## Stacey Leakey, PhD, IMH-E

Dr. Stacey Leakey grew up in rural Missouri where everything on the table for dinner came from the garden the same day, and the family's whole focus was tending to and growing things that flourish. Her genes and early life experiences drive a passion for growth, wellness, and generativity. Dr. Leakey has worked in the field of Infant Mental Health (IMH) and child abuse prevention and treatment for the past 25 years. She is the owner and principal at O2 Consulting, LLC where she provides training in trauma-informed and evidence-based practices in infant and early childhood mental health, helping mental health systems and stakeholders apply this knowledge via regular consultation. She was the Infant Mental Health Community Consultant for the Parent-Child Center in Tulsa for 6 years where she was responsible for building an infant mental health community of practice, training Child Welfare stakeholders and legal systems to apply the science of early childhood development in the courtroom, and preparing the community for IECMH interventions and practices. She is the consultant for the Tulsa County Safe Babies Court Team, the state's first infant mental health specialty court where she supports judges, attorneys, law enforcement, and medical professionals in both their work and in recognizing the impact of their work on them personally.

Dr. Leakey served on the Board of Directors of the Oklahoma Association for Infant Mental Health (OK-AIMH) for many years and is Endorsed as an Infant Mental Health Mentor by OK-AIMH. Dr. Leakey's current focus is on the mitigation of secondary traumatic stress for individuals working in relationship-based interventions and the enhancement of trauma stewardship to sustain the workforce in the helping professions, specifically through the utilization of reflective practice supports.

Andi Hamilton is in her 19th year as a Special Agent with the Oklahoma State Bureau of Investigation (OSBI). She became a Licensed Clinical Social Worker in 1999. She specializes in forensic interviews, undercover calls, and child maltreatment investigations. Andi has been qualified as an expert in child sexual abuse dynamics and forensic interviewing in state, federal, and military courts in Oklahoma. She is currently assigned to the Oklahoma First Responders Wellness Division (FRWD) as a certified Peer Support Leader and EMDR provider, working with first responders on their work-related traumas. She also assists other agents and agencies on their child maltreatment cases. Andi worked in Major Crimes and Internet Crimes Against Children/Child Abuse Response Team (ICAC/CART) in her first 15 years at the OSBI.



**James Marks, LCSW**

James Marks has been employed as the Executive Director for the Oklahoma State Board of Licensed Social Workers since January 2011. ## **OPENING KEYNOTE: Thursday, April 9: 8:00am-10:00am**

### **Solidarity, Advocacy, and Change through Relationships**

**Stacey Leakey, PhD, IMH-E**

This presentation will focus on solidarity, advocacy, and change. Participants will learn how relationships are important for learning and change and the needed awareness through our own reflective practice

## **ETHICS: Friday, April 10: 8:00am-11:00am**

### **Using AI Responsibly in Therapy: Administrative, Clinical, & Ethical Considerations**

**Antoinette Martinez, M.Ed., LPC-S, RPT-S**

This workshop explores practical, ethically, and clinically sound ways to integrate AI into therapy. Participants will learn how to use AI to streamline business operations and workflow, support administrative and documentation processes, enhance clinical work within sessions without compromising the therapeutic relationship. This presentation will also address how to respond when clients bring AI into the therapy space, including conversations about boundaries, confidentiality, and emotional resilience on technology. Emphasis is placed on informed consent, ethical decision-making, and therapist competence. This presentation is designed for those seeking realistic, responsible AI integration.

### **Behind the Headlines: Female Sexual Offense Patterns in Oklahoma Incident Reports**

**Andi Hamilton, LCSW, Special Agent**

Public safety institutions, social workers, and communities increasingly recognize that female sex offenders embody a distinct dimension of sexual violence that historically has been under-identified, minimized, and excused. Up until the last 15 years, public narratives and professional assumptions framed sexual offending almost exclusively as a male-perpetrated issue, which shaped investigative priorities and victim treatment as well as civil and criminal court procedures. That gendered blind spot contributed to gaps in detection, inconsistent reporting, and inadequate services for victims whenever the alleged or confirmed perpetrator was female. Emerging awareness re-frames female-involved sexual offending as a legitimate safety concern requiring specialized training for communities, public safety personnel, and treatment providers. Using recent data from the Oklahoma state incident-based reporting system (SIBRS), this workshop will examine the demographic, geographic, temporal, and offense-type patterns for female sex offenders in the Oklahoma SIBRS data.

### **Oklahoma State Board of Licensed Social Workers—Legislative and Agency Updates**

**James Marks, LCSW**

Executive Director, James Marks, will provide an overview of legislative activity and agency policy changes impacting the profession of Social Work in Oklahoma. Presentation will address the Interstate Compact, increase in agency staffing, and title change for the Bachelor's level license. Additionally, Mr. Marks will address policy changes regarding HB3015 and continuing education requirements.

**WS1: Cultivating Leadership Through Engagement: The Impact of Social Work Student Organization Involvement on Professional Development and Practice**

*Toni Hail, PhD, LCSW; Hailey Fields, BSW, CMII, MSW Student; Aidan Oarker, BSW Student*

This interactive workshop explores how involvement in social work student organizations cultivates leadership skills, professional identity, and readiness for practice. Grounded in principles of experiential learning and transformational leadership, this session examines how student-led engagement fosters confidence, advocacy, collaboration, and innovation. Presenters will share findings from previous research on the relationship between organizational involvement and leadership growth in BSW and MSW students, highlighting innovative practices that promote inclusion, advocacy, and professional readiness.

**WS2: Healing-Centered Practice: Serving Survivors of Sexual Violence**

*Emily Getzfreid, LMSW*

This workshop will help participants develop an understanding of the history, health care, and social injustices of Native Americans that have led to healthcare system disparities. With a shorter life expectancy and increasing numbers of early deaths among Native Americans each year, many individuals of this population are uninsured and lack access to viable healthcare.

**WS3: ER Social Workers: Advocates for Change (Considerations for the Complex Mental Health Needs of Veterans)**

*Kimberly Peck, MSW, LCSW; Vicky Brooks, MSW, LCSW; Brock Neely, MSW, LCSW*

This workshop explores how social workers can address the complex mental health needs of Veterans through trauma-informed practice, cultural responsiveness, and advocacy. This interactive workshop highlights real-world strategies for crisis engagement, assessment, and collaboration. Using case examples from emergency, hospital, and community contexts, participants will identify practical approaches to assessment, intervention, and collaboration that improves outcomes for Veterans and their families.

**WS4: Calendars, Clutter, and Connection: Making Love Work with ADHD**

When ADHD shows up in a relationship, it doesn't just forget to take out the trash—it forgets the date night, interrupts stories, and buys three planners to fix it. Before long, those small moments can turn into big disconnections. As social workers, we often meet couples stuck in loops of blame, shame, and misunderstanding, unsure how something as treatable as ADHD can feel so personal. In this lively, hands-on workshop, we'll look beyond the missed details to explore the emotional reality of ADHD in intimate relationships. Drawing from ACT and EFT, we'll practice ways to help couples move from reactivity to intention, from frustration to empathy, and from distance to secure connection.

**WS5: The Mind-Body Connection: Restoring Regulation Through Sound, Movement, and Voice**

*Matthew Gibbons, LCSW; Lacey Howell, LCSW*

This experiential workshop invites participants to explore the healing power of sound, movement, and body. Using singing bowls, rattles, chimes, meditation, and gentle vocalization, attendees will experience how rhythm and vibration support nervous system regulation and emotional grounding. Rooted in trauma-informed and somatic principles, this session offers practical techniques that can be integrated into both professional practice and personal self-care.

**CONCURRENT WORKSHOPS II: 1:35pm-3:05pm**

**WS6: The Journey From a Peer Recovery Support Specialist to a College Degree**

*Carolyn Cox, PhD, LCSW; Sabrina Harrison, BSW Student; Mark Roberst, BSW, MSW Student*

The Peer Recovery Support Specialist (PRSS) role is an important part of mental health wellness and substance abuse recovery in Oklahoma. Sometimes, they decide to continue to college and earn a degree. With the growing shortage of social workers in the U.S. labor force, understanding the factors that organizational leaders can leverage to motivate and support employees attending college may be essential to addressing these workforce gaps. The workshop objectives are to explore the role of a PRSS in Oklahoma and to identify barriers and support efforts from the perspective of two current college students.

**WS7: Say What You Mean: Practical, Client-Led Tools for Working with Neurodivergent Clients**

*Mary Marlin, LCSW*

This informative, hands-involved session shows how precise language and client-led activities turn vague aims into routines neurodivergent clients can actually use between sessions. We will replace “high/low functioning” labels with support-needs framing, practice translating implied speech into clear, literal phrasing, and rewrite common goals into observable steps with simple measures and time anchors. Through brief vignettes and group activities, attendees will refine the tools that respect autonomy while lowering cognitive overload. Plus, attendees will get wording that satisfies insurers without infantilizing clients. This workshop is designed for clinicians, case managers, and anyone else who works with clients who are neurodivergent.

**WS8: Opioid Use and Pain: The Good, the Bad, and the Ugly (ADS)**

For years, opioids were used as the mainstay of any pain issue. Due to multiple issues colliding, a “perfect storm” occurred, causing the President to declare an opioid epidemic. What are opioids actually good for when it comes to pain? What is the difference between being prescribed opioids and misuse of opioids? What are the difficult conversations we need to have around opioids and pain, and how do we have them? This interactive workshop will look at the above and more in a world that grows more confusing by the day and with more people having pain than ever before.

**WS9: Risks in Our Geriatric Population: The Intersection Between Social Isolation, Despair, Mental Health Crises, and Online Scams**

Online scams are prevalent in the elderly population, and social isolation increases the risk of an elderly person falling victim to scammers. In addition, older adults consistently have one of the highest suicide rates of any age group. Understanding the specific circumstances that can lead up to becoming involved in a scam, as well as planned treatment at the crisis point when the elder recognizes what happened, is vital for the best possible outcome for our aging population.

**WS10: Digital Wellness in Clinical Practice: Integrating Mental Health in a Hyperconnected World**

This training is designed to help mental health providers understand the psychological and physiological impacts of digital technology on clients. Participants will learn to assess clients’ digital habits and technology use patterns with a focus on how these habits affect sleep, attention, anxiety, and social connection. The training also covers digital wellness strategies. Finally, providers will reflect on their own digital habits and professional boundaries in telehealth and online practice with an emphasis on modeling healthy digital engagement to prevent burnout.

**WS11: Infertility and Mental Health: When the Body and Dreams Collide**

*Laura Jacobs, LCSW*

Infertility is a deeply personal and painful experience that has significant implications for mental health and daily life. This workshop is for mental health professionals who want to learn more about how infertility and infertility treatments impact client's lives, identities, and overall wellness. Participants will learn the unique needs and challenges of clients in this population and explore ways to offer meaningful support.

**WS12: Brainspotting: Healing from the Inside**

*Jerri Prescott, LCSW, Brainspotting Certified*

Brainspotting is a powerful brain-body therapy that helps uncover and release unprocessed trauma stored deep in the nervous system. This workshop introduces participants to the science behind Brainspotting, explains how "where you look affects how you feel", and demonstrates how it supports lasting emotional healing. Attendees will learn how Brainspotting can reduce anxiety, ease PTSD symptoms, support grief recovery, and other areas of life. Whether you are seeking personal growth or professional understanding, this workshop offers insight into a gentle yet highly effective approach to improving mental health, resilience, and overall well-being.

**WS13: Bridging Worlds, Culture, Care, and Connection: Transracial Fostering and Adoption of African-American Children**

*Premadonna Braddick, LPC; Derrick Braddick, LPC*

This workshop explores the complex dynamics of transracial fostering and adoption, with a focused lens on African-American children placed in families of different racial and cultural backgrounds. Participants will engage with the historical, psychological, and social realities that shape these experiences. We will examine how race, identity, and culture intersect in the lives of transracially adopted children—and what that means for foster and adoptive parents committed to raising them with dignity, awareness, and authenticity. This session will challenge participants to think critically and compassionately about what it means to parent across racial lines in a society shaped by structural inequality.

**WS14: The Intersection of Youth Sexual Health and Social Work**

*Jennifer Briggs, LMSW*

Sexual health and well-being are fundamental to individuals, couples, and families and are deeply tied to holistic health. Helping professionals hold a unique position in supporting health sexual development and healthy sexual choices alongside their adolescent clients. Participants will learn about the current state of adolescent sexual health in Oklahoma, identify their role in supporting healthy sexual development and decision making, and learn about local and regional resources for further learning.

**WS15: The Center Within: Restoring Presence in Clinical Social Work**

*Casie Brittain, LCSW, RPT-S*

In the demanding world of clinical social work, presence is both our greatest tool and most vulnerable resource. This workshop invites participants to explore mindfulness as a pathway to renewal—for both therapist and client. Participants will learn practical mindfulness-based strategies to use with children and families while cultivating their own grounded awareness. Emphasis will be placed on how self-awareness and mindful presence enhance therapeutic effectiveness, boundaries, and resilience in clinical practice.

**WS16: Empowering Our Students: Integrating OER's in Social Work Education for Inclusive Learning**

*Destany Schafer-Morgan, DSW, LMSW; Amy Ward, DSW, LCSW; Shelley Bailey, MSW, LCSW; Christopher Graham, DSW, LCSW; Shawna Bishop, MLIS*

ECU Social Work faculty will discuss how they have attempted to reduce barriers to obtaining a social work degree, aiming to address the ongoing shortage of social workers in the U.S. Social Work students face distinct challenges, including financial constraints that can hinder their ability to complete a degree. This session will highlight our program's initiative to integrate Open Educational Resources and develop open-access materials to support student learning.

**WS17: Empowerment in Practice: Disrupting Learned Helplessness Through Ethical Advocacy**

*Amanda Pippin, AAS, BHCMI*

In the helping profession, our instinct to support can sometimes shift into over-functioning, unintentionally reinforcing patterns of dependency and helplessness. This interactive workshop explores the clinical and ethical tension between empowering clients and enabling them, particularly when working with individuals navigating trauma, homelessness, systemic oppression, or chronic instability. Participants will learn how learned helplessness develops as a survival strategy, how it can evolve into strategic or unconscious incompetence, and what it means for case managers, social workers, and practitioners trying to foster lasting client change.

**WS18: From Memorization to Meaning-Making: Developing Clinical Thinking Through Inquiry-Based Case Work**

*Allison Mason, LCSW; Hailey Fields, BSW, CMII, MSW Student; Jason Featherthngill, MPA, BSW, MSW Student; Patrick Bolding, BSW, MSW Student*

New and emerging clinicians often struggle to move beyond summary toward deeper, meaningful understanding of client systems. This session introduces an inquiry-based approach to case conceptualization that helps practitioners ask better questions, separate observable facts from interpretation, identify what information is missing, and consider cultural and ethical dimensions of client work. Emphasis is placed on clinical identity development and the use of inquiry to support reflective supervision conversations. This session aims to build confidence in navigating uncertainty and strengthen the critical thinking habits that anchor competent, responsive practice

**WS19: It's a Twin Thing: Considerations for Working with Twin Loss Survivors**

Grief and loss are always unique experiences, but twins and multiples that survive the death of their wombmate face additional challenges that are often overlooked by clinicians. This workshop is designed to educate clinicians on the uniqueness of the twin/multiple relationship, factors that contribute to complicated grief, effective therapeutic interventions, and available support resources.

**WS20: Neurofeedback and Healing: A Personal and Clinical Perspective**

*Anna Raab, MA, MFT, BCN*

Come learn what neurofeedback is and how it works to truly bring health and healing. You will leave this workshop with a deep appreciation of the power of neurofeedback and what exactly it can do for mental health and brain disorders. Anna is passionate about education in this field and will also share her own personal experiences helping people closest to her.

**WS21: Beyond the Desk: Social Work in Non-Traditional Public Safety Roles**

*Lori Brown-Loftis, LCSW; Sarah Parks, LCSW*

This workshop will explore innovative applications of social work within the Oklahoma City Fire Department (OKCFD), highlighting how social workers are embedded in non-traditional, frontline public safety roles. These roles demonstrate how social workers can be change agents within systems not traditionally associated with the profession. This workshop will highlight how these positions were developed, the impact they have had on both the community and the fire services, and how other agencies can replicate similar models.

**WS22: The Many Faces of Me: Clinical Weaving in Understanding Dissociative Identity Disorder (DID)**

*Gina Pazzaglia, PhD, LCSW, LADC*

Dissociative Identity Disorder (DID) remains one of the most misunderstood and stigmatized mental health conditions. This interactive workshop introduces participants to The Many Faces of Me framework, a clinical weaving of client narratives, metaphors, and evidence-based practice. Participants will explore the complexity of alters, fugue states, and the neurological differences between DID and PTSD. The session emphasizes clinical approaches that balance respect for the client's lived experience with sound therapeutic boundaries. Participants will leave with a deeper understanding of DID and practical strategies for engaging clients in meaningful, safe, and effective treatment.

**WS23: Integrating Mindfulness into Addiction Treatment (ADS)**

*Greg Suttmiller, LPC, LADC/MH*

Addiction is a multi-faceted struggle. Continued use over time can change the brain in ways that make cravings very difficult to resist. People in active addiction and as well as people in recovery often battle shame, fear, hopelessness, and low self-worth. CBT is often referenced as a best practice for treating addiction. While CBT can be very beneficial, it does not always adequately address the cravings and intense feelings addicted individuals experience. Mindfulness can help fill the gaps left by other treatment modalities. This workshop will show why and how mindfulness should and can be used in the treatment fo addiction.

**WS24: Beyond Burnout: Demoralization and the Path to Re-Moralization**

*Elizabeth Fletcher, LCSW*

Increasingly, therapists are leaving the profession or turning to life coaching or other non-clinical work not only because of burnout but because of demoralization. Unlike burnout, demoralization cannot be addressed by individuals changing things that are within their control, like getting more sleep or having better boundaries. Demoralization occurs when workers are unable to access the sources of satisfaction that made their work worthwhile. This often involves social, economic, or policy changes that are out of therapists' control. How do we cope with this? How can we stay connected to the elements of our work that matter most to us, even when the world is on fire and we feel powerless? In this interactive workshop, Liz Fletcher will introduce the concept of demoralization, present research depicting the problem of demoralization among helping professionals, and lead collaborative efforts to work toward re-moralization.

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# PRESENTERS

**Shelley Bailey, MSW, LCSW:** Shelley Bailey is an Instructor of Social Work at East Central University in Ada, OK. She realized the benefits of open educational resources last year and set out to create her first OER course in Spring 2025, which she released to students in Summer 2025. The responses garnered from students were positive and she is excited to share her experience with you.

**Shawna Bishop, MLIS:** Shawna Bishop is the Instructional Services Librarian at East Central University in Ada, OK. She received her MLIS from San Jose University in 2021 and began working at ECU in July 2021. She has a passion for helping students access the information they need to be successful. Over the past four years, her work with Open Educational Resources has helped faculty members maintain agency over their teaching materials while providing students access to affordable education.

**Patrick Bolding, BSW:** Patrick Bolding is a MSW student and HRSA BHWET Rural Recovery and Resilience Scholar with Northeastern State University School of Social Work. After graduating high school, he immediately joined the United States Army as an Infantryman with the 10th Mountain Division. During his services, he deployed to both Iraq and Afghanistan, where he experienced the challenges and sacrifices of combat firsthand. During his final deployment, he was wounded by an RPG-7. His professional interests focus on working with veterans and individuals struggling with PTSD, and his goal is to provide the kind of help and understanding that he wishes he would have received when he first returned home to Oklahoma as a disabled veteran.

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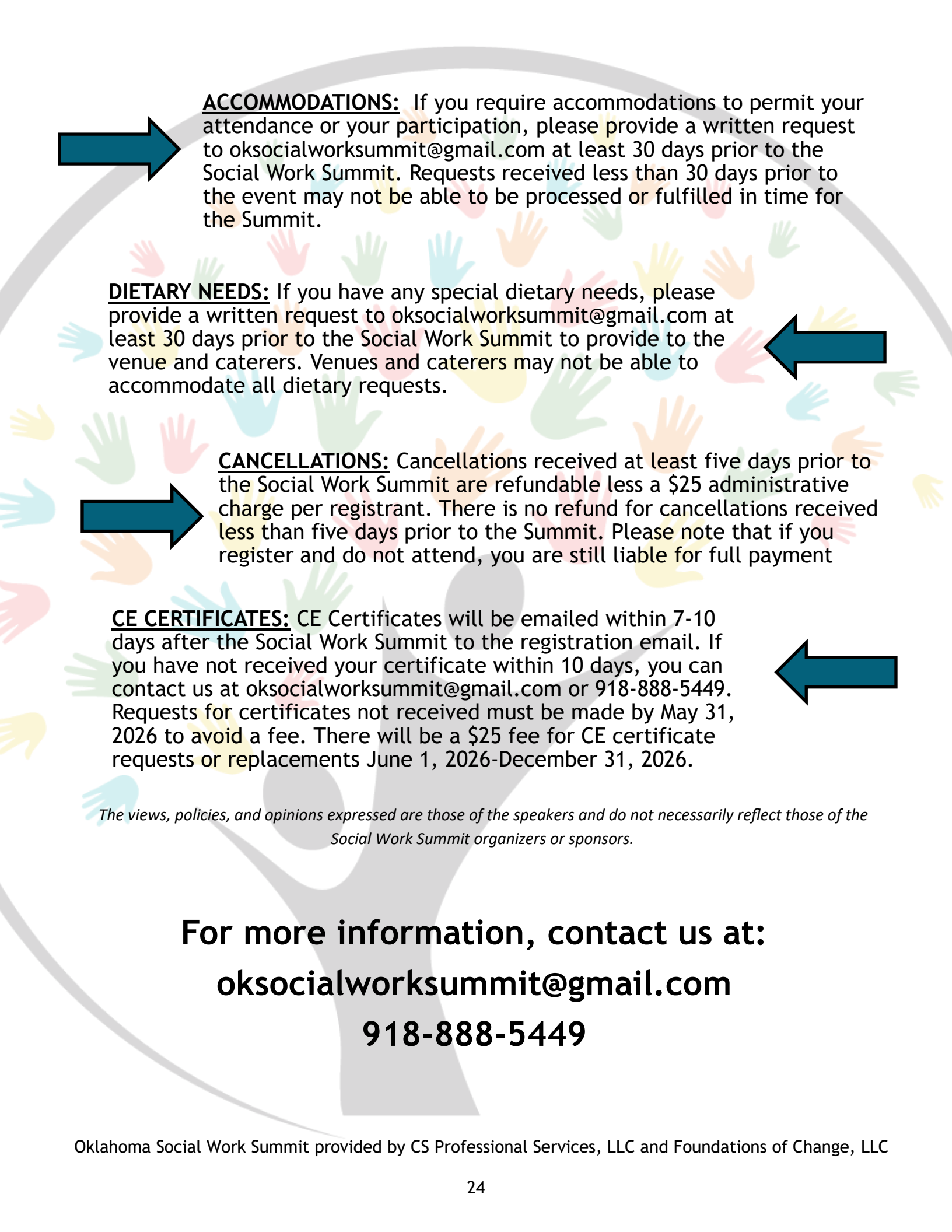
