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Safety Issues . . .

Focus on Colstoun Rd

The AshfieldCAN is campaigning for a set of traffic lights at the intersection of Guildford Road and Colstoun Road.

This T junction is one of the main access points into and out of the suburb of Ashfield. We believe residents are finding this access point harder and harder to negotiate safely due to the increase of traffic volume and the speed cars tend to travel down Guildford Road, especially at rush hour.

There have been more than 24 accidents at the cost of over 1 million dollars in recent years at this intersection.

Compounding the issue of safe access into Ashfield is the fact that there is no safe access point for

cyclists to enter the suburb from the Principal Shared Path that has been installed adjacent to the railway line along Guildford Road. While the PSP is an excellent amenity to have for cyclists and pedestrians, it does need to be safely accessible from the suburb of Ashfield.

The AshfieldCAN is also aware that the pedestrian bridge that crosses above Guildford Road at this location to the Ashfield Train station is not compliant as a wheelchair access due to the steep gradient, making access to the train station difficult and possibly dangerous for the elderly and disabled residents in Ashfield.

We believe that Colstoun Road is and should remain the main entry point into the suburb of Ashfield.

The State Government needs to be up front and honest in the realistic prospect of funding for the plan and if funding for the existing plan is not achievable the following should be considered.

reassessing the proposed relocation of the Ashfield Train Station and realigning Colstoun Road as the centre of Ashfield.

Consideration should also be given for the installation of traffic lights to address the increasingly dangerous intersection of Colstoun and Guildford Road. The project scope should also include the provision for improved access to the Ashfield Train Station and also provide a crossing for cyclists to gain access onto the bike path on Guildford Road.

Together as a community, we can get real outcomes that will continue to ensure the urban revitalisation of Ashfield continues.

The AshfieldCAN is currently looking at ways of taking advantage of our new powerline free verges and developing this community asset for all.

We want to help mitigate the future loss of trees as rezoning occurs and infill means existing trees in gardens are lost. There are many environmental, economic and social benefits from the presence of trees in our suburbs.

More trees mean an improved streetscape, thereby increasing house and land values in the area. The shade and cooling provided by trees means a cooler suburb and energy savings for all as well as improved air quality.

By planting trees we encourage biodiversity, increase habitat for local fauna and build upon the important habitat area in Ashfield Flats.

We plan to; encourage council to plant more street trees on Ashfield verges. Discuss amendments to the existing street tree plan to take into account the fact that we no longer have any overhead powerlines. Encourage and support residents to replace lawns on verges with waterwise gardens.



Restoration Fence Ashfield Flats

A total of 4,150 plants have been ordered and are due to be planted in July-August 2013. The Town of Bassendean in conjunction with Swan River Trust have installed a temporary fence along the northern foreshore, this is to restrict public access to allow our revegetation works to establish.

In 2012 we had several of our plants removed and vandalised so the fence should deter river users from vandalising the vegetation. The towns weed contractor has already started weed control within the fenced area prior to planting.

Memories from long time Ashfield Residents

WHITE ROCKS (Where the steps are)

Before the channel was cut to create Ron Courtney Island, the water at White Rocks was very deep and two separate drownings occurred. Access to the river at this point was down a steep sand hill but that didn't deter the local kids from spending hours swinging from a rope on the big tree and doing bombies into the river.

Blue mana crabs could be caught with drop nets in late summer and cobbler pots were also used by some kids. Net fishing for mullet was sneakily carried out resulting in many Friday fish being delivered and sold from the boot of Mr. "R's" old car.


When the island was created it became a favourite place for our kids who paddled their canoe over to spend the night camped in their tent.

ASHFIELD FLATS

The flats was used by the McDonald family for their dairy herd. The dairy and farmhouse were located where West Road now turns into Sandy Beach. Milk was delivered overnight to many Bassendean households by Mr. McDonald in his horse drawn milk cart. After the dairy ceased, the flats were used by a few locals to train trotting horses and some of the inner tracks on the flats are the remains of this activity.

The regular flooding of the flats area provided kids in the 50s an opportunity to grab floating logs which were then "ridden" from Sandy Beach across the flats to White Rocks. Great fun but our mother's didn't know what we were up to.

A proposal to create a residential canal development of the flats area was strongly opposed by ratepayers. As a result of this the Bassendean Preservation Group embarked on a tree planting and restoration plan which is ongoing.

Pathways and bridges along the river have now made this section of the flats a pleasant walk for all to enjoy with abundant birdlife and dolphins sighted regularly.
