Monthly Meeting

This month's general meeting of the 4th Corner Fly Fishers will be held at the Bellingham Golf and Country Club on Thursday, January 26, 2017. The Wet Fly will begin at 6:00 P.M. with dinner at 6:45. The program will begin at 7:30 P.M.

We will be viewing segments of a new DVD to our library, *Top 85 Tips on Fly Fishing for Trout*, a series that teaches all aspects of fly-fishing from its very basic to its most advanced levels with host James Marsh whose profession is producing fishing and outdoor instructional videos. It includes the where, when and how to fish with specific tips on fly fishing gear, techniques, presentations, finding and approaching trout, and is designed to bring anglers a greater knowledge of the fish they pursue and the insects and other food sources they survive on. Over six years in production, the series of programs were digitally recorded in forty-four states on over 150 rivers, lakes and streams. Eighty-one are included in Trout Unlimited "America's Best 100 Trout Streams". This project was shot over many, many popular streams throughout the USA and the program starts out with a segment on the beautiful Blackfoot River in Montana where the movie "A River Runs Through It" was filmed. Our librarian believes this film offers something for everyone.

In addition to this preview, we will be viewing a couple of short films. The main feature of the evening is *The Super Salmon* which highlights the tale of one fish to illustrate the importance of the river to the wildlife, tourism, economy and lifestyle on Alaska's Susitna River, one of the world's biggest and healthiest wild salmon watersheds. It outlines the threat to its famous salmon runs and the potential consequences of constructing an enormous and outdated technology, a mega-dam, to meet Alaska's need for renewable energy. As part of studies done in advance, scientists radio-tagged a king salmon that made an unexpected and unbelievable journey.

During this month's business program we are privileged to host our annual awards ceremony. Members of our club will be recognized for their contributions and service to the club's programs and goals from 2016. We are fortunate to acknowledge these contributors and learn more about their outstanding work. Also, will be take a look at our 2017 club year. 
