“Each member of Alcoholics Anonymous is but a small part of a great whole. A.A. Must continue to live or most of us will surely die. Hence, our common welfare comes first. But individual welfare follows close afterward. “When I was asked to share a story about my experience with any of the traditions, I was moved by the question itself. The request itself is the essence of AA tradition. I wasn't asked to talk about a tradition or to give my interpretation or explain how it works. I was asked to share my experience and, of course, I was compelled to say yes because that is what we do. It's tradition. That was how I finally became familiar with the traditions—by watching how others functioned and by taking some directions. I just didn't know what I was doing. I put money in the basket; I didn't bring in controversy or stir shit up. I didn't know how any of it worked or how AA happened, but I sure was glad it was there for me. Truth be told, fellowship was the last thing I wanted when I ended up in the rooms. Even though I had come from a place of miserable loneliness and despair, I didn't want to get too close to anyone. I made it a point of not staying in one place too long or getting overly involved for some years. I believe I was afraid that if you really knew me, you would run screaming or send me down the road kicking cans. There are still vestiges of that fear in me but now I know you can't throw me out; so here I am—a part of. I guess I began to experience the first tradition the first time I walked into a group, but it took me years to truly understand and appreciate it. What a gift. My AA friends and family mean the world to me. No matter where I go, AA is there with an open door, a welcoming smile and a cup of coffee. I have a ready fellowship just about anywhere I might land. More importantly, I might find someone to help. What a deal. Over the years I have discovered more and more how divine this tradition is, how spiritual. During the pandemic, so many members of AA stepped up to make sure that AA continued to live. Zoom meetings popped up everywhere and the physical groups stayed available wherever possible. I know in our group; we tried every manner and configuration to provide a safe space for meeting. We met outside when we could and followed all the protocol when we couldn't. Not everyone agreed on how things should go, but because of our traditions and the spiritual principle that our common welfare should come first, we prevailed and made it through. My experience is that the fellowship is an expression of my Creator. I am blessed to be a part of it.
