www.whidbeymemorial.com. At Bill's request his remains will be spread on the mountains and the waters of the Pacific Northwest.



Monthly Meeting

General Membership Meeting: Thursday, January 25

This month's general membership meeting takes place at the Bellingham Golf and Country Club on Thursday, January 25, 2018, third Thursday. The evening begins at 6:00 P.M with The Wet Fly, a social time/open bar. Dinner follows at 6:45. The evening's program begins at 7:30 P.M. After the program, members are invited to stay for a business meeting: fish stories, introduction of guests, announcements, and various committee reports. It concludes with a raffle for ticket holders who are in attendance.

January's program guest has been selected by our Conservation Committee to keep us updated on efforts of local organizations that support wildlife habitats and actively seek solutions to protect these special areas. Gabe Epperson, the Conservation Director from Whatcom Land Trust will present an updated Land Conservation Plan that identifies priority areas of the County to focus acquisition and stewardship efforts. Gabe Epperson will also present public survey results with county residents' conservation preferences.

Gabe has a background in Urban Planning and large-scale environmental planning with a focus on public outreach. He was the Planning Director at Envision Utah for 5 years, completing the *Blueprint Jordan River* and *Wasatch Canyons Tomorrow* projects, which included thousands of Utah residents and led to the formation of the Jordan River Commission and the protection of hundreds of acres of wildlife habitat and recreation lands in the Salt Lake Metro area. Mr Epperson moved to Bellingham in 2015 to do land acquisition and conservation planning for the Land Trust. Since joining the Land Trust he has helped create a new Land Conservation Plan with public input from hundreds of Whatcom County residents and has led numerous land purchases and conservation easement acquisitions protecting many new farms and habitat areas.

Conservation Report

Happy New Year to you all!

Most recent news on the fish farming net pen operations came last week when Washington Public Lands Commissioner Hilary Franz closed down Cooke Aquaculture's Atlantic Salmon net pen operation near Port Angeles. Seems that during a recent inspection this net pen operation had numerous infractions noted including being in the wrong location, having at least one of its anchors close to failure and several instances of other equipment in poor condition. As you remember, Cooke is the same multi-national company whose net pens failed and sunk off Cypress Island. You would think that they would have been less cavalier about the conditions of their remaining net pen operations in Puget Sound after that fiasco. So they have a cease and desist order for their Port Angeles operation with no chance to turn around the decision by the Land Commission. It's good to know that certain state agencies are now monitoring the fish farming industry here and will start requiring them to meet their criteria for safe operation. I'll keep you posted as this whole issue unfolds thru the 2018 year.

All the rains have brought stream levels at or above max. so hopefully Whatcom, Squalicum, Padden and other local creeks will have good returns of Salmon.

After the awards presentation at our annual Christmas party Frank asked that I spell out which awards were given, who received them and what each award stands for.

Ed Ruckey Mentoring Award- For the member who has gone beyond the norm in helping other club members and/or non member to learn the art and science of fly fishing. In this case, Jamie Harrington received this award for his unflagging support of our Education activities at local schools, senior cancer center and BP Christmas fly tying extravaganza.

Linda Sherman Award-For a person who has provided extraordinary encouragement, education and support in advancing the participation of women in the sport of fly fishing and/or the aims of 4CFF. Cassandra Spitzer received this award for her major participation in the set up and organization of the Conservation Auction this past Fall and for becoming an active participant in other club activities.



WDFW to host public workshops on proposed Skagit Basin steelhead fishery

OLYMPIA – The Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife (WDFW) has scheduled meetings to discuss with the public a proposed recreational steelhead fishery in the Skagit Basin, where rivers have been closed to steelhead fishing for several years.

The public meetings are scheduled for 6 to 8 p.m. and include the following dates and locations:

- Mill Creek: Jan. 12, WDFW Regional Office, 16018 Mill Creek Blvd., Mill Creek
- **Sedro-Woolley**: Jan. 16, Sedro-Woolley Community Center, 702 Pacific St., Sedro-Woolley

At the meetings, state fish managers will discuss a proposal to allow fisheries for wild steel-head in the Skagit, Sauk and Suiattle rivers. These rivers have been closed to steelhead fishing since 2010 due to low numbers of returning fish. WDFW is proposing catch-and-release recreational fishing for wild steelhead.

"In recent years, we've seen more steelhead returning to the Skagit Basin than before we closed the rivers to fishing," said Edward Eleazer, WDFW regional fish program manager. "Given the low number of steelhead mortalities associated with this sport fishery, we don't expect it will harm efforts to recover steelhead populations."

The Skagit Basin steelhead proposal, developed by state and tribal co-managers, is pending approval from NOAA Fisheries. Dr. William R. Hall, age 92, passed away on October 26, 2017 at his home in Bellingham, Washington. Bill was preceded in death by his parents, Lynn and Alberta Hall, and sister, Betsy Reynolds. He is survived by his wife Dr. Norma J. Williams and her children: Brad Williams and Pamela Brant. Also surviving are his brother Jack Hall, Bill's first wife Rose Hall and their children: Bruce (Jenny) Hall, Cindy (Lee) Scovanner, Debra Finn and Kim (Doug) Stickney. Grandchildren are Austin (Tina) Hall, Amelia Hall, Anna Hall, Cassie (Mark) Scovanner-Bloom, Johnathan Scovanner, Melissa Scovanner, Chad Finn, Brian Finn, Tony (Lori) Finn, Greg Finn, Christopher Stickney and Caitlin (Nic) Mortelliti. A great grandson Connor (Tony and Lori) Finn and many nieces and nephews are also left behind.

William R. Hall was a fighter pilot (1943-1947) for the Army Air Corp and United States Air Force during World War II before graduating from the University of Northern Iowa with a Bachelor of Arts degree (1949) in Physical Education. He served the Waucoma Independent School District, Waucoma, Iowa as a high school teacher/coach/principal while he continued to serve his country by serving in the Air Force Reserves. Hall joined the Dubuque Community School District as a teacher (1953-1956) and earned a Master of Arts degree (1956) in Elementary Administration from the University of Northern Iowa. He served as a principal (1956-1983) in Dubuque before graduating from the University of Iowa with a Doctor of Philosophy degree (1985) in Educational Administration.

Dr. William R. Hall served as president of both District #1 and the Iowa Association of Elementary and Middle School Principals, and as a member of the UNI Graduate Advisory Committee. He served as president of District #1 Elementary Principals Association of Iowa and later Director of the Institute for School Executives (1983-1985), University of Iowa, Iowa City, Iowa. Hall served the College of Education, Western Washington University, Bellingham WA as a visiting professor (1985-1995). He was a member of the USA Air Force Reserves twenty four years (1950-1974) retiring at the rank of Major, serving as coordinator for the Iowa Air Force Reserves and liaison officer for the United States Air Force Academy. In addition, he received honorary life membership to the Scottish American Military Society in 2009.

Bill served as a senior volunteer on the Bellingham Police Department for 12 years. He also served as secretary of the Roche Harbor Yacht Club and President of the Fourth Corner Fly Fishers Club.


Bill Hall Memorial




