## 2018 West Virginia Chestnut Festival

The 11<sup>th</sup> annual 2018 WV Chestnut Festival, Sunday, October 7, was greeted with blue skies, and sunshine --- the order of the day.

Visitors came from miles around to visit the Park-by-the-River exhibits, enjoy the music, attending educated lectures on the Great American Chestnut Tree and simply enjoying the sites and the wonderful aroma of chestnuts being roasted on-an-openfire in the Park. The evening was capped off with the traditional chestnut banquet and the crowning of the 11th Mr. and Ms. Chestnut, Dr. Don Kines and Sheryl Kines. Those in attendance were entertained by beautiful choral music provided by the Madrigal singers from Preston High School, directed by Deborah Westbrook.

**The Kickoff.** The Festival kicked off at 10:30 a.m. with a hearty full breakfast in the Szilagyi Center Café, hosted by **Kathleen Wolfe Orescanin** and staff. We were honored by the presence and contributions throughout the entire day, by **Lisa Thomson**, CEO and President of The American Chestnut Foundation, headquartered in Asheville, NC.

The Crowd-in-the-Park. People came from all around to taste and enjoy one of two Chestnut Festivals open to the public in the 16 Appalachian States. George Nassif did outstanding work hosting a variety of Park

**Vendors**, including, scrumptulous chestnuts roasted on an open fire; chestnut vendors selling crafts, wares and small furniture; jarred chestnuts in honey; selling chestnut sapling trees; and networking with chestnut researchers. **WV Chapter Meeting**. Open to the public, was an informative meeting of the West Virginia Chapter of The American Chestnut Foundation (TACF), Mark Double presiding, Robert Sypolt, vice pres., Sam Muncy Treasurer, and Jeff Kochenderfer, Secretary. A highlight was a discussion of the many planting sites of American hybrid chestnut saplings.

Scientific Session Attendance. This was one of the "most attended and most enjoyed" by an attentive pubic-at-large.
