

Get out of the Boat

"Merry Christmas to all my brothers and sisters in the Lord. A special Merry Christmas to the convicts who are still going hard on the yard."

Glory to God in the highest! Peace in the prisons and good will to all inmates & Administration! Let everything that has breath praise the Lord! Pray for the place where you are held captive; for if it has peace, you will have peace and if it prospers, then you will prosper. While you are there, disciple men within your area of influence. These things are reasonable enough, Right?

Christmas is the most dreaded and depressing time of the year for most of the prison population. Even many Christians have heavy hearts and downcast attitudes during this time of year. A lot of men spend their time trying to sleep the holidays away, while others drown out the season with football and news. Some get so depressed that they cannot even bring themselves to go to the dining hall and eat. Nevertheless, the season comes, and it goes just like bad weather or a common cold. The guestion this poses is what can a disciple of Christ do to change the atmosphere and share the message of Jesus during this depressing season? The answer is simple: Do something or do nothing!

The first thing a "do something" Christian can do is recognize that we are called to represent Jesus which means we should do something that represents His name. Wherever God has placed a Christian, he has a purpose; a purpose that will show His love and bring glory to his name. A disciple of Christ should constantly be thinking of ways to make a difference—"what would you have me do, Lord?" A bag of coffee and some cookies can do wonders behind these fences. We must be like David and ask, "is there not a cause?" A Christian should be on a mission; a mission to tell everybody about Jesus—compelled to tell. This compulsion comes from the love of God that has been shed in our hearts. Therefore, if we love Him we will keep His commandments and "go. and make disciples of all nations, teaching them". It ain't "go" to the canteen and feed my face, or "go" to the TV and tune everybody out, or "go" get in my little comfort zone and do my time; we have been bought with a price and we are not our own. There is a cause: Christ wants to use us to represent His name and change the prison system.

Many Christians in prison do nothing because of three reasons: they think they don't have anything to offer, or they are afraid of the persecution, or they just do not care. We will leave the "just don't care guys out of the equation." —You may think "I do not have anything, what can I do?" There is a story of a widow who was in a dilemma. The prophet Elisha did not fix her problem for her, but simply asked

her, "what do you have in your house?" Initially she said, "I have nothing... but a jar of oil" (2 Kings 4:1-6). You may not think that you do not have anything to offer; however, when a Christian takes what he does have and dedicates it to the Lord, then God will make more than enough to accomplish His mission. The disciple's started out with two fish and five loaves of bread; yet, after Jesus blessed it they had twelve baskets left over. Therefore, do not look at what you do not have, but what you do have in your house. Sometimes you might just have an idea to do something for the dorm on Christmas. GO to your brothers and ask them for some help in developing and executing that idea, that's what the gifts of the Spirit and the body of Christ is for.

Other Christians do nothing because they have gotten themselves into a routine/comfort zone that avoids all persecution and problems. They are paralyzed by fear of persecution and just kind of blend in with everybody else. It's hard to distinguish them from the guys on the yard. Everybody is their brother—amen. Of course, nobody wants the problems that come within this environment; but scripture is crystal clear on this matter. Just as soon as Peter stepped out of the boat, the storms came! Joseph had a dream and wanted to share it with his brothers, they tried to kill him! Poor old David just came to bring his brothers some supplies and wanted in on the battle, his brothers scorned him. Look at our Lord Jesus; a perfect man with a perfect plan and even He could not avoid persecution. How much more will happen to us. The bottom line is there is no perfect way to minister; you either get in and get busy or you live in disobedience. Peter tells us, "to this you were called.... [do good and suffer for it]" (1 Pt. 2:20-21).

There are men in the prison where you are who are depressed, hurting, lonely; many are mean, hard, and have nasty attitudes; some are handicap, suffering mental illness, and even dying. They should not have to spend their lives in a prison just to die and go to an eternal prison. Christian, you have their answer and their freedom (the gospel). You may not feel qualified to go to them; but, if not you, then who? However, if you determine to get out of the boat and be a doer of the word, I promise you will look back and see that you can walk on the water, kill the giant, and lead people to salvation in the name of the Lord Jesus Christ; and Christmas in prison will never be the same again for you—GO! And may the Lord go with you!

Jesus Christ: King, Priest, Savior

Greetings to all my MasterLife brothers across the state. I pray God will bless you and draw you into even closer relationship with Him this Christmas season as we celebrate the willing, loving, and sacrificial incarnation of Jesus Christ our Lord. The eternal Son of God, never ceasing to be God, descended from glory in heaven to be born in human flesh in this supreme and gracious display of love and eternal redemption. (John 1:1, 14, 8:58, 17:5, Phil. 2:5-8, 1Pet. 1:20, Eph. 1:4-9). Not that we deserved this by any means or could ever merit this glorious act - but only through the willful and voluntary expression of God's grace did He send forth His only Son to die for sinners like you and me. Paul writes in Romans, "For while we were still weak, at the right time, Christ died for the ungodly". In our fallen and corrupt human nature we could never reach God or please Him in our flesh, (8:7-8), and yet Paul continues: "God shows His love for us in that while we were still sinners, Christ died for us" (5:6-8).

Jesus Christ, conceived through the Holy Spirit and born of a virgin, lived to suffer and die in our place for the multitude of sins we have committed against God and to remove the chasm of separation, which existed because of this. "For God so loved the world" He sent, He gave, and He provided for us what we could never earn or produce on our own — a perfect atoning sacrifice that would forever erase our sin debt before Him while also ushering eternal peace and lasting union between us, (John 1:29, 3:16, Romans 5:1, 6:5, 8). Amazing.

So, in light of this Christmas season, there are three distinct characteristics of Jesus Christ that I would like to share with you, coming from Matthew 2:10-11. "When they saw the star, they (the wise men) rejoiced exceedingly with great joy. And going into the house they saw the child with Mary His mother and fell down and worshiped Him. Then opening their treasures, they offered Him gifts, gold and frankincense and myrrh." Notice here it is Jesus alone who is worshiped. Mary, though blessed among women, is not exalted in Scripture as deity. Christ alone is the focal point of our prayer, trust, affection, and eternal salvation. He is the only true mediator between God and mankind (1Tim. 2:5, Heb. 9:15, 12:24). Not Mary, and not Mohammed. Notice the gifts here, gold and frankincense and myrrh. Interestingly, gold was a gift typically reserved for royalty, in other words, a KING. In addition, frankincense during those times was a scent used to honor God and this was used exclusively by the PRIEST. Finally, myrrh was a spice they commonly used in burial, this pointing forward to our Lord's eventual sacrificial death as our SAVIOR. The wise men traveled from far away and brought these gifts as they bowed in humble adoration of Him. Can I ask you; did you give anything to Jesus when you bowed down before Him in genuine faith and repentance? encourages us, "present your bodies as a living sacrifice, holy and acceptable to God, which is your reasonable service" (Romans 12:1) Jesus died as our sacrifice that we would no longer live for ourselves but for Him (Gal. 2:20, Rom. 14:8). Let's give Him wholehearted submission, loving obedience, and passionate worship.

Jesus is our eternal King. Saul, David, and Solomon are just a few quick examples of human kings who wrestled with imperfection and sin. They clearly, naturally, struggled with their fallen humanity; but also pointed to the One who would reign forever and never fail - Jesus Christ. He has a Sovereign and eternal reign that has no end, therefore, no one shall ever remove or surpass Christ on His throne (Hebrews 1:8-12, Matthew 25:31-32) God has so graciously delivered the believer "from the domain of darkness and transferred us into the kingdom of His beloved Son, in whom we have redemption, the forgiveness of sins" (Col. 1:13-14). Is Jesus Christ your king? Have you submitted to His authority and have been made part of His eternal kingdom? We must step down from our own "throne".

Secondly, Jesus is our Great High Priest. In the Old Testament, the priest served as a mediator between sinful people and this Holy God. A sacrificial system was in place to deal with and atone for sin, including those of the priest. In other words, something perfectly innocent had to die in the place of someone who was guilty. This of course pointing to the perfect, sinless, and spotless Lamb of God who would forever remove the stain, debt, guilt, and condemnation of our sin (Ps. 103:10-12, Col. 2:14, Rom. 8:1) Though the Old Testament priest were many in number, they were

prevented from continuing due to their eventual death (Hebrews 7:22-27, Rom. 6:23), whereas Jesus' priesthood continues perfectly and eternally in heaven. He is seated at the right hand of the Father. His work of sacrifice and atonement is finished (Heb. 8:1, John 19:30). As our Great High Priest, Jesus is able to perfectly cleanse us and He saves us "to the uttermost and lives forever to make intercession for His People" (Heb. 7:25, Rom. 8:34). Is Jesus Christ your priest? (No mere man or denomination can assume this role and position). Have your sins been washed away and atoned for by the spotless Lamb of God? Only Jesus can cleanse, purify, and make us new again. It is the finished work of Christ that gives us our righteous standing before God. Jesus clothes us in His own righteousness (2 Cor.5: 21).

Finally, Jesus is our glorious, humble, and sacrificial Savior. He said that all the Scripture point to Him (John 5:39-40, 46-47, Luke 24:27, 44-45). Therefore, consider the obvious connection between Isaiah 40:3 and Matt 3:3, or Isaiah 45:21 and Titus 2:13, for two quick examples. We could easily add the Passover in Exodus, the manna from heaven, and the water from the rock, or Gen. 3:15, Isaiah 53, and Psalm 22 along with countless others if time and space allowed. But in light of context, note the prophetic significance of the myrrh cited in Matt 2:11 finding its fulfillment in John 19:38-40. Jesus' birth, life, and ministry were like arrows that pointed forward to the cross at Calvary. It is here that God's glorious plan of redemption finds its fulfillment. Jesus came from heaven to be born in a manger to die at the hands of sinners, and on a tree that Jesus came and did for us what we could never do for ourselves - and instead of receiving God's justice, He has chosen to extend His mercy and grace to those whom believe in His Son. This perfect child wrapped in swaddling clothes would be for us, all we would ever need. This Christmas as we honor our Lord's arrival to this earth, May our lives reflect humility, gratitude, and thankfulness for such a costly, loving, and eternal sacrifice.

In close, we can still turn to Jesus as our Priest in confession (to Him) and repentance of sin. We can bow our knee before His throne and live in a way that reflects His authority and His eternal kingdom. Because oh what a joy and a privilege it is to embrace Him as Savior. Amen.

While I was raised Catholic, I didn't know God, nor did I know that he loved me. Love was misconstrued in the atmosphere of domestic violence inside my household. I sought out love and loyalty in a gang, feeling as dead as the Santa Muerte I prayed to. I used drugs and alcohol to numb the pain that burned inside. In preparing to go to war with another gang, I was arrested and sentenced to more than 20 years for a crime I didn't commit; tell me, how could God love me? Inside of prison, I continued to bang and get high, praying to Santa Muerte to grant me protection as I sought the opposite. When my father died in 2008, I felt guilty and responsible, but nothing changed in my heart. During 2013, I spent 6 months on segregation. There, the isolation and the absence of drugs made me start to think about my life, that there has to be something more to life than this. I started hanging with a Christian brother and praying to God. Before I knew it, years past by and made medium custody. On May 28, 2018, I accepted Jesus Christ and I am learning how to become a disciple through MasterLife here at Nash. Jonathan Ramirez's testimony spoke to my heart. If I hadn't got locked up, I would have been dead like Santa Muerte; instead I am alive in Jesus whose love broke death and sin's hold on me. ***********

Years ago, I was living a lie. The lie was a life of salvation. Yes, I was living like a devil and professing a life of Christ. I would use God as a spare tire. This is my eighth time in prison and each time I would open my trunk to pull God back out. I knew I could use Him with this flat. This time something different came about as a result of my prayers. I was placed in A Block (a section in the housing unit) with guys that loved Christ. I spoke with James Benoy about my situation and I felt a connection because of the similarity of our crime. He began to share with me his love for Jesus and inquired about my place in Christ. Again, I thought I was saved, so Benoy led me to one of the brothers; Charles Young, and while listening to him share and explain the gospel story, I realized that I was not saved. On August 29, 2018 around 7:30 pm, I gave my life to Christ! From that moment the Holy Spirit took hold of me and it is amazing the change that has taken place in my life. Instead of looking for drugs to get high on, I read the Bible in the peace of Christ. Instead of conning the staff, I greet them in the love of Christ. These are just a few changes that the Lord has made evident on the outside, but this is only a small thing compared to the joy that fills my soul. Now I am able to understand how these men with life sentences can smile each day. My name is Johnny Ray Bullins and I am a son of the most high God! I thank God for having me cross paths with James Benoy and the MasterLife program, as well as these N.C. field ministers.

Some twelve weeks ago, the Lord called me to step out in faith and start discipling others. When the Lord called me to step out in faith, I was reminded of Samuel's answer, "Here I am" Lord (1 Sam. 3:4). Then the Lord truly blessed me with four faithful individuals to start with, then saw fit to add two others at the start of workbook two. However. I want to thank all the brothers that are participating such as: Richard Dowless (Dallas), Barry Mintz, Jeffery Garner, Johnny Bullins, Victor Velasquez, and George Clowers. This is my story when I was coming up I never believe in God because I did not know Him, to this very night I was robbing people. I went into this house and shot two people and took their money. Then as I was walking home a car pulled up to me and I see a shotgun come out of the window, I took off running and I felt something hot hit me in the chest. I hit the ground, and somebody told me to get up and run, not knowing that somebody was God talking to me. So, a few days later, I'm laid up and He came to me once more and start telling me a story of about a friend I know that got shot with a shotgun, just like I did but he never made it, he was a lot bigger than me. So, He said, who do you think save your life, me or the doctors? I did not know what to say because I didn't believe in no God because my friend said to me, that if there was a God He shouldn't be letting babies get killed, so I was lost but after that night I put my faith in God. I went to church a few times but I still out there smoking, living the young boy's life, you know the girls, cars, money. I had my son, so I slowed down a little, but I was still out there sinning, smoking, shooting people for no reason at all, then I thought you can't try to serve the Lord and be in the street full time and put God in the back of my head. A few months goes by and I have my little girl by this time I'm in and out of jail, I just could not stop smoking weed, I love weed more than anything in the world.

Then in 2012, my brother gets killed, now I hate everybody, even God. I'm sitting in jail thinking if there was a God, how He let a young boy that was trying to make something out of his life get killed. Now I made up my mind when I get out, I was going to kill the boy. So, April 15, 2012, my grandma birthday, I asked God if He would do one thing for me and that was to help me find the boy who shot my brother. So now I'm out walking around looking for him, just so happens, something says to me to look up and it's the boy, I said thank you God. Then I shot him 7 times. Just my luck I run off and I run into the police. So now I'm a dead man, so they take me to jail. I'm sitting in there thinking there must be a God now. So, the first thing I see in my cell is a bible. I'm thinking I can't pick this up after I almost killed a man. So, after some hours pass by I pick it up and started to pray, Lord if you get me out of this I would not do nothing else.

So, I come down to my 9 months when I came back to jail, it's time for me to go to court, now they got me on a firearm by a felon B&E and they tell me they have a plea deal for 10-12 years. I'm thinking to myself that I can't do that time so before I went to bed I prayed and prayed. So, months go by, I still sitting, something tell me to call home, so I call home and my sister tell me that Roach got locked up for having 500 grams coming to his house in the mail. I'm like, why is she telling me this, so that night went to bed, someone came to me in a dream and started talking to me, telling me "you going to be ok, that he was going to save me one last time and He was God Almighty and don't never think there is something He can't do and I won't do a day over 3 years". So, the next morning I hear my name called for court, as I'm walking to court I ask God to reveal Himself to me. Now it's my turn to go up there, he is reading my charges and asks me if there is anything I would like to say. I look up to the sky and said Lord help me, then back to him and said, no it's in the Almighty's hand now. When it was time to hear how much time I was going to get, I was deaf, then I heard this same voice I keep hearing in my sleep, saying, "my son you are in God's hand now" the judge said 22-36 months in DOC. I was happiest man in the world, I said thank you Lord, if you hear me, can you please send me to Maury and my wish came true and from that day on I knew there was a God.

So, in 15 months go by, I'm at Maury, my case manager I got my merit, where I would like to go, I said Nash and now I'm here I started out on the wrong foot then I met Benoy, he started talking to me about MasterLife that he wanted me to start coming to at night. I went, and I like it, really, I fell in love with it. I changed a lot, learning about the Disciple's Cross, I learn how to walk with the Master also live in the Word and pray in Faith. Then on 9-2-18, I was in church and the Lord spoke to me and told me it's time for you to really get saved so that is what I did, now I'm happy living in the word, I fill better than ever.

I woke the day after Christmas, 2015, in the UNC Burn/Trauma Center more alone than I could ever imagine. I had lost my memory due to a traumatic brain injury, and sub-dermal hematoma. The staff kept telling me I shouldn't be alive, that I had been in a head-on collision four days earlier. Ronald Larson, the other driver was killed on impact, God rest his soul. His wife was also crippled badly but did survive. My truck burst into flames I'm told. I've only seen pictures. My memory wiped. One can't imagine the dread, the horrific sorrow I felt. More profound than words can tell. I wish I had died. The darkness was swallowing me up.

There were no witnesses and first responders could not explain how I got out of my truck. I firmly believe that an angel of the Lord was sent to extract me from my crushed and burning vehicle. It took about a year for me to recover from my injuries which included a concussion/brain bleeding, a torn aorta, 7 broken ribs, shattered left foot/ankle, ruptured spleen, and third degree burns on my right leg and foot which required skin graft surgery. I didn't walk for a year after reconstruction orthopedic surgery to my foot and ankle. I'm so blessed to be alive today, much less able to walk again. The deep pit of darkness that swallowed me up was overwhelming. I struggled in the hospital at Central Prison for six months, alone in a cell on the fourth floor. The depression the enemy attacked me with was pure dread and misery. The prison chaplain wandered by one day and gave me a Bible and a few words of encouragement. I was reading Psalms and came to 94:17, "If the Lord had not rescued me I would soon have dwelt in the silence of death". It was at that moment that I decided to battle my way out of that misery. Only with the power of Jesus Christ have I been able to recover physically, mentally, emotionally and most importantly, spiritually. "The Lord is the strength of my life, My God in whom I trust".

I accepted Jesus into my heart at 19 years if age. I was married, bought a home, raised two beautiful sons, joined the local church – everything I was told to do, except for one of course, it was the most important. I must - we must, put Jesus Christ first and foremost in our lives. This after all, is the first and greatest commandment. For 49 years of my life, I knew of God and loved Jesus, but I had no personal relationship with Him. For God to rescue me from my crushed and burning vehicle, give me the strength and courage to recover and bless me as He has, it is obvious that He has a plan for me. I am working hard, studying His Word daily and drawing closer to Jesus than ever. He has forgiven me of the horror, death and destruction, misery and pain that I have wrought upon this earth. The enemy had tricked me, seduced me and bound me into prescription drug addiction of which I was captive and a slave to for eighteen years. My Father rescued me from much more than a burning truck. That night, the Lord reached down from Heaven and pulled me, one of His precious children from the dreaded death-bound spiral of addiction. I shall forever do my part in furthering the advancement of the Kingdom of God. May His blessings and mercies be compounded and abundant on everyone who has suffered because of my actions, especially my sons - Brandon and Nick, the Heath family and the Larson family.

My studies in MasterLife for the past six weeks through the Disciple's Cross in book one has helped me greatly. First and foremost, it has taught me how to better manage my personal quiet time with God. Doing this alone is strengthening my lifelong, obedient relationship with Jesus Christ. The personal, intimate relationship I have with my Savior is wonderful. The principles of the Disciple's Cross are fairly simple but requires dedication and determination on our part to always have Jesus Christ at the center of your life, to stay rooted in the Word daily, communicate with God continuously, to fellowship with believers and witness to others. The Spirit of the Lord is working in my life very profoundly and I'm very eager to see what the Lord has planned next.

The Prohibitive Cost of Love:

Emotional and Psychological Separation within the Prison Context

One more day. One more time. One more sunset, maybe I'd be satisfied. But then again, I know what that would do—leave me wishing still for one more day with you.

-Diamond Rio, One More Day

I am a huge fan of the country band Diamond Rio, but I only know one song from their catalogue. Is this a cultural paradox? If it is, then it is one born of existential necessity. I am incarcerated and have been so for so long that when people ask me where I am from, my inclination is to tell them, "prison." When I was 16 years old, I made the type of mistake that you only get to make once. I spent the next three years of my life in a county jail facility as I awaited the ominous "day in court." Finally, my day arrived, and I was summarily tried, convicted, and sentenced to a life sentence. I was 19. As is typical of the state prison mill system, I was transferred to a juvenile facility. That is where I met Khalil. Khalil is the best friend I have ever had. What we shared was a true "bromance." For nearly two years after my arrival, he and I spent the greater portion of every day together. We ate together, exercised together, hustled, matured, laughed, and eventually cried together. One night they transferred Khalil to an adult facility. The separation was catastrophic for both of us. We were mutually best friends. We have never seen each other again since that night.

I was pretty messed up for about a month. I would stay in my cell and listen to music because I had no one to spend time with. That is how I heard the song *One More Day*, by Diamond Rio. The very first time that I heard it, it was about Khalil and me. Every time that I would hear it, I hurt, and I cried. And then I started thinking. I started thinking about my thinking and my behavior. I did not know what metacognitive thought was at the time, but that is what I began to do. As I thought, I began to make personal declarations:

- 1. I will stop crying,
- 2. I will never listen to *One More Day* again because it makes me cry, and
- 3. I will never let anyone else into my heart.

I had concluded that a loving relationship with another human being in here was something that I could not afford to enjoy. I know that sounds crazy, but it is the only way to survive. None of the relationships within a prison are immune to the effects of separation, a separation that is not volitional. Every time you say good bye to someone who walks through a gate or locks down

The Idiot

I get mad at You for the mess I've made with my hands and my plans. I cry out for guidance after taking my own directions. I ask for Your wisdom only to make my own decisions. And still, You love me.

I bleat in fear of finding myself alone, only to wander further away. I pray for answers but I don't take them when they're given. I seek Your protection before diving off the cliff. And yet, You love me.

I am an idiot, one of Your sheep. My only hope is You, there is no greater Shepherd. My life is not my own, You are the reason for living. You love me

Despite this,

for the evening, it could be the last time that you see them. The case is not particular to myself; rather, it is typical of the development and maintenance of relationships in the prison context. Imagine a world where everyone believes that they cannot afford to love or be loved by another. That is prison.

People say that time heals all wounds...that isn't true. I still hurt when I think about him. In seventeen years, that wound has not healed at all; in fact, it has grown. Now, I often choose to exercise metacognition, and I have found that the wound affects not only the way I approach relationships in the prison context, but also relationships with people outside of prison. The more that I have thought about it, the more I realize that I have maintained fidelity to those three declarations:

- 1. I don't cry anymore,
- 2. I don't entertain anything related to someone that I care about in such a way that it makes me vulnerable, and
- 3. There is a line between my heart and the world, and I cannot afford to let anyone cross it.
- I have always expected that elements of prison would become inextricably part of myself, and I will carry those things for all of my life. Ironically,

some of these things constitute the better part of me, but I never imagined that I may have to live the rest of my life in a prison of emotional isolation. I am left with this sobering thought: At some point along the way, I chose to set aside a part of my humanity as a means of self-preservation, but in setting it aside I may have inadvertently killed it. Sadly, though this is my story, it is the truth of many tens of thousands of incarcerated people.

Friend's reply: Though you may have inadvertently killed part of your humanity, it can be resurrected by the love found in Jesus Christ. Nothing or no one can separate you from His love, nor is there anywhere you can go to escape His presence. He cannot lie to you, He cannot die on you; He won't divorce you, neither will He disappoint you. If you go to the hole, He is there; if you get transferred, He is there. He knew you before you were born and called you be name. He has a purpose and a plan for your life; and He has prepared a place for you and all of your brothers to meet up again. I assure you, He

won't leave you wishing for "one more day"!

It is better to live one year free, than to live a thousand years barricaded, hiding from the devil your entire life, hounded by fear. Those persons who are too weak to live by what they believe are misfits and failures. Sad to say, but you see more fear in the church than anywhere else. People go to church, talk about how wonderful Jesus is, then get on a job and are afraid to mention His name. The world will blow its beer breath in our faces, try to force their filthy jokes on us, and yet we try to hide what God has done for us. We are disciples of the Lord. We need to stand up, proclaim what we are, and say to them, "I am a Christian. I belong to God". It takes more courage to do that, than it does to ball up your fist and hit somebody. Jesus said, "Whoever shall smite thee on my right cheek, turn to him the other also," Matthew 5:39. That takes more courage than it does to hit him back. The person who is afraid to live by what he believes is a misfit. God is looking for quality, not quantity. It is a fact of life that the closer you get to Calvary, the less people there are. When Jesus was out on the hillside of Galilee breaking bread and feeding the multitudes, there were thousands there to watch the religious show. But as Jesus moved toward Calvary and said to that multitude, "except you eat of my flesh and drink my blood, you have no part of me." John 6:53. They left Him in droves. They were saying in effect, "we didn't come out here to be told this kind of stuff. We are not here for you to tell us we are going to have to suffer, we are here to watch the miracles". Then they walked off and left Him. Pentecost didn't come out of a full-page ad in the Jerusalem Post or three hundred television stations. It came out of God's terrible dealings with twelve men. He squeezed every emotion, every ambition, until He broke them. They said, "Let me sit on thy right hand". Jesus said, "It isn't for Me to give". He pulled them from the tax office, doctor's office and fishing boats and moved them out. When He left them, they were empty, broken, and bruised, and it was into that broken vessel that Pentecost came the first time. It will be to that same kind of vessel. He will come the second time. God looks for quality, not quantity. He changed the world with a handful of people. It isn't that big, soft underbelly religious crowd that will make a difference today. It is that quality of believer that when he has done all to stand, he stands. The only thing necessary is to know you are right, then to stand for that which is right. God will stand with such people. God never uses the undecided. They have no place in

the kingdom of God. It is those that cut every shoreline and say, "It is Jesus or nothing". This gospel is worth everything, or it is worth nothing. God wants us to come to the place where all shorelines are cut, and we rest our case in the fact that this gospel is the answer. We not only have the Truth, we have become the Truth. We stand in the mist of this crooked and perverse generation that is going in the wrong direction and say to it, "this is the way, walk ye in it". God is calling for disciples of courage. He can never use the undecided. God wants soldiers; you must make up your mind. "A double minded man is unstable in all his ways". (James 1:8)

You must come to the place of conviction where there is no detraction. God wants your life, and for Him to have it, you must lose it. God isn't looking for Sunday only saints. He does not need people who only pray through when they are in trouble. He wants you to talk to Him. In 2 Chronicles 7:14, God says "If My people which are called by My Name, will humble themselves, and pray, and seek My face, and turn from their wicked ways; then will I hear from heaven and will forgive their sin, and heal their land". When He says to pray and seek my face, He is not being redundant. Heathens pray, Muslims pray, Hindus pray, but to seek the face of God is to seek the presence of the Almighty, not just to get something out of Him, but also to have fellowship with God. God is not a God of convenience. His desire is not toward a people who patronize Him on Sunday and on Monday live like the devil. He wants a people who every moment of every day is occupied with Him. A people who are not excited about what God did for them, but a people who are excited about God Himself. God does not have to have you, but you have to have God. Sin is a mark of weakness. When we speak of worldliness, we are not referring to the way someone dresses or the places they go. Someone who is worldly is someone who is influenced by the wrong system.

We are on this earth to do the will of God. Whatever else we do is only a means to do what God has called us to do. God's will is for us to be a vessel through which God can live. We are here to be filled with the Holy Ghost, and then wherever we go, God is there. You must have the courage of conviction to manifest God. Now whether men want God or not is immaterial. You must let them know about God. If we are afraid to be different, then we are of no value to God. If you are a Christian, you are different. The world has nothing like God, and if you are a real Christian, they are going to know that you are different. If you are afraid to be different, you will die with the crowd. God will leave you. Stand up and proclaim Christ wherever you are.

All sin is a manifestation of weakness. Lying is an attempt to hide the defects of your character. Cursing demonstrates you lack of ability to express yourself. It is true; a drunk man's action is a sober

man's thought. The drinking man doesn't have courage without liquor to do what he wants to do. Paul said, "I can do all things through Christ which strengthened me". (Philippians 4:13) I can love, I can believe, I can stand, and I can be faithful through Christ Jesus.

No matter how wicked the times, God has never needed anything but militant, courageous disciples. In Noah's day, when the world had gotten so rotten that God had to destroy it by a flood, all God needed was a militant preacher. Noah was one of the most effective preachers that ever lived. He stood in the midst of that crooked, perverse generation and proclaimed the gospel of deliverance to all who would hear. True disciples know that what God has placed at the center of civilization, His church, affects the whole. Knowing this, they are not afraid to strike at the heart of the matter. That is, the cheap grace that is being sold in the market place! The sacraments, forgiveness of sin, baptism, and the consolations of faith, are being thrown away at cut-rate prices. The modern church preaches a Heaven without a Hell, communion without discipline, and church membership without fruits of righteousness. Caught up in this tide of cheap grace, the church refuses to proclaim the whole counsel of God for fear of offending those worldly souls who will grade the church on a Sunday morning and claim to be disciples of God yet will live like the devil on Monday. The church must say to such people, you cannot live like the devil and have God working within you. The disciples were not afraid to lift their voices against such mockery. dedication wasn't to success, it was to Jesus Christ. Grace is represented as the church's inexhaustible treasure, from which she showers blessings without asking questions of fixing limits. We print books that only contain the promises of God and

dare to call them the Word of God. No one has the right to claim a promise of God that is taken out of context. We must know that God is looking for quality, not quantity. It takes great courage to be a disciple of the Lord in this wicked and perverse generation. It is into this work that God has called us.
