The prerequisite for these activities isn't so much a high level of expertise as the willingness to serve, although I am amazed by the capability we constantly find in our membership!



Conservation Report

What a month was October! Not only did we have a very successful Conservation Auction, but we voted to take on a new conservation project at Squalicum Creek under the auspices of the City of Bellingham. Last week's fundraiser was the best one ever, so the Conservation Committee thanks all of you who participated and/or contributed to it's success. Special thanks go to members of the Conservation Auction Committee - Frank Koterba, Mike Reed, Larry Irwin, Bill and Paula Faulkner, Pete Lamb, Bob Cooper, and especially to the Chairman and his wife, Ed and Barbara Dahl. Be sure to give these folks an extra "Thank You" (maybe a beer!) next time you see them, as they spent many hours in the auction's preparations so that each of you could just show up and have a good time.

We have set a date for the Conservation Committee meeting for Monday, Nov. 16 at 7 pm at my house. This is when new organizations/projects are considered for monetary support by our club. All members are welcome to attend; so if you want to come, please reserve a spot on Event Brite. If you have a good idea for the committee's consideration, send me an Email ahead of that meeting date so we can bring it up for consideration.

Our new role at Squalicum Creek will be evolving as this newly established creek channel develops into its full potential as a salmon spawning area. 4CFF has adopted the new section of creek between James St. and the 15 overpass. Our early functions will be monitoring the newly laid creek channel for changes as the winter comes on, watching for invasive plant species, and doing general clean-up and maintenance of new plants. Any major plantings in the future along the creek will be accomplished by the City of Bellingham and NSEA, with our club participating in a minor capacity. At times, our club can supply funds for new bare root plants, help with redd surveys, and consider any other support functions that may be needed. So, now our club has a very local, interesting project that won't require the heavy work that was necessary at 10 Mile Creek and other projects.

Lastly, for those of you who want or need to get some Conservation hours in, here is a list for November 2015 projects available to you. Both groups provide boots, gloves, tools and refreshments.

NOOKSACK SALMON ENHANCEMENT ASSOC. 715-0283

Nov. 7th 9-12 am SQUALICUM CREEK - Join NSEA, Re Sources, and the Port of Bellingham to remove invasive vegetation and clean-up this lower section of Squalicum Creek. Parking is available at Squalaicum Park at 1001 Squalicum Way off the Squalicum Parkway. Look for signs and the blue NSEA tent.

Nov. 14th 9-12 am LITTLE SQUALICUM CREEK - Join NSEA and Bellingham Parks in restoring this section of Squalicum Creek. We will plant native trees, remove invasive weeds, and spread mulch. Park in the lower Technical College parking lot and follow the NSEA signs.

Nov. 21st 9-12am SOUTH FORK NOOKSACK RIVER - Join NSEA and Whatcom Land Trust to plant native trees and shrubs along the South fork Nooksack River near Acme, WA. From Bellingham, head east on Mt. Baker HWT (SR 542) for about 15 miles. Turn right onto HWY 9, just outside of Deming, and follow for about 7 miles. Turn right onto Tarkington Rd. Parking and shuttles are located at the Acme Elementary School.

SKAGIT FISHERIES ENHANCEMENT GROUP 360-336-0712 EXT 304 Carpooling recommended

NOV. 7th 10am to 1pm PLANTING AT COLONY CREEK - From I5, take Alger exit 240. Go right (east) on Lake Samish Rd. Take 1st right (south) onto Colony Rd. Follow Colony Rd. for 1.5 miles. Turn right (west) onto Fox Hollow Lane. Follow Fox Hollow Lane to the end (0.4 miles) and follow signs for parking.

Nov. 14th 10am to 1pm PLANTING AT SKAGIT RIVER AT DALLES BRIDGE -Take Hwy 20 east to Concrete. Turn south (right) just after mile post 88 (at Valleys West Realty) onto Concrete -Sauk Valley Rd. Just before the Skagit River bridge turn left onto Gordon Rd.

Nov. 21st 10am to 1pm PLANTING AT IRON MOUNTAIN RANCH - FROM Hwy 9 in Clear Lake turn left onto South Skagit Hwy and go east for about 15.5 miles. At around mile 15, a large open field will be visible on the left (north) side of the highway as well as a barn. Pull into the driveway to the barn and park along the circle driveway near the highway. There is no street address, so if you see one you're probably in the wrong driveway. If you cross O'Toole Creek, you've gone too far (unless you came from Concrete).
