ATE HANKEY, the daughter of a prosperous British banker, grew up in a stylish London suburb. She started a Bible class for girls in her neighborhood, and then, when she was only eighteen, Hankey went to London to teach a Bible class of "factory girls." In her twenties, she started other Bible classes for factory girls.

When she was in her early thirties, Kate Hankey became seriously ill. Doctors said she needed a year of bed rest. She was forbidden to teach her Bible classes for twelve months. During her long, slow recovery, she wrote two lengthy poems. The first, at the beginning of her convalescence, later became the hymn "Tell Me the Old, Old Story." The second, written ten months later, became "I Love to Tell the Story."

After ten months she felt strong enough to leave her bed. She soon returned to her Bible classes in London and continued teaching for many years. When she became too old to teach the factory girls regularly, she started a prison ministry in London—even then she continued to tell the story of Jesus.

While they were gathered in Jerusalem to celebrate the Jewish festival of Pentecost, the disciples saw flames among and on them, heard a rushing wind and began talking in many languages. As a result, the disciples were able to share the good news of Jesus in the native tongues of all the pilgrims assembled in the city.

Even today, the power of the Holy Spirit fuels the "flame" that ignites Christians' outreach efforts. Only by the Spirit's power can we know Christ and make him known throughout the goal.

Poet William Blake (1757-1827), who's been described as a passionate, Pentecost kind of person, wrote this poem about the Spirit's power:

Following Jesus' Example: Ask Questions

The culture of rage has reached new heights. A significant part of our society is now aggressively attacking those who hold a biblical worldview. But we're called to the difficult challenge of being faithful to Jesus and His Word while defusing conflict when we can. Paul says in Romans, "If possible, so far as it depends on you, live peaceably with all" (12:18 ESV).

So how can we face hostility without losing our cool? After all, it's human nature to react to an angry comment with a defensive answer. We need to be Spirit controlled, but there's also a practical strategy we can implement. We can follow Jesus' example of asking questions. We know He used this strategy effectively, but it's easy to forget to apply it because we're immersed in a culture that places little value in this approach. We're trained to give answers, not ask questions.

Questions work well because they can:

- Calm and disarm a person and redirect an attack into a conversation. "A gentle answer turns away wrath, but a harsh word stirs up anger" (Prov. 15:1 NIV).
- Get to the heart of a matter quickly.
- Reveal blind spots and make truth resonate.
- Reinforce the Holy Spirit's conviction by helping people recognize truth for themselves.

If we're criticized for our position on an issue, we could recite a list of reasons for our beliefs, but that will likely just elicit rebuttals and counter rebuttals. Or we could respond with a simple question: Whose thought on this topic matters most? Yours, mine, or God's? (Unless the person is an atheist, it would be hard to avoid the obvious answer that God's is most important.)

The next question follows naturally, "So what does God say about the issue?," which provides an opportunity to point out what Scripture says. Of course, there's a chance the person will reject the Bible as the Word of God, but at least then the discussion focuses on what God says rather than winning an argument.

Jesus understood human nature, and we would be wise to follow His lead in lowering walls by asking questions. Now more than ever, we need to be able to engage people civilly to communicate trutte
