This past holiday really showed me the benefits of the NCFM program. Because one of the brothers, James Benoy, MasterLife Ministry, and the Field Ministers sponsored a special event for everyone in the dorm. I got "caught up" in the midst of it all. I am convinced, these guys will bring some positivity to this prison environment. With the world with

The Day That I Went Away By Durwood "Disco" Thorpe

On Thursday December 24, 2020, I left Nash

Correctional for a whole day! This was one of the most extraordinary days I've had locked up in a while. Before my mom died back in 2015, she made sure that she would come see me every week. Those visits were good, healthy, and needed. Since she passed away, a day is just a day. Then COVID-19 came and made days worse than what they were. Gloom set in, frustration set in, tension was at its highest.

But for 24 hours, that just went away. Keep in mind that I'm a Muslim and in my religion, Islam, we don't celebrate Christmas. I celebrated a day away from Nash, away from COVID-19, away from all problems. The seminary school (James Benoy and others) for the past 4 years have gotten together and created a full day of activities for the guys in their block to enjoy. I had heard about this project in the past and how everyone had so much fun for that one day. So now, for the first time, I got to experience it firsthand. And it was off the chain (in simple terms - it was great). I got a chance to play Bingo, a game that I had not played in ages. I got to play Trivia Challenge. This game was introduced to Dash by Caddell Kivett and Mark Mercer. Then there was a Talent Show afterwards in which the guys showed off their talents, be it singing, rapping, dancing, speaking spoken word or two testimonials that had guys (yes us tough guys) shedding tears. To end the night, there was like an award show that recognize guys for their actions in an everyday setting. I even recognized (along with Fred Washington) as being that wise old men that would give you a good advice if need be.

However, what really got close to my heart, was the last presentation of the night. James Benoy presented me with his 15-year-old Army hat. We both collect hats that we have done time with (mine an old hat of 22 years). These hats are monumental, because first, they don't issue them anymore and secondly, it just something about old hats that me and Benoy just never could give up. Oh, and

for the record, his is in way better shape than mine.

So, you say, what's so special about this day? This day was special because everything, and I do mean everything, was organized by the guys on the block (no staff involved). If it wasn't for count time and chow call, you wouldn't even know they were there. It was a wonderful experience for me. Thank you Benoy, Thank you Kivett, Thank you Mercer, Thank you everyone who had a hand in this project (those who helped along the way) for a wonderful day away from Nash.

"Take That", Prison! By Caddell "Monty" Kivett



For the last four years, on Christmas eve, I've been blessed to be part of something that has brought joy, inspired

change, built bonds between men with diverse backgrounds and established a new tradition right here at Nash Correctional. The new tradition: all-day block party for 80 men.

This started in 2017 when the inaugural class of the North Carolina Field Minister Program arrived at Nash from different prisons across the state. The men of the program had signed on, seeking a 4-year degree from the newly conceived prison Bible college, the only one of its kind in the southeast.

Among those men was James Benoy, and with him, he brought a Christmas Eve celebration – a tradition he had established years before as a part of a MasterLife discipleship program. At Nash, James recruited men for different tasks during the celebration. Volunteers would decorate, cook, serve food, snacks, and drinks, give out prizes and perform other duties – a wide range of ways to be involved in service of their fellow men. When James told me there would-be trivia involved, I found where I fit in.

Anthony Smith also arrived at Nash about four years ago. He too is a student in the Field Minister Program. Anthony is an

upcoming playwright who uses his story crafting ability to spread a positive message of love and unity. He has written several plays since arriving at Nash, productions performed for the entire camp. As well, he has been a major contributor to the last four years of Christmas Eve block parties. Anthony's contribution? He's hosted an all-inclusive talent show where men of the block could share their talents, passions, appreciation, and aspirations with others. Some men sang, while others danced, and some simply shared what was on their hearts. But each man who stood in front of their peers - shared themselves. Anthony would come to call this segment the Christmas Café Talent Show.

So, here is a typical Christmas Eve rundown: Early in the morning men would decorate the block and tables with holiday décor. A team assigned to cooking would prepare a meal for the entire block. Free coffee and snacks would be available all day, at a table setup near the microwave. Also, at noon, drawings for prizes started, and that went on every 30 minutes, lasting all day. Bingo cranked up next with a wide range of prizes for those who took part. This year's bingo was called DeLah (Mr. Pitter) and James Benoy and was the first example of the inclusiveness of the day. On Christmas Eve at Nash, men came out of the woodwork to get involved and serve their fellow man! Bingo was hugely popular, and we only took a break to eat and hand out drawing prizes.

After dinner (what the camp served) we drew names for random seating for the remainder of the day's events. Over the years we've discovered that random seating found guys that might never get to know each other, now seated together to work as a team, for the team Trivia and Games, which would start soon.

However, before the team games could start T-Black (Jamaar Springs) had a message to share. With everyone's rapt attention he told the Christmas story (not the one with Ralphie, not the one with Santa) about the birth of our Savior, Jesus Christ. T-Black made it clear, to enter the Kingdom simply confess with your mouth. Along with the message, the team of cooks distributed the good meal: burritos!

Now, with diverse teams in place, it was time for Trivia and games. For the last 3 years I have hosted this team event, along with James Benoy keeping score and announcing challenges. But this year we added a new host Mark Mercer. With

James probably moving to another camp after his upcoming graduation, it's important that we get new men involved to carry on this tradition. This is where Mark comes in, and of course, the upcoming classes of the Field Minister Program.

Now, Trivia is more than just trivia. Over the years we've had a push up contest, wall squat contest, and every year each team gets to sing a Christmas favorite as well as Bible drills (looking up Bible verses and reading them). Each of these along with answering questions of course, will earn points for your team. In the end, we have a Final Question - Jeopardy Style where you can wager your earned points for a chance to increase your score. The team with the most points wins and the game is always competitive, and always close. And, most importantly, men have created bonds, smiling faces light up the room, and prison is not on anyone's mind!

Next up, the *Christmas Café Talent Show*. This year we saw dancing, popping, rapping, spoken word, singing, crooning, stand-up comedy, innovation, imagination, and inspiration. Men let their guard down and opened their hearts to each other! This is how we build positive relationships that last. As Anthony Smith moves on after graduation, who will step up to fill his shoes for the years to come?

Nearing the end of what had already proven an incredible day of fun and fellowship, this year we added one more feature that I'm sure will become part of the yearly tradition: Peer Recognition Awards. A survey was passed out and you could vote on one of your block mates to be recognized in several categories. As chosen by their peers, this year's awards went as follows: "The Positive Mental Attitude Award" to Brother Stephan Goode, "The Word is Bond Award" for being trustworthy went to Brother Uri Small. "Your Set Bro", for workout ethic to our Bingo host, DeLah. "The OG Hustler" the hardest working man in the block - to Anthony "Red" Butler. Two men shared "The Wise Old Owl Award", Brother Fred Washington and Durwood "Disco" Thorpe. "The Funniest Guy" on the block is Oso. And, finally, "The Heart of Service Award" rightfully went to our own, James Benoy.

This capped off the year's Christmas Eve, all-inclusive holiday celebration. For 4 years running men have escaped their prison troubles and prison cells. Every year I've heard two things from new participants: "I've been locked up for 20

years and have never had a Christmas like that!" and "I forgot I was in prison." Take that, prison!

Celebrations like this don't pay for themselves, and while it is definitely NOT about the money, it's important to acknowledge where the prizes, food, and gifts come from. MasterLife, including Travis in Oklahoma, along with exincarcerated men who are also part of MasterLife, donated the funds for the prizes and gift boxes given away throughout the day. This includes the coffee and cookies available for free all day.

Kyle Triplett pulled his resources – some of which came off his own account – to provide the burrito meal for all who participated. Some additional gifts were provided – mostly to indigent men – from Pine Grove Methodist Church in Winston Salem, Scotland Neck Church, Church on the Rise, Lee, Scott, Jon, Carol, Cheryl, Debra, Harvey, Joaquin, Joyce, Lakisha, Maria, Michael, Miguel, Mike, Phyliss, Ralph, Robert, Tannera, Tony, Travis, Valerie, Walter, and Warren. These bags had food, snacks, and hygiene!

Finally, many men contributes their own money, and have no desire to be mentioned, but to everyone, mentioned by name or not – we thank you!

James and Anthony – it has been my pleasure to work with you these past four years. I've been blessed to be part of this. And, although COVID-19 kept us from giving this celebration for the entire camp as planned, I vow that next year, along with the rising seniors, we will get this done.

To the seniors of the Field Ministry Program – I have learned much from you over these four years. As the program has given you a reason to be the positive, loving, people of service that you men have proven to be, you've shown me how, and given me a reason to do the same!

To all the men who are no longer at Nash – veterans of our Christmas Eve – we are all with you in spirit during the special time, and throughout the year. Also, a special shout-out to Travis of MasterLife for all you do to facilitate the good news!

Overlooked: Even Now, Hope Exists

Even now, in the midst of a pandemic stretching around the globe, we had ourselves a Merry Little Christmas. Even now, in the midst of Unit One Code Red

Quarantine, we enjoyed a Merry Little Christmas. Even now, in the midst of sicknesses and canceled events. We flourished in our own Merry Little Christmas. We thank the financial providers, from both within and without the prison. We thank the planners, organizers, participants, and package donators for all they put in. above all, we Thank God, for without His goodness none of this would have been possible.

To my fellow brothers behind bars, I would like to point out a few points of Hope often overlooked in our telling of the Christmas story. Often, when we tell of the birth of Christ, we rush straight to Luke chapter 2. But in so doing, we miss much of spiritual benefit which proceeds. One example is the Song of Mary found in Luke 1:46-56. Notice in verse 48, Mary mentions her "low estate" (humble and poor) and also "all generations shall call me blessed". We as prisoners can relate to her "low estate", and when God performs miracles in our lives, we too are often called blessed. Likewise, in Matthew chapter 1, we often skip to verse 18 about the birth of Christ. Once again, we miss the hope in the genealogy of Christ. Ruth is found in His genealogy, and many know her story from the book of Ruth, yet most do not recall that as a Moabite, she was forbidden to enter the Assembly of the Lord (Deut. 23:3). Yet here she is. Matthew does not shy away from King David's sin, indeed he draws attention to it, by calling Solomon's mother, "wife of Uriah", instead of Bathsheba. King David coveted. committed adultery, then murder to hide his prior sins. Just prior to Ruth, Matthew lists Rahab, who we recognize as the prostitute from Jericho. Matthew's point is to show the reader that God works through men and women, Jew, and Gentile, and ves even us and our sinful pasts. So, let this Christmas and all future Christmases be a time of hope. Hope found in Christ Jesus, no matter who we are, where we are, or what we have done in days gone by. Hope. Even Now, Hope.

Gentle Instruction MasterLife Brothers

The Lord blessed me by coming into my life and forever changing the course I was headed in 2012. Many challenges immediately came in the way. Friends, family, and the convicts I was surrounded by didn't take a liking to my newfound

faith. Honestly, it felt as if hell was being unleashed on me. But the years in this walk taught me a lot. Christ has taught me a lot. The old friends vanished, and God blessed me with brothers in Christ. My old worldly girlfriend left me, and God placed a godly woman by my side. As far as family, my mother got saved, my sister has a child with one on the way after being told she'd have none, and I Meet new brothers everywhere I go. God is good!

All of my growth is attributed to God and the faithful men He has placed around me. Men willing to invest time into me and teach me the Word. Not being afraid to tell me what I need to hear versus what I'd like to hear. These men have been few though. You see, we live in a time where we are more concerned about feelings rather than Truth and Righteousness. So, we avoid speaking out on sinful behavior. Even worse in some cases it creates a Pharisee complex where some believers are so far above reproach that they bypass theses beaten and left for dead in a ditch. Yet there is a balance in all of this.

It is our Biblically given responsibility to "instruct those who oppose themselves" (2 Timothy 2:25). Now some people neglect the previous verses in this chapter and venture off the bark at the first sinning Christian they can find. But this approach is far from a means of edification and repentance on behalf of the person in the sinful state. Verse 24 of the same chapter says this, "And the servant of the Lord must not strive (be quarrelsome), but be gentle unto all men, apt to teach, patient,..."

Upon approaching any believer caught up in sin, we must first come with a spirit of meekness. Willing to be patient and above all seek godly edification in this endeavor. Ephesians 4 speaks much about this in our dealings with fellow brothers. We are each at different stages of our sanctification process. So, some things that come easy for others may not be so for someone else. Nevertheless, this instruction is imperative towards our growth.

Let's continue what Paul was telling Timothy.

V. 25-26 "In meekness instructing those that oppose themselves if God perhaps will give them repentance to the acknowledging of the Truth. And that they may recover themselves out of the snare

of the devil, who are taken captive by him at his will."

We must make it clear that "our" instruction doesn't change anyone. God is the one who changes us. Yet this doesn't take away from our responsibility to plant and water so He may give the increase.

An often response from one caught up in sin when one approaches them is anger and pride. Which may be why Paul expressed why one would have to be patient. I hear a lot of men throw out the common defensive phrase "The Bible says you can't judge me." Sadly, that is unbiblical. Even so my response is "I'm not here to judge, I'm here to encourage you." Love does cover a multitude of sins. Scripture says a lot about living a hold, blameless life. To the glory of God of course. But for some reason many stray away from that Truth. They choose to "overlook" sin or are simply too timid to approach someone laden in sin. But is not the purity of the Church of utmost importance? For when the world looks at us as the representatives of Christ, many times we are the cause for their opposition towards Christianity. I can't tell you how many times I've seen a new face in church in which faithful men have planted seeds in to only see them leave due to sinful behaviors the choir in congregation. They leave discouraged or offended dur to our disobedience. And this shouldn't be. Or to be turned away from church members who treat them with love behind church walls but neglect them in the yard where the real love and encouragement is needed.

In short, we need a Church family that cares. Who frowns upon sin but speaks out in meekness against it? Some people may still choose to remain rebellious and Scripture has a solution for that as well. But most of the time the flock is malnourished and stray away due to brothers (shepherds) who don't care.

I'd like to share a testimony on this.

Upon my arrival at Harnett, I was informed by a volunteer from the youth camp I began my time on that there was a fellow brother in Christ there at Harnett. I went searching for him and I've heard so much in the past of his love for Christ and leadership at previous prisons. I found that man, shortly after the gossip started. From "Christians" mostly. They told me of the "sins" this man was involved in, but I ignored them. I did as

compelled. I loved the brother. encouraged him, we worked out, fellowshipped, and prayed almost every day. And not once did I ever mention his sin. I prayed about it and God told me what I needed to do. Give him love, the Word, and be an example. Months passed by and this man was on fire again for Christ. The Lord's doing of course. But still some "Christians" were on the prowl trying to shame his name to me even after this man repented. It made me think how long this poor brother was neglected by the very men who were shaming him when they could have been encouraging him. This man before I left was leading a MasterLife course on the yard and I even got to see the brother give a deep testimony on the yard before I left. Praise God! Needless to say, what we do (or don't do) matters. What kind of believer are you? One who loves, instructs, and encourages? Or are you a timid individual, afraid to step out and do as you are called to do? Perhaps you are the Pharisee, too righteous to lend help in time of need? May I encourage you all to rise up and be the faithful stewards God called us to be. Gently of course. (2 Tim. 2:2)

MASTERING LIFE IN PRISON CHAPTER 4

If you have been following our newsletter closely, then you have probably come to the realization that we are publishing chapters from James Benoy book, *Mastering Life In Prison*. The introduction has been printed in our volume 10 issue. This includes his testimony, the history of MLM, Inc., and the purpose of MLM, Inc.

Chapter 1: "Change" was published in Volume 12. Chapter 2: "Strongholds and Worldviews" was published in Volume 13 and corrected in Volume 14. Chapter 3: "The Gospel" was published out of order in Volume 11. And now we are publishing Chapter 4: "Am I A Hypocrite?" in this Volume 15.

To recap where we have come from and where we are going in this book, Chapter 1 we examined the idea of "Change" and admitted that we desire change in our lives. Chapter 2 opened our eyes to the realization that something is blocking us from the change that we most need, which is Jesus. And what is blocking us is our belief system, my world view, my ideology concerning Christianity, God, and Jesus. We went on to understand that our belief system was developed by information that we received and believed, information taught to us by influential people. Then we came to the conclusion that information could be wrong. This leaves us with a faulty belief system. So, we were willing to re-examine the Gospel Message. Now, in Chapter 4, we will discuss an area that many Christians get "stuck" at. The question of the hypocrites.

Am I a Hypocrite?


Joe quit coming to church because he couldn't stop sinning—he thought he was a hypocrite. Over some years, Joe turned into a scoundrel of a man, the meanest man in the neighborhood; even his own family knew that he was a sorry rascal. One day the preacher came to his house and asked, "Joe, why don't you come on back to church sometime?" Joe responded, "preacher, I ain't gonna be no hypocrite, I'll come back to church when I get my life straightened out!" Well, Joe died. His family went to the preacher and said, "preacher, will you speak at Joe's

funeral? We don't have anything good that we can say about Joe." The preacher assured them, "I know just what to say." So, the service began, Joe's coffin was stretched out there in the church, the preacher got up and proceeded, "well folks, one good thing about ole Joe was he was a man of his word, he said that he would come to church when he got his life straightened out—here he is all straightened out!"

How many of you have ever felt like a hypocrite because of the sin in your life? Maybe when you were a new believer and first started going to church you would get out of church and do something or say something totally sinful. You tried to stop, but you failed time and time again. You began to think, "I must be a hypocrite." You are not alone! In fact, this issue might be a central reason for the decline in male attendance in the church today. Think about it for a moment: a man gets saved, begins reading the Bible, praying, and going to church; however, he cannot seem to "live out" his faith at home in front of his wife and children. He doesn't want to be a failure or hypocrite in front of his children, so in an attempt to save face he finds a reason to quit going to church. I believe the same thing happens behind these fences; men will get saved, begin reading, praying, attending church, they come back to the dorm and find themselves cussing, or arguing with the C.O., or watching a trashy TV program. They try to guit time and time again, but they cannot seem to get the victory. Meanwhile, "The Hammer" Christian is constantly condemning them and beating them with "the Bible says this, the Bible says that, I don't understand why you keep doing that stuff" On top of that, the prison's "Compromising Hustle-man Christian" comes to him saying, "don't listen to "Hammer" he'll beat you up; you're good man, you can use your "cheap grace card" and live like you want to, just don't forget to ask God to forgive you before you go to sleep at night." Finally, there is the "Spirit-filled isolated Christian", who would never associate with you until you prove yourself, that you are genuinely worthy of Christian status. What does this new believer do? He's tired of the hammer, he doesn't want to be the compromising hypocrite, and he cannot get the discipleship that he needs from "Spirit-filled Christian." So, he puts the Bible in the back of his locker and gets away from it all. His defense is "God know my heart" and like Joe and many of us, he affirms that he'll go back to church when he gets his life straightened out.

There is good news—You are not a hypocrite! However, you are in real war with a real enemy, an enemy who comes to kill, steal, and destroy. Kill you influence, steal your joy, and destroy your testimony. GI Joe always said, "knowing is half of the battle." The illustration below will provide enough Biblical truths to help you understand what is happening to you; so, you can get over the hump and confidently advance forward in this Spiritual war.

This presentation explains: the nature of the man that we were before Salvation (natural man, slave to sin), what happened to us as a result (separated from God), the nature we possess as Christians (Spirit-filled man, slave to righteousness), the war that exists between the two (war), and the solution that brings [victory] over sins in our lives.



The heart represents our life. The Bible describes the nature of the person that we were before Salvation as the "natural man." The natural man does not receive the things of the Spirit of God, for they

are foolishness to him; nor can he know them, because they are Spiritually discerned" (I Cor. 2:14). Furthermore, the "natural man" is a slave to sin and an enemy of God (Rom. 5:10, 6:20; Jam, 4:4). Before Salvation we love to do the things that our flesh desires. We live an "I-Centered-Life." An "I-Centered-Life is a self-centered life, which is equivalent to a sin-centered life. It is all about I, me, and my; what I want to make my life happy. This part of us is referred to as "the flesh." Our flesh is our master and we live accordingly. Some of the things the flesh demands of us go unnoticed, however, the flesh demands control as soon as we wake up in the morning. Every morning when we wake up the flesh begins to cry out for control: wash my face, brush my teeth, feed me; it demands food, coffee, the TV schedule, and the newspaper. Most of these things are not bad/sin, however, they demand our immediate attention and distract us from any inclination towards God. As we live out our lives, we pick up a variety of fleshly desires, cravings, and ideas that become dear to our heart. We live by what the big "I" wants. The Bible confronts us with the reality that the Icentered natural person is unsaved, enslaved to sin, and an enemy of God (Rom. 1: 18-21; 5:10, 6:16; Jam. 4:4).

"Now the works of the flesh are evident, which are: adultery, fornication, uncleanness, lewdness, idolatry sorcery, hatred, contentions, jealousies, outbursts of wrath, selfish ambitions, dissensions, heresies, envy, murders, drunkenness, revelries, and the like; of which I tell you beforehand, just as I also told *you* in time past, that those who **practice** such things will not inherit the kingdom of God" (Gal. 5: 19-21).

"For out of the heart proceed evil thoughts, murders, adulteries, fornications, thefts, false witness, blasphemies" (Matt. 15:19).




For we have spent enough of our past lifetime in doing the will of the Gentiles—when we walked in

lewdness, lusts. drunkenness, revelries, drinking parties, and abominable idolatries (I Pt. 4:3).

This was our life before we got saved: Icentered, sin-centered works of the flesh. Are you surprised to see family, career, and ministry in the heart of the sin-centered life? One may argue that they were "good people" who lived a selfless life. They may give examples of the good things they do or the sacrifice they make for their church, careers, and families. However, even these acts of self-sacrifice bring one a sense of selfgratification/self-fulfillment. They were done for self—not Jesus. The "I" is still in the center of this person's heart. Do you have anything that takes precedent over Jesus?

Needless to say, sin leads to prison. For some the prison is emotional, physical, and mental. However, for our context, sin led us to a literal prison. My sin led me to a physical prison of drug addiction and eventually to incarceration. Yet, although prison is a bad place to be, it helped me come to my senses.



Prison humbled me. Just as Jonah was trapped in the belly of the whale, I was trapped behind these bars. And like Jonah, it took me a few days before I broke down and cried out to God from my prison, Though I was broken and sick of myself, my mind continued to fight in agony. But finally, in my brokenness, I cried out to God from the depths of my soul. God, I am sorry, please forgive me, you can have my life, take this pain from me, and give me peace of mind.



Did I fix myself first? Did I get my life "straightened out" first? No, God forgave me, saved me, and put His Holy Spirit inside of my heart right in the middle of my broken mess. I became a Spirit-filled child of God at that very moment!

"But the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, longsuffering, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, self-control. Against such there is no law" (Gals 5:22-23).



The awesome feeling of newness is amazing; the love, the joy, and the peace that floods the soul is indescribable. Like a dream that you never want to wake up from, However, if one is not properly discipled/trained, it is difficult understanding how to maintain this feeling of a Christ-centered heart. This was the origin of Joe's problem; Joe thought that because he was a Christian now, that he would be able to stop struggling with sin. No one taught him what was going on inside of him, how to overcome, or how to maintain a Christcentered heart Joe never learned "what's next" in his Christian walk. Joe never understood that there was a war being waged inside of him, a war between his old behaviors and the new nature given to him by the Holy Spirit. As a result, he did not know how to appropriate the power to overcome.

The fleshly desires do not disappear when we get saved. There is a battle going on in our heart. The nature of the Holy Spirit of Jesus and our flesh. Think of it this way: if I died and I could give you my spirit, then you would have my personality and your own personality living inside the same heart, using this illustration for perspective. the Holy Spirit has a personality. "The fruit [personality] of the Spirit is: love, joy, peace, longsuffering, gentleness,

goodness, faith, meekness, temperance" (Gal. 5:22-23). While the works [personality] of the flesh are evident, which are: adultery, fornication, uncleanness, lewdness, idolatry, sorcery, hatred, contentions, jealousies, outburst of anger, selfish ambition, dissensions, heresies, envy, murders, drunkenness, revelries... " (Gal. 5: 19-21). These two natures live within the same human heart and are at war with one another (Gal. 5:17; Rom. 7:15-25). The Apostle Paul describes this:

"For what I am doing, I do not understand. For what I will to do, that I do not practice; but what I hate, that I do. If, then, I do what I will not to do, I agree with the law that it is good. But now, it is no longer I who do it, but sin that dwells in me. For I know that in me (that is, in my flesh) nothing good dwells; for to will is present with me, but how to perform what is good I do not find. For the good that I will to do, I do not do; but the evil I will not to do, that I practice. Now if I do what I will not to do, it is no longer I who do it, but sin that dwells in me I find then a law, that evil is present with me, the one who wills to do good. For I delight in the law of God according to the inward man. But I see another law in my members, warring against the law of my mind, and bringing me into captivity to the law of sin which is in my members. O wretched man that I am! Who will deliver me from this body of death? I thank God— it is through Jesus Christ our Lord! So then, with the mind I myself serve the law of God, but with the flesh the law of sin" (Rom. 7:15-25).

Imagine if you have two dogs that are constantly fighting one another; a good dog and a bad dog. You want the good dog to win the fight. What could you do to give the good dog the winning advantage? Simple, you feed the good dog and starve the bad dog,



In light of this illustration, how do we feed the Holy Spirit and starve the flesh? How do we get food into our heart? Through the senses we are able to feed and starve what is in our heart.

Our senses help us relate to the world around us. They also cause us to think and feel certain ways. In return, our thoughts and feelings affect our choices/actions. For example: if you look at a sexually explicit picture, that image enters through the eyes. If you do not cast down the image, it will cause the body to physically react. As a result, one could easily slip into sinful behaviors. A picture image on a piece of paper entering through the eyes can move your body to act out ---- a piece of paper!

Likewise, our hearing is another avenue by which we feed the nature of the flesh or Spirit. Have you ever been sitting in the chow hall eating and someone will start complaining about the food? Soon, others are joining in the complaining. Before you realize it, you yourself are participating in complaining. What you *heard* caused you to feel a certain way, a feeling that led you to choose to sin. All because of what you listened to.

I had an experience recently with music. One night I was lying on my bunk, flipping through the radio station, when a song came on, a song that I had not heard in years. The song took my mind back to an Apex Middle School dance in 1985. As I listened, I began to think of the girl I was dancing with and every detail of that night. Over thirty years have passed since that dance; yet the emotions that I felt from hearing one song on the radio caused feelings of quilt, shame, and regret.

Even the sense of smell, taste, and touch affects how we think and feel. For instance, you are hungry, and you walk into the house and *smell* something good cooking on the stove. You have been standing out in the freezing cold and come inside where you *feel* the warmth of a fire. The senses have a tremendous impact on our minds and emotions,

Now, not only have we learned that our senses affect our thoughts and emotions, but they also feed the desires of our hearts. Therefore, since we now have a new nature who resides in our hearts "The Holy Spirit", we can learn to feed this new nature. What can we do in order to strengthen our Spirit-man? Listen to preaching, replacing secular music with Christian music, and substituting TV time with Bible study, are just a few ways to starve the flesh and feed the Spirit-man.

In conclusion, struggling with sin in one's life does not make them a hypocrite, it does prove that they are in the battle between the flesh and the Spirit; God has given us all the power needed to overcome this war. (Romans 13: 14; Ephesians 6:10-18; Romans 6:12-13). There are some things that we can do to fight this battle, however, we do not quit. Remember Joe: The defeated Christian is the one who quits.

Adopt-A Life is designed to help support a "lifer" (someone doing a life sentence or a long sentence) in his ministry, in prison. Basically, you can be a co-laborer to him and an encourager through letters and some financial support. Be a Brother, Sister, Father, Mother to these men.

MasterLife teaches some very important skills for witnessing. It also teaches the men to start a relationship with Jesus without the religious hang-ups; it simplifies Christianity, and it creates an atmosphere that brings the church men and lost men together, thus tearing down barriers.

- North Carolina Field Ministers: according to the latest reports, the NCSMC senior class participants will not graduate in May 2021 as first expected. Due to COVID-19 outbreak at Nash Correctional, the final semester has been postponed until the fall. This will leave them finishing in December 2021.
- In addition, the senior class has been informed that they will be deployed in groups of 4-6 men. Their projected prison assignments will be Polk, Foothills, Piedmont, and Warren Correctional.
- MasterLife Ministry, Inc. hopes to print a special edition newsletter from some of the NCFMP men. A newsletter that will set the record straight as far as who they are as NC Field Ministers.
- 5. What's up with those tablets?
 - We cannot confirm when the tablets program will be implemented statewide. Α GPL company spokesman predicted within 2 years, that statement was made July 2020. Although there has been or indication rumor cancelation of the program, we must keep in mind that this is a pilot program. And a pilot program can be canceled easily. Nevertheless, the inmates appear to be enjoying themselves, with the tablets, especially since many are receiving stimulus checks.
 - So, what do tablets do? They have several functions. GTL phone function that comes with a free pair of headphones with a microphone, a messaging system, game apps, books, music, religious apps, and even TV and movie apps. Thousands of movies and a full TV programming.

- Although there are several free functions, for the most part it is expensive. They charge by the minute, 3-4 cents/minute. But spending \$5-\$10 a day is easy to do.
- There is much to be said, positive and negative, about the tablets. I'll stick to the positive. For me the greatest benefits are: I can communicate with my family without having to argue and fight in the wall-phone line. Finally, I do not have another inmate controlling what I watch on TV. I can choose for myself. Untat's worth whatever the cost!
- As for the state's benefits: Income for operation, they have a new babysitter, they can use it for behavior modification, and disciplinary action.
- 6. Stimulus checks: Most of us know that inmates are receiving stimulus checks. \$600 to \$1200 checks have been received by many. If you have not received yours yet, it is because the paper forms through the snail mail system are backed up terrible. What should you do if you have not received your payments? The IRS has instructed anyone that has not received their checks to file it on the 2020 tax returns 1040. On line 30 you put the amount \$1800 if you have not received these checks. If you use the paper form and snail mail system you might be waiting a long while, so if at all possible, you might get someone to file it online for you. But first have them create you an email. Second, put the mail on the tax return and then fill out your tax return and submit them. The email enables the IRS to accept your claim and gives you a projected date of delivery of the check, they will let you know by email in 24-48 hours when the check will be sent. The person filing for you must have your name, SSN, date of birth, and address to mail the tax return. Make sure you trust this person that you are giving this information.

Corrio Messaging


More than two million adults in the US are incarcerated in federal and state prisons, county jails and detention centers. Half of all prisoners lose touch with their friends and family while in prison. This is not only bad for their mental health but it can devastating for their families (especially those with children) and friendships. The problem is fundamental inasmuch as prisoners are generally at odds with the daily schedules of their families and friends which makes staying in touch really difficult. Moreover, family and friends can't even call an inmate, never mind leave messages. And technical restrictions make it impossible for inmates to access outsider voicemail. Our service means that they can exchange voicemails and text messages with their families and friends in both directions, drastically reducing the amount of worrying and stress on both sides. As a result, ties with families and friends are strengthened and the prisoner has stronger family and social ties when they are released and are much less likely to reoffend. Corrio Messaging, our launch service, is a voicemail, text and email messaging system for inmates, their families and friends. Each inmate is given their own phone number to call to get voice and text messages from family and friends. In the future, needed services such as money transfer and mental health/crisis counseling will be added not only as a compliment to Corrio Messaging but to take full advantage of the communications platform Corrio Messaging is built upon.

Corrio Messaging effectively eliminates frustration and stress of schedule conflicts caused by the differences in real-life schedules of inmates and their families and friends but retains the personal and intimate nature of a phone call. This is especially important for children with incarcerated parents.

Corrio Messaging does not replace or interfere with existing inmate telephone system (ITS) infrastructure but rather, works in conjunction with it and like any call from a prison or jail, is carried on the public switched telephone network (PSTN). All existing inmate telephone system (ITS) security protocols and recording are untouched and in fact, are enhanced by reports specifically designed by Corrio to give corrections officials and jail administrators surveillance measures beyond call recording and throughout the national Corrio Messaging network. Moreover, the Corrio Messaging system has numerous built-in safety and security restrictions and options designed to prevent misuse of the system.
