What is the

South Central Chapter Pennsylvania Sports Hall of Fame

The South Central Chapter of the Pennsylvania Sports Hall of Fame was founded at the urging of William "Bill" Minnick, former head football coach at Shippensburg High School and ardent sports enthusiast in this area. Enlisting the aid of like minded individuals from Carlisle, Chambersburg, Shippensburg and Waynesboro areas, an initial organizational meeting was held in October, 1979, at the University Inn, Shippensburg, Pennsylvania.

Today, the chapter has a membership of 137 dues paying members. A format for meetings has been established to include chapter activities, speakers, films, ect. The chapter holds an annual induction of individuals to the areas Hall of Fame as well as recommendations for the admission to the Pennsylvania State Hall of Fame. The chapter inducted its inaugural group into the Hall of Fame on December 4, 1980.

The primary purpose for the chapter's existence is to grant recognition to individuals from the respective communities whose accomplishments in the area of sports and athletics makes them worthy by admission to the South Central Hall of Fame Chapter. By this action, each individual may then be selected as a candidate for the Pennsylvania State Hall of Fame.

Through its meetings, the Chapter hopes to present a variety of programs to interest and entertain its members, to add to their knowledge and appreciation of all sports, and to sustain their active participation in the chapter. The South Central Chapter is proud that since 2001 it has been able to award more than \$51,000 in scholarship funding to local area high school athletes. The chapter's goal is to promote good will, fellowship and mutual respect among the athletes and sports fans in its communities.

2024 Inductee

William Paul "Bill" Brown

A 1969 graduate of Cumberland Valley High School, Bill Brown competed in football, wrestling and baseball. A three-year letter winner in football, Brown displayed his versatility as an offensive lineman, fullback and linebacker. In 1968, he was one of 20 high school gridders to win the Golden Helmet Award which was a coaches selection awarded to the football MVP of each school. At 6-2, 200 pounds his senior year, Brown was also nominated as a member of the Big 33 Football team. In wrestling, Brown was a varsity starter at 180, captured the Harrisburg Area Division 1 title at that

weight and finished his sophomore season with a 17-4-1 record. As a catcher on the Eagles' baseball team, Brown batted .384 in 1967. In 1997, Brown was inducted into the Cumberland Valley Football Hall of Fame as a member of the first group to be so honored.

After high school, Brown entered Princeton University where he quickly established himself as a key part of the Tiger's squad. He was a three-year varsity starter on the offensive line as a tackle and guard. He started every game in his career at Old Nassau, and earned All-Ivy, All-East and All-American Honorable Mention honors. In the fall of his senior year, received the coveted Poe Cup Award from the Princeton University Council of Athletics "Awarded to that member of the Princeton football team of good moral character, who, during the season in addition to proving himself a player of ability, has best exemplified the following traits and characteristics: Loyalty and devotion to Princeton's football interests, courage, manliness, self--control and modesty, perseverance and determination under discouraging conditions, observance of the rules of the game and fairness towards opponents." Brown was also recently selected as one of 150 outstanding football players for Princeton University's 150th Anniversary All Star Team.

After he graduated from Princeton with a B.S. in Civil and Structural Engineering, Brown became a senior project engineer for Modjeski & Masters in Mechanicsburg. He later was the Senior Vice President with Dewberry in Fairfax, Virginia and Carlisle.

Brown coached Little League for Red Land from 1983-87 and founded the first ever T-Ball tournament. He was also instrumental in the start up of the Red Land Soccer Association. Brown retired in 2019, and for many years has been active in community,

civic and volunteer roles including Maranatha, the Cumberland Valley Football Alumni Association, the Mayapple HOA and Condo Association, South Middleton Sewer Authority, the Republican Committee and the South-Central Chapter of the Pennsylvania Sports Hall of Fame.

Brown and his wife Carol are the proud parents of sons Michael and Jeremy, and enjoy spending time with them, their daughters-in-law Tracey and Lauren, as well as four grandchildren: Mason, Cailyn, Olive and Keegan.

Norbert "Norbie" Danz

Norbert "Norbie" Danz was a 1951 Lancaster Catholic High School graduate who would go on to play football at George Washington University where he was a two-way starter and also a team captain. He also competed in track and field and basketball.

His experience at the collegiate level would eventually translate to a hall of fame career as a head coach. After serving three years in the United States Air Force, a long and successful

road began as an educator and coach at Lebanon Catholic High School when Danz led the Beavers to three Tri-County championships from 1959 to 1968. While compiling a 68-26-3 record, one of his Lebanon Catholic teams went undefeated -- which was a first by a Lebanon County football team.

At the helm of Cedar Crest High School from 1972-75 and 1986-95, his Falcon teams garnered two Lancaster-Lebanon League Section I Championships. At McCaskey High School from 1976-85, his Red Tornado teams went 54-24 while earning three Section 1 Championships. With 220-140-8 overall career record, Danz is the winningest coach in Lebanon County football history. He is a member of the Pennsylvania Scholastic Football Coaches Hall of Fame and also the Lancaster County Sports Hall of Fame.

Danz passed away at age 88 in 2021 and is survived by his wife Delores, grown children Steve, Jeffrey, Linda, Laurie and Chris, nine grandchildren and nine great grandchildren.

As a guidance counselor, leader and coach, Norbie was greatly respected by his students, athletes and peers. Beyond the records and championships, his positive influence and impact on others' lives was far reaching and continues to this day.

Thomas "Tom" Gerhart

Born in Lebanon, PA, Thomas "Tom" Gerhart graduated from Cedar Crest High School with an eye towards the future in finance and football. He succeeded in both endeavors. At Cedar Crest, he was an All-County selection and played quarterback, running back and linebacker for the Falcons from 1980-83.

Initially a starting cornerback / free safety at Salem College in 1983, Gerhart transferred to Ohio University where he was a three-year letterman and outside linebacker for the Bobcats. Gerhart graduated from Ohio University with a Bachelor's degree in Finance.

In 1988-89, Gerhart signed as a free agent (strong / free safety and special teams) with the Philadelphia Eagles in the NFL and played through 1990. After a short stint with the Buffalo Bills, he returned to the Eagles for the 1992-93 season.


He also competed in the Canadian Football League (CFL) as a safety, a linebacker and on special teams with the Sacramento Gold Miners (1994), the San Antonio Texans (1995), the Hamilton Tiger Cats (1996) and Edmonton Eskimos (1998). In the World League of Football (WLAF) he was drafted by the Sacramento Surge and played strong and free safety in the 1991-92 seasons. He led the team in tackles and interceptions and was a member of the 1992 World League Champions. Gerhart also coached football at Cedar Crest High School for 10 years and three years at Lebanon Valley College.

In 2007, Gerhart earned the designation of Certified Financial Planner, CFP ® in addition to holding the Series 6, 63, and 7 Securities licenses and Life & Health Insurance. In 2008, he was chosen as the CLA Business Person of the Year. Tom resides in North Cornwall with his family and is the Founder and President of Gerhart Financial Services.

Randal "Randy" Parsons

Randall "Randy" Parsons graduated from Cumberland Valley High School in 1973 and left his mark as a multi-sport athlete in football, wrestling and track and field. After attending State College Area High School where he competed in all three sports, Parsons transferred to Cumberland Valley where he further excelled in his final two years of high school. In his



senior year for the Eagles, the two-way standout was named MVP in football where he played guard and linebacker. Parsons also earned Conference All-Star honors. He wrestled for the Eagles in the 180-pound weight class and then competed in Track and Field where he was the MVP and excelled in the 330-yard intermediate hurdles, the 120-yard-high hurdles and relays. Off the playing field, Parsons was also an Eagle Scout and attended American Legion Keystone Boys State twice.

When he entered Lycoming College, Parsons never slowed down as he earned varsity letters in all four years in Football, Wrestling and Track and Field. He was the only person in Lycoming's history to earn 12 varsity letters. A three-time, All-Middle Atlantic Conference (MAC) Linebacker, Parsons led the Warriors in tackles for three years. In one sports article, it was noted: "Parsons, a senior, was cited for this outstanding performance in the 17-10 win over Upsala when he was instrumental in holding the Vikings ground game to minus 8 yards. He participated in 16 tackles and blocked an Upsala punt to set up the first Lycoming score."

In wrestling, Parsons won the MAC 190-pound weight class title in 1977 as the Warriors also won the MAC team title – their first in 15 years. He also was a two-time qualifier for the NCAA Division III Nationals. On the track, Parsons was a consistent placer in meets. Also in 1977, he won the Lycoming Tomahawk Award for Outstanding Male Athlete.

After graduation from Lycoming in 1977, Parsons played semi-professional football for the Chambersburg Cardinals when they embarked on a winning streak that spanned seven years and 72 consecutive, regular season games. Parsons then began coaching and, in 1981-82, he was an Acting Deputy Director for the Cuban – Haitian Task Force where he had a leadership role in developing many sports programs in the refugee camps. Over an 18-month period in Texas and Arkansas, Parsons worked in two Cuban refugee camps and managed the Cuban Boxing team as a coach and interpreter. Inside the ring, he also officiated as a referee.

Parsons then transferred to the Atlanta Federal Penitentiary as a Contract Sports Specialist working with the Cuban Detainees. During his 30-year career working for the Department of Justice, he held various positions, yet continued to give back to athletics. He served as a volunteer in the Pan American Games and in other, international athletic competitions including four Olympic Games. He also hosted international athletes and sports teams that competed in the United States, like the World Amateur Baseball Tournament in 1990 and the USA vs. Russia Boxing Exhibition. A member of the Lycoming Athletics Hall of Fame and the Cumberland Valley High School Football Hall of Fame, Parsons retired in 2012 and resides in Georgia. He attended the recent Paris Olympics, making it 12 Olympic Games that he has attended --

11 of them with his son Kenny. Parsons has also given back to the community and organizations in a lighter role for 40 years, making people of all ages smile --as Santa Claus -- including 20 of those years as a professional Santa.

Kambria Rich

Kambria (Riggins) Rich began her storied soccer career playing for FC Delco, Conshohocken and Parkland Area Soccer Club. A starter on the Eastern, PA team in the Olympic Development Program (ages 12-18), Rich was selected for the U14 Region 1 team and played for that squad until the age of 18. During her tenure there, the team won two regional championships and competed twice in the national championships.

At Penn Manor High School in Millersville, PA, her career jumped to another level as she scored 83 goals and had 47 assists by the time she graduated in 2002. Missing most of her freshman year due to injury, she rebounded to become a Lancaster-Lebanon First Team All-Star from 2000-2002. Rich was also a Pennsylvania Soccer Coaches Association (PSCA) First Team All-State selection in 2000 and 2002. The leading goal scorer on the Penn Manor team that won the PIAA state co-championship in the spring of 2002, she scored the Comet's lone goal in the championship final. She was inducted into the Penn Manor Hall of Fame twice, first in 2007 as a member of the state championship team, and again in 2012 as an individual.

Heavily recruited by colleges and universities, Rich chose to attend West Virginia University on a full athletic scholarship. A defensive standout, she started 81 of 85 matches in her collegiate career, was named to the Big East All-Rookie Team in 2002 and helped lead the Mountaineers to a Big East Mid Atlantic Regular Season Championship in 2002. A member of the Athletic Director's Academic Honor Roll, in 2003 she played a key role in the team's first ever NCAA Sweet 16 appearance. Rich's senior year included a host of accomplishments that included NSCAA 2nd Team All Region, Soccer Buzz 2nd Team All-Region, 3rd Team All-Big East, Team Captain and Team Most Defensive Player Award.

Rich graduated from WVU in 2006 with a B.S. in Exercise Physiology and later earned her R.N. and B.S.N. degrees from Lancaster General Hospital School of Nursing. She is married to Matt Rich and is the proud mom of daughters, Zoe and Olivia.
