

Making a difference in people's lives is often thought to be something more than what it actually is. A major breakthrough is not the only indication that a difference has been made. Often times making a difference is as simple as changing the atmosphere people dwell in, if only for a night.

On Christmas Eve, a party was held at Nash Correctional Institution, with about sixty inmates coming together to hear the Gospel, play games, showcase talents, fill their bellies and share in an experience that none of them had witnessed before. Over and over men were heard saying, "I've been locked up (x-amount of years), and I've never seen anything like this." Those men ranged in incarceration times of three years to thirty-two years. Every one of the men involved expressed heart-felt gratitude and amazement.

One statement made by a young man in his twenties was particularly moving. He acknowledged, "I never had a Christmas this good out in the world". Who knows what type of impact this display of God's love will have on these men; for some it may be a lasting memory of what is possible, for others it may only be one night that was filled with light they don't understand. But it

is possible that this one night becomes the turning point in someone's life.

Not only was this a genuinely good time, it was inspiring and motivating, motivating men to stand up and be the warriors and mighty men of God they've been called to be. Soldiers on a battlefield go hungry; these men of God gave up their Christmas packages to provide for this party. Soldiers are given duties and expected to fulfil them; these men of God humbled themselves and performed the duties of some of the janitors for the night, in order to show the servanthood required by the Godly man.

This is what the Man of God does. Christians go into dark places and shine the light of Jesus Christ. They do not allow the naysayers and Pharisee's to discourage or deter them. This is how they fight the battle of Good vs Evil, and though they already know the victor, they fight anyways, because that is what a warrior does.

There has to be a special thanks to all the men and women involved in making this such a special Christmas. Brother James Benoy's aptitude at organizing such an event was instrumental to its success. The men and women who donated the food and prizes deserve to know that your contribution to the war effort will not go un-noticed, by God or men. Thank you so very much. To all of the men that donated their Christmas packages and sacrificed their own canteen,

we salute you. To Mr. Wolfe, Mr. A Smith, Mr. J Springs, Mr. K Angell and everyone who pitched in with the decorations, gift wrapping, and organization, know that people do recognize your effort, and it is appreciated.

Thank you to all of the participants for maintaining the spirit of the festivities and being open to receiving the gifts God is willing to bestow. Last, but certainly not least, a special thanks to the administration for allowing all of this to happen. Many facilities would not trust inmates to conduct themselves accordingly. When wise men and women realize the benefits of such trust far outweigh the possible detriments, amazing things can happen.

Just one night of change can have a longlasting effect. It's very possible this Christmas party made a huge impact on someone's life, but even if it didn't, a multitude of successful battles is how a war is won, and this was one battle God definitely won.

## I want "THAT" for Christmas

Throughout the many years of being locked up I have met a lot of men who claimed they were a Christian and loved the Lord. On the

contrary, what did they show with their life? Was the light of God shown forth? Was there any fruit at all? Did they back up what they claimed to live?

The hurtful thing is, no they did not. How are we ever to reach the lost in such a dying world if we are not to sacrifice our very own lives for that great cost to deliver the word of God, no matter what the cost?

However, recently I met one such man out of over twenty some years of being locked up who exercised what he talked. His name is "Benoy". He acted out, loved out, and gave out. And I wanted what he had, hopefully what he had would rub off on me and be contagious. I decided to love like he loves people and give like he does, and surround myself around God fearing men full of God's love. On Christmas Eve, Benoy sponsored a Christmas party that fed 80 men in the block. In it we had food galore and all kinds of prizes to be given away from trivia questions to Bible verses. "All glory to Jesus!"

After the party was over, many fellow inmates were talking in certain circles stating, "never have I ever had such a good Christmas whether in here or outside in the free world". People were astonished at the power of "love". Some said, "I felt like I was not in prison all day long, I felt free from bondage". Looking out at the cheer on people's faces, I felt an overwhelming power of the Holy Spirit working on the lives of these men, softening their hearts. Even the staff members were so amazed that they just got out of the way of the Lord and recognized the Spirit of the Lord working and just let God move in the lives of these men and not interfere. "WOW" at the power of God.

On a personal note, I'm involved in the MasterLife program. The MasterLife program has really taught me how to have a closer walk with God. To dig more deeper into who God is, to have more quiet time with Jesus and let Him speak to me in the depths of my soul. By reading His word and meditating and reflecting on what Christ is saying to me through the pages of His word. For Psalm 119:105 says "your word is a lamp to my feet and a light to my path". God's word is trying to teach all of us that His word will light the way and guide you, if only you will follow. How do you honestly follow through with that? By seeking God's face as it says in 1 Chronicles 16:11. With following a Christ centered life and truly living it, one will bear much fruit and the outpouring of the Spirit will pour out in every area of your life and others will see it and want what you've got. ## Worship

Have you heard someone speak critically about the way different people worship at church services? I've heard people say stuff like "that church has a dead worship service, it's too quiet." Or someone else might say. "they go crazy down at that church, they run around shouting, falling out in the isle, they're crazy!" I had a fellow ask me what was I yelling and hollering so loud for, could God not hear me just fine if I whispered?" I attempted to share with him why I shout, clap, stand, and yell "Hallelujah", "Glory" and "Amen". He didn't get it at the time.

Over the past years I have watched, listened and pondered different criticisms about corporate worship in the prison system. I have something to say to brothers in Christ, let people worship the way they want to worship. Don't be found guilty of "quenching the Holy Spirit" in your brother. Don't be found guilty of James 4:11-12. "Do not speak against one another, brethren. He who speaks against a brother, or judges his brother, speaks against the law and judges the law; but if you judge the law, you are not a doer of the law, but a judge of it. There is only one Lawgiver and Judge, the One who is able to save and to destroy, but who are you who judge your neighbor?". Furthermore, how can you be worshipping God, if you're looking at what everybody else is doing or not doing? You

PEOPLE WORSHIP DIFFERENTLY! People do not have to fit into <u>your mold</u> to be counted worthy, or your customs, culture or traditions. The Pharisees kept people in bondage like this. Jesus brings freedom. "Where the Spirit of the Lord is, there is freedom".

The Bible has many different examples of worship: with instruments, singing, shouting, lifted hands, clapping, jumping, sitting quietly, standing, bowing, laying prostrate, laughing, crying, eyes closed, head to the ground, and King David even danced before the Lord until his clothes fell off. There are many ways to worship God. But, Jesus said..." true worshippers will worship the Father in Spirit and truth". (John 4:23) He also said, "Man looks on the outward appearances, but God sees the heart". We also know that God tells us to enter His court with praise and thanksgiving. So, however you worship the Father is your choice, but let your brother have his choice too.

Now to the person who doesn't understand what's going on in a worship service, or

"what's all the excitement about?", I would like to explain why we seem so "nutty" with excitement. First, I want to illustrate by using two separate passages. Acts 3: 1-8, "Now Peter and John were going up to the temple at the ninth hour, the hour of prayer. And a certain man who had been lame from his mother's womb was being carried along, whom they used to set down every day at the gate of the temple which is called Beautiful, in order to beg alms of those who were entering the temple. And when he saw Peter and John about to go into the temple, be began asking to receive alms. And Peter along with John, fixed his gaze upon him and said, "Look at us!". And he began to give them his attention, expecting to receive something from them. But Peter said, "I do not possess silver and gold, but what I do have I give to you: In the name of Jesus Christ the Nazarene –walk!" And seizing him by the right hand, he raised him up and immediately his feet and his ankles were strengthened. And with each leap, he stood upright and began to walk. And he entered the temple, walking and leaping and praising God.

This man was crippled and a beggar, but the power of Jesus saved him and healed him. He couldn't help but jump up and down with excitement praising God.

- Do you know what it's like to have your favorite team score the winning touchdown in the Super Bowl? It's enough to make you jump out of your seat!
- Think of a 16-year-old who just got a car for his birthday from Dad. EXCITED!!!
- How about the excitement of a wedding as you leave the church?
- 4<sup>th</sup> of July fireworks
- The thrill of the birth of a new baby

These things might make me jump, shout, cheer, clap, or smile. Are you getting the picture?

Then there is a different perspective. Luke 7:36-47 "And behold, there was a woman in the city who was a sinner; and when she learned that He was reclining at the table in the Pharisee's house, she brought an alabaster vial of perfume, and standing behind Him at His feet, weeping, she began to wet His feet

with her tears, and kept wiping them with the hair of her head, and kissing His feet, and anointing them with the perfume. Now when the Pharisee who had invited Him saw this, he said to himself, "If this man were a prophet He would know who and what sort of person this woman is who is touching Him, that she is a sinner." And Jesus answered and said to him, "Simon, I have something to say to you." And he replied, "Say it Teacher". "A certain money lender had two debtors; one owed five hundred denarii and the other fifty. When they were unable to repay, he graciously forgave them both. Which of them therefore will love him more?" Simon answered and said, "I suppose the one whom he forgave more." And He said to him, "You have judged correctly." And turning to the woman, He said to Simon, "Do you see this woman? I entered your house, you gave Me no water for My feet, but she has wet My feet with her tears, and wiped them with her hair. You gave me no kiss, but she, since the time I came in, has not ceased to kiss My feet. You did not anoint my head with oil, but she anointed My feet with perfume. For this reason, I say to you, her sins, which are many, have been forgiven, for she loved much, but he who is forgiven little, loves little," The person who has been forgiven much, loves much. But a person who is forgiven little only shows a little love. This passage leads me to believe that a person who shows no love has never received any love or forgiveness. These people have no love, no joy, no peace, no forgiveness, no thankfulness, no shout, no praise, no tears, no smile. This woman's worship is distinctively different than the other passage. She has been out in some deep sin and the storms of life have driven her to a place of brokenness. She also experienced the loving power of Jesus in a different way, thus her worship came out in a different way.

- Do you know how it feels to have a friend feed you a meal when you were broke and hungry?
- Maybe you got in debt real bad and somebody paid your bill.
- How does it feel when you get a letter, a visit, a phone call from someone you love, after a long separation?
- Someone you love says they love you even after you hurt them or done them wrong.

 Picture a small child being rescued by his father from a scary barking dog, or the sudden strike of lightening or thunder as he jumps in his arms, or after wrecking his bicycle or the fear of the dark when the power goes out.

There is a comfort, a peace, a calm that comes for the child when he is in his father's presence – and so it is with our Father in Heaven.

There are many men in a worship service who are shouting, clapping, bowed, singing, crying, sitting quietly, and sincerely rejoicing in spirit and truth because they have been rescued. They have been out in the terrible storms of life, crippled and alone, deep in sin, selfishness and sickness. They have been drowning with no one to help. Many of us have burned every bridge and hurt every person who ever loved us. Some of us were so sick of ourselves and what we'd become that we were ready to end our own lives. We tried everything from AA to A through Z to change, but the lies, the game, the cons, the deceit wouldn't go away. One day in the middle of all the mess, JESUS...... Sweet Jesus touched our hearts. He didn't care what we had done or where we had been, He gave us a new life, a fresh start. He said, "Follow Me", and we dropped everything and followed Him.

So, you see, we are celebrating Jesus when we act "nutty". We are worshipping Him when we cry tears and bow our heads. We are showing Him how much we love Him for bringing us in from that awful storm of life. It's not a touchdown, it's not a homerun, or a new car, it's not a birthday party with a cupcake. We are celebrating and worshipping Jesus Christ, the one who paid the price for my eternal life. I hope; this helps you understand a little better what's taking place during worship part of a church service.

I want to end this with a final thought: there are many men who come to church for wrong motives, or maybe a friend invited them, or maybe they're just trying to get away from the dorm, a bad bunk mate, a bad officer. They are unsaved, still sick, in pain, and out in the storm of life. They are "under the sway of the wicked one..." taken captive by the devil to do his will". They haven't

been given the eyes to see yet. They don't know Jesus. All they see is ...YOU!

## A Transforming Christmas

### Nash Field Ministers Put Feet to Their Faith

Christmas Celebration 2017

"Whatsoever ye do in word or deed, do all in the name of the Lord Jesus...(Col.3:17)

"Whatever your hand finds to do, do it with all your might" (Eccl. 9:10)

These two verses best describe what took place at the Christmas celebration held in Unit 2-c block at Nash Correctional Institute. You don't want to miss a single detail of this amazing story, so sit back, relax, and take in all the events that led up to the best Christmas ever for many inmates in Unit 2-C block at Nash Correctional.

It all started when DPS, Joe Gibbs Game Plan for Life, and Southeastern Baptist Theological Seminary teamed up to start a field minister program for inmates with lengthy sentences; the goal being that when they finish school, they might go out and make a difference throughout the North Carolina system. With the encouragement of their professors and seeking approval through proper chain of command, many of the students have begun to make a difference already in the dorm where they live. Some of the students were ministering prior to arriving at Nash; therefore, they just began doing what comes natural to them. The awesome thing was how they all began to unify and work together. Through this comm-unity of believers and the support of staff the seminary students have already accomplished: Sunday fellowship, seminary basketball team, birthday club ministry, MasterLife discipleship group, and a store box for indigent inmates. Some have assisted the dorm workers in doing their jobs for Christmas, and some are just offering

encouragement and support for the ones who are laboring (a smile goes a long way in here;).

These men are working together for a common purpose – and it's not just to make good grades – they are building relationships with fellow inmates in hopes that they might have the opportunity to share the good news of Jesus Christ.

Sunday ministry was the beginning of trust building between the Nash administration and Seminary students when the men were allowed to gather together in the dorm for food, fellowship, and testimonies. It begins with prayer and a scripture reading by one of the seminary students followed by a testimony by another brother.

At the beginning of the semester only seminary men were attending, but as the weeks went by more and more men from the general population of the dorm began coming. Now they are sharing their stories as well. Each week the men pitch in their canteen to prepare food for the dorm. The relationships that have been cultivated have created a more positive and peaceful atmosphere. All of these works of love came to fruition during Christmas break.

The men of C-block were told about a Christmas celebration plan for Christmas Eve, but they had no idea what was coming! By Christmas the seminary men were eager and ready to serve; they teamed up with some of the other Nash brothers and transformed the dorm into the Spirit of Christmas. These men organized a trivia game, talent show, food and candies, door prizes, appreciation presents for workers who live in the dorm, and secret Santa gifts exchanged among the men. There was singing, laughter, and even some tears.

The Trivia game was a joint effort by Montey and Benoy, there were ten teams consisting of five to six players on each team; questions ranged from sports, history, geography, biblical, and general. There were bonus points for bible drills, singing carols, and a push-up contest. The laughter and camaraderie was amazing. Men who never talk to each other were lost in the Spirit as if they were free for one night. Even the officers were in "Awe".

The "door prize drawings" were held by Kirston Angell and Michael Wolfe. They spent the entire afternoon wrapping presents and prizes that were donated from various Christmas boxes. They wrote every inmates room number on paper ballots and held a drawing every fifteen minutes all evening. Men were excited to receive these

gifts/prizes. One man exclaimed that he had never had a Christmas this good on the street.

The talent show was the highlight of the evening. Anthony Smith masterfully orchestrated this event by getting the men in the dorm to sign up and offer their talent with the opportunity for 1st, 2nd, and 3rd place prizes. There were beautiful pieces of art work entered by the Nash Art Program. There was singing of songs ranging from Soggy Bottom Boys bluegrass, Grandma got run over by a reindeer, to Christian rap. One man recited the entire prodigal son passage from the Bible by memory, another read a poem about Jesus' returning, and two seminary men dressed up like mimes and put on an excellent show that had everyone laughing. The winning talent and most captivating act of the night was a skit performed by Marcus Burnett and Steven Barbour. These two displayed a breathtaking enactment of Peter and Judas Iscariot that left one with a sobering realization that we all need Jesus.

When men who have been incarcerated for twenty to thirty years shed tears and say they have never experienced anything close to this kind of Christmas in prison, it can only mean a win-win for the administration, the college at Southeastern, Joe Gibbs and supporters, and most of all our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ to whom all the glory goes.

## The Christian Journey

"Simple does not mean Easy"

They say it is as simple as driving a car; so, what makes it so hard? Let's consider the story of the man that was given the most luxurious car, known to have ever been made, and given instructions by the owner, that he simply had to drive the car, wherever, the GPS directed him to go, without stopping until he got to the end of the road which he noticed stretched well beyond eyesight. As he got into the car, turned the key in the ignition, even before he was able to put it in gear, there began rain drops falling down on the windshield, as he looked out he could see dark clouds starting to form on the horizon, and could reason that a powerful thunderstorm was coming. Turning on his windshield wipers cleared the rain from his window enough that the vision of the road was clear, so he began to drive the car in the direction given by the GPS system. Only a few miles into his trip the rain becomes increasingly heavier and the thunder and

lightning roars and flashed across the sky as driving conditions become more and more intensive, still he presses on, unharmed by the thunderstorm. But soon the wind begins to blow so hard that he could feel the resistance against the car, and the rain became as a pouring waterfall on the windshield making the visibility possible for only a few feet at a time. Driving slowed to a crawl as the road became slick and slippery from the increase of the rain water, but knowing the reliability of the GPS directions and the superior technology that went into designing his car to be able to withstand any weather condition, the man was able to make it through until finally the storm was behind him. Despite being inside the safety of the luxurious car, the man found himself in physical and mental anguish just from the thoughts of the possible dangers that the storm could produce.

With the thunderstorm fading in his rearview mirror, the man finds himself traveling on a major interstate with six lanes of traffic moving and looping in every direction. There were thousands of different vehicles in which he had to navigate through, with every driver making decisions that truly impacted his ability to move freely without considering the intentions of every driver on either side of him. Front and back. Somehow, he was finding that it mattered little, him being inside the car he was driving with all its hightech ability, it didn't stop the nervous, anxious, and restless feeling that came due to a heightened state of alertness he had to maintain in order to travel this highway with other people driving alongside him.

With the GPS system still pointing out directions the man followed them to the letter exactly, and he was confident that he wasn't lost, even though he didn't know when he would get to his destination. But even this knowledge couldn't comfort his ever growing feeling of powerlessness that play on his mental states. He realized that making the agreement to drive the car didn't come without a price. And in his case, it meant surrendering control and trusting something other than himself to get him to a place beyond what he could see. This man found out that Simple did not mean Easy. It seemed a small thing to drive such a luxurious car that he didn't have to work for nor could he ever afford, The Long Trip – The Outside Danger – Other Drivers and – The Anxiety of the Unseen, made the trip much harder than he expected.

So too, is our journey as a Christian, having made a commitment to surrender our will to obey and follow the will of the Lord.

Remembering to count the cost, we see that

<u>Simple</u> does not mean <u>Easy!</u> But victory is sure no matter how hard or how long this Christian journey appears to be.

Dear Brother Travis and fellow readers of the MasterLife Newsletter,

I greet you in the matchless name of Jesus, our Risen Lord and Savior. I am writing to thank Brother Travis for my subscription to the MasterLife newsletter, and to let all readers know about the mighty move of God that is taking place here at Nash Correctional Institution (NCI).

When I received my first newsletter, Issue 2017, volume 5, my heart was overcome with joy. Reading the inspirational stories and the testimonies contained in the newsletter blessed me immensely. I am so grateful to my beloved brother and friend, James Benoy, for giving my name to Brother Travis so that I could begin receiving the MasterLife Newsletter.

I am a 58-year-old, currently in my 24<sup>th</sup> year of serving a Life + 40-year sentence. I am housed at the Nash Correctional Institution (NCI). A couple of years ago while at NCI, I recommitted my life back to Christ. God has blessed me in so many ways because of being housed here, chief of which is becoming a part of the North Carolina Field Minister Program (NCFMP). In all my years of being incarcerated, I have never been a part of anything that compares to the NCFMP. As you may have learned, it is a Christian "based" program that has been facilitated by Southeastern Baptist Theological Seminary (SEBTS) in partnership with North Carolina Department of Public Safety (NCDPS), and Game Plan for Life. Game Plan for Life is the non-profit organization started and funded by Mr. Joe Gibbs. Owner of Joe Gibbs Racing in Charlotte, NC.

As a teacher's assistant in the NCFMP, God has allowed me to observe daily the working of the Holy Spirit in the lives of the students enrolled in the program, while they are in class, as well as in the dorm. The outworking of the Holy Spirit has been nothing short of a spiritual awakening in the lives of those that interact with the seminary students.

I would also like to thank everyone that played a role in making sure that we had a spirit filled Christmas celebration in our cellblock. I know that it took a lot of planning and sacrifice on the part of so many individuals. Many of us feel like this was the best Christmas we've experienced while

incarcerated. The highlight of it all this holiday season, is that our beloved brother Benoy introduced me and others at Nash to the MasterLife Discipleship program. Again, I thank God for the mighty move of God that is taking place at NCI.

Now I know how important it is to spend time with the Lord and other Christians, and witness to my family and friends. God has blessed me with my family and we are growing closer every day --- Hallelujah!!! I am so proud of my mother and father. They have always been there for me. My children are my heart and I love them. When I was living in sin and selfishness, my family was by my side and now all I want to do is make them proud. I want my grandkids to see me living for the Lord and accept Jesus as their Savior. I am so thankful to the Lord for opening my eyes to know Him better and for bringing these seminary men into the dorm where I live. They all bless me and encourage me to live better. Thank you for the chance to tell everybody my good news. Amen!

As I write this letter I am sitting in Nash Correctional Institute, incarcerated for the sixth time. I can sum up my life of crime and sin with three words, "I'm from Gastonia". I attended church with my family as a child. My relationship with God and Jesus was strong until I became a teenager. My parents divorced when I was 14 and the last fight they had was over my mother making my father buy me a pair of Nike Air Jordan's for \$150. For many years I blamed myself for the divorce thinking if I hadn't "needed" those shoes my parents would've stayed together. To this day, my father still thinks it is absurd to pay that much for a pair of shoes. LOL. My mother re-married and I rebelled. I also discovered girls, sex, drugs, and began a life with a multitude of unfathomable sin. I always knew God was there but I had let the flame in my relationship with Jesus be extinguished by my constant sin and negligence of repentance. After arriving at Nash and being housed in the same block with the seminary school students, I ran into Weston. We first crossed paths four years ago at Avery Mitchell. A mutual friend invited me to a MasterLife class and I went. Unfortunately, at the time, I was still entangled in the world and myself. Always believing that I was not only in control but also had control of my life. Doing whatever I wanted with my life without following Jesus is wrong – even if the choice results in something positive. Success alone is not the determining factor when it comes to pleasing God; the determining factor is whether or not Jesus led me to the success. The outcome of choices I make apart from Jesus may at times please me, but they will not please Him. One day as Weston and I were conversing in the block I mentioned MasterLife and he informed me that he would like to do a class during the Christmas break from seminary school. I told him if he did I would commit my time and be faithful to my attendance. HALLELUJAH, AMEN! The greatest and best decision I have ever made in my life is accepting Jesus Christ as my Lord and Savior. Before the class began two weeks ago, I started attending church again with Weston and some of the brothers from the seminary program. After watching these men in the dorm and around the camp, I have noticed a sense of love, joy, and peace among them that I have wished and yearned for. I was broken and wanted to be fixed. I asked Jesus to forgive me, repented for the sins I've committed. Therefore, by accepting

Jesus as my Lord and Savior, I know that through Him and prayer, my relationship with God has been restored. I am a new creation. I am forgiven. I am saved. I am a Christian. I know I am more prepared to build my relationship with God because of the tools that I have been able to put in my toolbox through the MasterLife discipleship study group. I have learned how to truly repent for my sins and how to go to Christ in prayer. I am by no means claiming to be perfect or better than anyone, because neither of those will I ever be. There is nothing noble about being superior to your fellow man, true nobility comes from being superior to your former self. Brothers, my wish for you is that you come to know Jesus, or if you have let your flame be extinguished, that you rekindle it, and become on fire for the Lord and Savior Jesus Christ to whom all glory goes. 

[14] Most of the brothers have gained confidence in the Lord from my imprisonment and dare even more to speak the word fearlessly. [15] To be sure, some preach Christ out of envy and rivalry, but others out of good will. [16] These preach out of love, knowing that I am appointed for the defense of the gospel; [17] the others proclaim Christ out of selfish ambition, not sincerely, thinking that they will cause me trouble in my imprisonment. [18] What does it matter? Only that in every way, whether from false motives or true, Christ is proclaimed, and in this I rejoice. Yes, and I will continue to rejoice [19] because I know this will lead to my salvation through your prayers and help from the Spirit of Jesus Christ. [20] My eager expectation and hope is that I will not be ashamed about anything, but that now as always, with all courage, Christ will be highly honored in my body, whether by life or by death. [21] For me, to live is Christ and to die is gain.
