MASTER GARDENER VOLUNTEERS OF COBB COUNTY

We are definitely grateful for our Master Gardener crew who work at the gardens every week. Stop by early on Tuesdays to thank them in person. They recently planted the hillside behind the stable with perennials that will brighten the gardens come spring. Their focus now is preparing for winter. They work under the chairmanship of neighbor Kate Mason and always welcome volunteers.

Working toward being an accredited arboretum.

An arboretum is a living and accessible outdoor tree museum that serves the public. In 2011, ARBNET was organized with headquarters at the Morton Arboretum in Chicago. ARBNET set standards that are applied worldwide and they currently recognize only 26 arboreta in Georgia. There are four levels of accreditation. McFarlane qualifies for Level 1, which requires 1) an organizational group, (2) minimum of 25 different labeled trees or woody plants, (3) volunteers



or staff to care for trees, (4) one public tree related event per year, and (5) a written plan. Board member and Cobb County arborist David Griffin has provided Walk N Talks for us. The only thing we lack, is finishing our written plan.

Our tree brochure (available at the literature station beneath our sign board) lists 85 different tree species that live at McFarlane, and we are about to add the 86th—2 *Ilex opaca* American Hollies that will provide abundant berries for fall foraging birds like robins and cedar wax wings. All are native to the Piedmont area of Georgia.

Becoming accredited would improve public awareness of our native trees, make the Park eligible for funding opportunities, provide distinction within our community, and help insure the future of the Park.

CALENDAR Special events scheduled at McFarlane are coordinated through our calendar to insure compatible use of the Park and communication of responsibilities to park users. In 2024, over 100 specific events have been booked at the Park and they have included a wedding, CPWC events, school and church outings, neighborhood birthdays and other celebrations, as well as many scouting dates.
