Parish Election Charges

Town & Parish Councils received an email from the leader informing them that a report to be considered by Cabinet on Monday 6 December 2021, recommending that the cost of Parish and Town Council elections be charged to the local councils rather than being met by the District Council. The item has been postponed until the January 2022 Cabinet meeting to give time for consultation. However many Parish Councils don't meet in January and most have already set their precepts for the coming year.

I was excluded from the correspondence, leaving me in the dark when some of you contacted me about this. The CEO has since been in touch to apologise for the omission.

Parish Councillors have voiced concerns to me that this might affect the fairness of the Democratic process and that people will be dissuaded from standing for Parish Council positions owing to the cost to the Parish. This was the reason why CDC adopted election charges in 1996.

The Chief Executive Officer of GAPTC (The Gloucestershire Association of Parish and Town Councils, an independent support, training and advisory body for councillors) has emailed Parish Councillors advising: "You need to be raising any concerns with CDC about the lack of pre-consultation and not giving parish and town councils the opportunity to discuss this within their councils; nor has any representation been sought to contribute to the Cabinet paper. Any responses should include your district councillor."

Another missive and apology was sent to Parish Councils admitting errors with the figures in the report but insisting the Council intend to proceed with the proposal. Here are the corrected figures.

Parishes will be greatly influenced by the decision of the Cabinet on 10 January regarding election charges, as it will affect how they set the precept for financial year 2022-23. One Ermin Ward village estimates this would require an increase in the precept of around 300%.

Virtual meetings for town and parish councillors were quickly scheduled for 16 and 22 December for Parish clerks and others. This was rushed and very inconvenient being so close to Christmas. You can download the Cabinet paper here.

If enacted, the proposals will come into effect on 1 April 2023 meaning the first charge for contested town and parish council elections would be for the four-yearly full council elections in May 2023.

CANNABIS FARM FLY TIP

On 20 December I met Kev Lea, the Environment Officer responsible for fly tipping, at Bullbanks where the remains of a spent cannabis farm had been tipped. This was the second cannabis farm fly-tip in Ermin Ward, the other was larger, about 50 bags near Frampton Mansell, which was cleared within 14 hours of being reported. Did anyone spot the vehicle? If you see a van loaded up with rubbish, ask yourself 'could this be a fly tipper?'. Your vigilance could help catch these criminals.

COUNTY COUNCIL BUDGET

The budget includes £100 million for roads, funding for 26-miles of cycle track from Stroud to Bishops Cleeve, £150 million for schools, investment in market towns and support and protection for the most vulnerable.
