Partridge Multiplies.

The Hungarian Partridge, imported from Europe and liberated in a number of the counties of this State, are thriving so well and multiplying so rapidly that they are destined to become one of the leading game birds in certain of the counties which seem peculiarly adaptable. The climate of most of the Eastern Washington counties seems to suit them particularly well, while in some of the Western Washington counties, particularly Whatcom, they are doing very nicely indeed. They seem to stand our Eastern Washington winters much better than our average game birds and the deep snows of 1915 and 1916 apparently had little ill effect upon them. They were found frequently working under the snow and scratching it away to reach the stubble fields. In the fall of the year stubble fields seem to be their preferable feeding grounds, where they feed on waste grain, weed seeds and insects. Very little complaint has been made relative to their depredations, while considerable praise has come from farmers and gardeners in their behalf.

The birds seem to have a wonderful vitality and the shipments, which have come from the far Eastern States, have not averaged a greater loss than 2% in transit, and this loss is attributable to neglect in supplying them with feed and water by those charged with their care enroute.

They are very prolific—hatching two or three broods per season and as many as 27 eggs have been found in one nest, with practically every egg hatching.

This State has the distinction of being the first one in the Union to declare open season on Hungarian Partridge, which has had such a favorable increase since it was first stocked that the 1915 Legislature permitted their shooting in Spokane and Kittitas counties. The Game Wardens of these counties claim that after two seasons of shooting the birds have shown no decrease, but on the contrary a considerable increase. They are particularly favored by the sportsmen, demanding a quick eye and a trained touch on the trigger to bring them to bag, at times flushing wild and again lying close.

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Nest Protection.

An effective method of nest protection of our game birds is the offering of rewards to the farmer boy for the nests about to be uncovered in agricultural operations. Some of the counties have offered a reward of \$3 to any person reporting any Hungarian Partridge or Sharp Tailed Grouse nests upon ground about to be plowed. The report being received, the County Game Warden is sent to inspect the nest and to see to it that it is not destroyed by the plowman.
