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A Word From the Pastor

When I was living in Iowa, I met a woman who was connected to a ministry in Haiti. Shortly before I moved to Wisconsin, she made the decision to move to Haiti to do ministry there. Periodically, I receive group emails from her in which she updates her friends on how things are going. After the earthquake in Haiti on August 18th, I checked my email each day waiting to hear that she was okay. A few days later, she sent her "Hugs from Haiti" group an update. She was okay. The earthquake's epicenter was four hours away, so there was not damage near her. She felt the quake and ran outside. She said the earth rolled like ocean waves, and the gate of the guest house trembled. Imagine what it must have been like near the epicenter if that's how the quake was experienced 4 hours away! She sent several pictures from people she knows who work and live in the affected part of Haiti and urged us to pray for the "humongous suffering" going on right now in Haiti and Afghanistan. Since that email I have been thinking about her words, humongous suffering.

It was hard to look at the pictures from Haiti. They were images of total destruction, death, sorrow, and need. As I went to my next task, it felt strange to turn immediately to everyday work and other emails. I wondered what I should be thinking, feeling, and doing. There is humongous suffering in the world. What should we do? In my conversations with all of you, I hear many of you asking that same question. I hear you struggling with how to respond to the suffering in the world. When the humongous suffering in the world leaves us with questions about how we should respond, could it be that God is putting the questions in our hearts? Of course, we can always pray, but prayer can become a way of avoiding action, a quick solution for finding relief from our own guilt. We think, "The suffering is just so overwhelming, and there's nothing else I can do. At least I prayed. I can stop thinking about it now."

In addition to praying that God would alleviate the suffering, we can ask God to help answer our question of how to respond. Maybe the answer is simply to learn more about the situation by reading and seeking out information. Maybe the answer is to give a donation to Lutheran World Relief. Maybe the answer is that even though you feel you cannot do something for people in Haiti, God is calling you to help alleviate the suffering of someone here. There is humongous suffering, and there are no easy answers to explain it away. By his death on the cross, Jesus comes near to all who suffer, and after his time of suffering he rose from the dead. This is the mystery and the hope of our faith. We don't have any easy answers. Don't rush to close the questions that arise when you feel a connection to others who are suffering. We are people of the cross, people of questions, people of hope because of Jesus. Continue to ask questions. God gave you your prayerful questions. The questions that arise in your heart in response to suffering are an open place for God to enter, not just your life, but the lives of others too.

Orange Banner to Remember the Children of Kamloops School

Included in this month's newsletter is a letter sent to the ELCA from the American Indian Alaska Native Association requesting that ELCA congregations hang orange banners in their sanctuaries for 225 days to remember the indigenous children whose bodies were recently discovered in mass graves at Canadian residential schools. The high school students who attended the mission trip to the Leech Lake Reservation learned about the harmful impacts of residential schools. While on the trip, our group met an eighty-year-old woman who had experienced abuse in a Catholic residential school, and she shared her story with us. Please take time to read the letter. Carol Frederick has designed a banner for us to hang in the sanctuary.

A Message From the Council

Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

It has been a busy couple of months for the council and me. In July, we laid the groundwork for repairs to the bell tower and the drain on the flat roof on the front of the church. At a Congregational meeting held after worship on August 8th, the congregation voted to approve the repairs as submitted by the council and approved by the finance committee. Barring any large or unforeseen problems, the cost of the repairs is \$52,000. We are hoping that the work can be done yet this fall. We have begun accepting special donations for these repairs and have started a fundraising campaign. This project is an idea from Beth Frederick and will be talked about further in this newsletter.

Over the years, this congregation has been faced with many large repairs and replacements, in addition to the building of the Fellowship Hall. As a group, we have always found the strength and means to fund these projects and we pray this will be no different.

Anyone driving into the parking lot will notice that part of the large tree in the corner is missing. It was blown down in a windstorm a couple of weeks ago. We have decided to remove the rest of the tree as a precaution to any future damage or injury. This will be done soon by a local tree service. Once the tree has been removed, we will make the necessary repairs to the fencing. Materials have already been purchased for these repairs.

Looking forward, we need to begin talking about council members for next year and beyond. As council sits right now, we are one member short due to the family relocating. In January, the terms of three current members will expire. That means we will be needing four people to come forward and be willing to sit on council. I am putting this out now; not to give more time to think of all the reasons not to be on council, but to think of a few reasons you should. Start thinking now. Pray about it, talk about it, ask about it. For me it has been a great experience. I have learned a lot. Not only about how the church works, how the council works, but also me as a person.

Working with the council as a group is very rewarding when you see the work that is done and can be done.



Help Christ Lutheran Fix the Bricks!



Our beautiful old bell tower is in need of repair. The bricks are deteriorating. Not fixing them soon will result in further damage to the building and could create a safety hazard as bricks begin to fall. Doing this project well so that it will last for years to come is the goal. It's a lofty goal, which will cost about \$52,000 once the project is completed. Our little church has always come through during times of need, and we have faith that this project can be a "towering" success!

If you want to help your church fix the bricks, you can! In an attempt to raise funds for the brick project, we should 'fill the envelopes'. We have placed 325 numbered envelopes on the bulletin board in the fellowship hall. Each envelope represents the dollar amount of donation made to the project. For example, if a person wants to donate three dollars, they can choose the #3 envelope, or the #1 and #2 envelopes.

When donating, be sure to include your name on the envelope if you want a receipt for your records. Your donations can be mailed to the church, PO Box 346, Sharon WI 53585. You can also drop your donation in the offering plate. If you do not have an envelope, we will pull envelopes to match your donation. When all the envelopes have been claimed and filled with the appropriate dollar amount, we will have collected \$52,975.00. This is an easy and private method to collect funds to preserve our church building.

AMERICAN INDIAN ALASKA NATIVE LUTHERAN ASSOCIATION

July 23, 2021

Greetings in the name of our Creator, in the name of Jesus, Savior of all. We speak to you all today on behalf of the Indigenous people throughout North Americas. We come with sad hearts at the news of 215+ children of the Kamloops Residential School whose remains were recently found in a mass grave and of the children of the Rosebud Sioux whose bodies were returned to their homeland this past week. They are being remembered by many by the color orange.

The color orange is symbolic and came from the inspiration of a survivor of that era, Phyllis Webstad, who stated that when she was a 6-year-old girl arriving at a residential boarding school, she was stripped of her clothes which included a new orange t-shirt her grandmother had gifted her and was never given back. The orange shirt/color now symbolizes how the church and the schools they administered took away the Indigenous identity of the children in their care.

In honor and memory of the children of the First Nations people and of our Native children who never made it home, and for those still living the nightmare imposed on them as children of Canada and the United States we humbly ask our brothers and sisters of the church to hang an orange banner in the sanctuaries of your churches for 225 days. In remembrance and lament of each child that was thrown into those graves, and those yet to be discovered we honor each of their lives.

Please grieve with us and remember us as the Indigenous people of this land who are going through a very sad and heartbreaking time in our collective psyche. We invite all our Christian brothers and sisters, in solidarity with us, to honor all our First Nations and our Native children that never made it out of residential schools by hanging an orange banner for 225 days.

We now call on the Church to acknowledge and confess its complicity in all the atrocities committed against the Indigenous peoples of North America and throughout the world where western Christianity colonized Indigenous peoples. Please stand in partnership with us for the children.

The true history of the western church in America has been participation in acts of ethnic cleansing, genocide through warfare including biological and chemical, sterilization, depletion of our main food source, the taking of land and resources for personal gains. We ask you, the ELCA Church and Bishops Church leaders and congregations to support our people in remembering the children.

Many Tribal nations have had church groups offer apologies on behalf of their ancestors, which is well and good, but that only serves to assuage any feelings of guilt or shame for them and does not bring about true repentance. So in light of these past gestures we call upon the churches serving in the United States to advocate the U.S. Government to fully acknowledge all the atrocities it has committed against the indigenous peoples of this land now known as the United States of America and for the future of Christianity in Indian Country.
