# Monthly Meeting

#### **November 16, General Membership Meeting**

This month's general membership meeting takes place at the Bellingham Golf and Country Club on Thursday, November, 2017, third Thursday. <u>Please not that this is a change from the fourth Thursday to the third Thursday, November 16, due to the Thanksgiving Holiday.</u> The evening begins at 6:00 P.M with The Wet Fly, a social time/open bar. Dinner follows at 6:45. The evening's program begins at 7:30 P.M. After the program, members are invited to stay for a business meeting: fish stories, introduction of guests, announcements, and various committee reports. It concludes with a raffle for ticket holders who are in attendance.

Our speaker is Bob Warinner, a Fish and Wildlife Biologist, at Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife. His presentation "The Recovery and Sustainability of our Regional Fisheries in Light of a Changing Climate" covers topics including changes in food web dynamics, spawning success, and the effect of an over quickening of evolution of habitat. Included in the presentation will be predictions of global warming specific to our eregion and ideas on what we can do to help our fisheries adapt to them.

Maybe the first memory he can recall was fly fishing with his dad out at a lake in Northeast Washington. In the excitement of hooking a fish he would repeatedly reel the line all the way to the tip of the rod and de-hook the fish letting it drop back into the water. His father could not help his uncontrollable laughter; he was mortified. Despite that event, he continued to be an avid fly fisher for most of his life. His appreciation for fishing and general respect and appreciation for nature is somewhat responsible for seeking work at Fish and Wildlife.


He has spent almost his entire career in the habitat program with WDFW, with most of the time focused on salmon recovery and restoration on the Skagit River and in the San Juans. He has been lucky enough to work with many exceptional people throughout the Puget Sound region and has been involved with efforts to help people understand the impact that climate change will have on our local environment; specifically on salmon recovery. He feels that this issue is the most significant issue of the time when it comes to the possible extirpation of our regional salmon stocks.

# Conservation Report

#### Greetings to All You 4CFF's!

November is the month we finish up our conservation activities and also do a final check on our project sites. I'm very happy to report that after this summer's growth period, the 10 Mile Creek site looks great. All the trees we've planted in the past are large enough now to shade the water and keep the canary grass at bay. We can step away from that site knowing that we have provided valuable riparian habitat for spawning salmon and a great nursery area for their fingerlings.

Klaus and I visited **Ladies of the Lake** site recently, and discovered the creek full of spawning Kokanee from Lake Whatcom. Things look healthy out there as well, but we will be organizing a work party next Spring to cut back certain invasive species.

We had to cancel the **Whatcom Creek** cleanup in Oct. due to heavy rain, so I may call a few of you to finish that job on a spur of the moment basis.

We are in the process of booking two conservation related speakers for the 2018 program schedule. One of them will cover the current status of net pen operations in Puget Sound. This is a subject that many of us are concerned about so should be a timely update. The Conservation Committee will have met by the time you read this, and will be making it's recommendations about the disbursements of Conservation monies in 2018 to worthy organizations. Our committee's proposed donations are then reviewed by the Board before final approval is granted. All of you received notice of our committeee meeting, which you are always welcome to attend. If you have any suggestions for the Conservation Committee you can always E-mail any one of us with your concern or suggestion. In the past several years we have had very little input from individual members, so we have to assume that we are on the right track for the most part.

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## Conservation Money at Work

#### California Creek Estuary

Our 4th Corner Fly Fishers' donations are being put to good use. This year, along with other purchases, Whatcom Land Trust (WLT) teamed with other partners to purchase 11.5 acres of the California Creek Estuary, located in the Drayton Harbor Watershed, Blaine, Washington.

Whatcom Land Trust solidified an innovative financial partnership with The Conservation Fund for bridge funding while also seeking permanent funding from sources such as The Washington Wildlife and Recreation Program and Aquatic Lands Protection grants. At some future point, WLT plans to

convey the property to the Blaine-Birch Bay Park and Recreation District #2 while continuing to hold an easement on the property, ensuring that the land is protected in perpetuity.

According to Whatcom Land Trust Conservation Director Gabe Epperson, "The California Creek Estuary property is a critical link in protection of bird and salmon species in northern Washington. This property includes the mouth of the estuary and thus is a vital link to Drayton Harbor and the protection of its tidelands and vulnerable wet-

lands ecosystems."

Often called nurseries of the sea (USEPA, 1993), estuaries provide vital nesting and feeding habitats for many aquatic plants and animals. Most fish and shellfish eaten in the United States, including salmon and steelhead, herring, and oysters, complete at least part of their life cycles in estuaries. Estuaries also help to maintain healthy ocean environments. They filter out sediments and pollutants from rivers and streams before they flow into the oceans, providing cleaner waters for marine life. (National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration).

The Mission of the Whatcom Land Trust is to preserve and protect wildlife habitat, scenic, agricultural and open space lands in Whatcom County for future generations by securing interests in land and promoting land stewardship. Since inception, WLT has been able to preserve and protect 20,670 acres in Whatcom County. This includes several miles of coastal property and approximately 10 miles of Nooksack River frontage. Currently, 4CFF supports stewardship (Mike Reed, 4CFF member, is Steward) for Ladies of the Lake property, located at south Lake Whatcom..




