

SO WHERE'S THE BIAS?







Remediation often assumes that students are defined by their academic gaps,

emphasizing what they cannot do rather than leveraging their strengths or potential.



Students in remediation frequently miss out on engaging with grade-level content and enrichment opportunities, widening the achievement gap.

This creates a self-fulfilling prophecy: if students are not exposed to challenging material, they cannot develop the skills needed to succeed at higher levels.



Remediation can inadvertently lower expectations for students.
Educators may unconsciously believe that certain groups of students need simplified or "basic" content rather than challenging, grade-level material.




Remedial programs often group students with similar perceived deficiencies.

This reinforces biases about who "belongs" in advanced or regular classrooms and who does not.
