



A matter of perspective

Pastor and author T.D. Jakes tells of visiting a community in Africa where a woman from the local church welcomed him into her small home. How often we view rain as an annoyance, complicating our day and depressing our mood. 
This side of heaven

July brings long, hot summer days, fireworks, barbecues, picnics, school and family vacations. But, most of all, it brings us together to celebrate the one thing that makes us all proud to be an American, enjoying our hard fought and won freedoms. Each year, as our nation celebrates the Fourth of July or Independence Day, when the Colonies regarding themselves as thirteen newly independent sovereign states at war with and against British rule, at the Continental Congress, declared their independence with these words (Wikipedia):

We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights, that among these are Life, _iberty and the pursuit of Happiness. (Declaration of Independence - July 4, 1776).

These words from the preamble of the Declaration of Independence were written over 200 years ago, but they still resonate with Americans everywhere. However, for far too many people they are aspirational at best and unfulfilled at worse given the recent rise in lack of civility, partisan rancor, discrimination, senseless violence, terrorism and intolerance that threatens our freedom and way of life.

Another great American, President Franklin D. Roosevelt, gave an address in 1941 that is known as his famous "Four Freedoms" State of the Union Speech, when America was about to enter into World War II. "Roosevelt insisted that people in all nations of the world shared Americans' entitlement to four freedoms: the freedom of speech and expression, the freedom to worship God in his own way, freedom from want and freedom from fear." I contend that all of these freedoms can be summarized in the greatest freedom of all! In the Gospel of John, Jesus, the Great Liberator, said "if the Son therefore shall make you free, ye shall be free indeed." (John 8:36). He is not concerned with whether we are first, second or third generation Americans, or whether we are recent immigrants, or the sons and daughters of ammigrants, or siaves. For, God has no respect of persons and we are one in Christ Jesus.

As we prepare to celebrate our nation's Independence Day, let us remember to give thanks and praise to Jesus first and foremost for purchasing our freedom from sin by the shedding of his precious blood.
