# "4Cff Holiday Party"



On THURSDAY, December 18 we will gather at the Bellingham Golf and Country Club to celebrate the holiday season with fishing buddies old and new!

The social hour begins at 6pm and dinner will be served at 7. The dinner will begin with bread + butter and a roasted beet and apple salad. You will have a choice of three entrées (please specify your choice when you make your reservation): braised pork belly, chicken forestiere with apples and leeks, or butternut squash ravioli (vegetarian). # December Outings Report!!!

I knew I would get around to this one eventually. This is 84<sup>th</sup> and last outings report for this run.

#### **Vedder River:**

10 of us made the trip over the border to fish the Vedder River earlier this month. It was in the middle of the first really cold snap of the year. We arrived in several waves. The early birds got into the fish, (I'm reasonably sure this was by design but...) they also looked like they paid a price. When they came up to meet the second wave they all looked a little blue and they were knocking ice out of everything and shivering as well. Regardless, it was still a great day to get out on the water. He sun was out, a few fish decided to nip, including the one landed by Paula Faulkner (unfortunately it was already deceased). At about 1:00 the bite really picked up! The chili was hot and lunch was served. What more could you ask for??

#### The Past:

Before I move on I would like to acknowledge the progress the 4<sup>th</sup> Corner Fly Fishers have made. When I found the brochure at H&H and joined the club there were 59 souls on the roster. Of those 39 remain on our membership rolls today. At the end of this year we have 96 members. Some are lifetime, others are the old guard, some like me have been around for a while, and many are new. The character and breadth of the membership have changed and the vitality of our organization continues to grow.

I took over from a master; an individual who has as been a stalwart for decades, Ed Ruckey. The first outings schedule I put together had 5 outings to some of the old standard places, (the Yakima River, the upper Skagit, the Methow, and Rocky Ford). Later on that year, several trips to the Vedder were added.

For the most part, it was pretty straight forward angling. The rods were single handed about 9' long. We used lighter weights for trout and the heavier stuff for the salmon and mythical steelhead.

This year we had 18 outings scheduled. We fished on both sides of the border in lakes, rivers, small streams, and several excursions into the salt! New trips were scheduled to Montana and the south Puget Sound. There was even a Kid's Derby! The flies were cast using single, spey, switch and even Tenkara rods.

In the interim between those schedules, we have added a rich mix of elements to our endeavors. Ed Ruckey has produced thousands of flies and boxes tailored to the waters we have fished. Bob Cooper and Ed Dahl have built a number of implements to improve the culinary aspects of our outings. (After the first use of the Asada Cruz you could see our picnic on Google earth!!) And Lin Nelson hatched the Classic outing where we could enjoy all the fruits of the above (yes I had a little to do with it but you do not work alone!) And let's not forget the contributions of all those who have hosted and attended each one of the outings

#### The Future:

I want to thank Phil Terzian for stepping up to take the Chairmanship of the Outings Committee. He is new to our club, but so was I when I took over. I know with his enthusiasm and your support we can look forward to memorable trips and experiences in our future!

The expansion of the outing schedule has been made possible by the addition of hosts for each trip. It has given us the opportunity to tap the expertise and interests of all of our members. The schedule is a product of input from the outings committee, the outing hosts, and especially you! If you have a fishery you want to pursue or a place you want to fish let Phil or me know. The committee is getting together on **December 13**th at 9:30am at the Barkley Haggen's to put together a schedule for next year. In addition I know there is always a spot open for anyone who wants to lend Phil and the club a hand.

I look forward to see where the program will go from here and to all the places it will take us.

As for the last 7 years ... What can I say but Thank You!!!!

# Cancun!

After my presentation last week I've been asked to provide information for those who would like to go. Like I mentioned, we stay at the Westin Laguanmar in the Hotel Zone <a href="http://www.tripadvisor.com/Hotel\_Review-g150807-d1145564-Reviews-The\_Westin\_Lagunamar\_Ocean\_Resort\_Villas\_Spa-Cancun\_Yucatan\_Peninsula.html">http://www.tripadvisor.com/Hotel\_Review-g150807-d1145564-Reviews-The\_Westin\_Lagunamar\_Ocean\_Resort\_Villas\_Spa-Cancun\_Yucatan\_Peninsula.html</a> We have a Westin time share so it is almost free for us to stay there, but it is nice, named one of the Best Resorts in Mexico by Travel + Leisure's "Best of 2014" list, and it is AAA rated Four Diamonds. Plus it is right across the street from an upscale mall for shopping and great restaurants.

There are many other options for where to stay. For fishing, if you want a 5 or 6 day fishing trip, I would look at the packages put together at Red's Resort <a href="http://troutwaterfly.com/guide-service/">http://troutwaterfly.com/guide-service/</a>. We used Pesca Meya for a 2 day one night trip on one of our trips down. That is a good package giving you two full two days of fishing where you should catch up to 30 bonefish per day. They pick you up at a motel and take you back afterwards. The food is excellent and we had two guides in our boat for two fishers. 2015 rate for this package is \$900 per person, with a 10% discount for Nov-Feb. <a href="http://www.pescamaya.com/">http://www.pescamaya.com/</a>.

If you stay at a hotel in the Hotel Zone, two other options for a day of fishing are Cancun Fly Fishing <a href="http://www.cancunflyfishing.net/cancun\_guide.html">http://www.cancunflyfishing.net/cancun\_guide.html</a>. This is a day at Isla Blanca, about an hour north of the Hotel Zone. You are picked up, have an 8 hour day of fishing and are brought back to your Hotel. The cost is \$375 for two anglers. You will see and get shots at several tarpon (10-25#) and snook in the winter months (the only time I've been there) and I'm told you get

opportunities at permit and bonefish in the later spring. They also offer 4-8 hour trips to Cancun Lagoon, leaving right from a marina in the Hotel Zone. This is a trip for tarpon, snook and barracuda. It makes a nice 1/2 day trip with time for a pool side drink in the afternoon!

I have also used <a href="http://www.cancunflyfishing.com/">http://www.cancunflyfishing.com/</a> with excellent results for a Cancun Lagoon trip. They also do Isla Blanca trips, which I haven't done with them. Enjoy your tropical trip!

# Fourth Corner Fly Fishers Member Receives Prestigious Award

Into everyone's life......there walks a mentor, another human being who for a unique moment in time gives our lives new meaning, purpose, and resolve. As Albert Schweitzer, Nobel Peace Prize recipient, said: "In everyone's life, at some time, our inner fire goes out. It is then burst into flame by an encounter with another human being. We should all be thankful for those people who rekindle the inner spirit". A fellow FCFF member we all know so well would say: I have never met another human being I didn't learn something from, nor someone I wouldn't want to enter and share my life!

Over the years in Bill Hall's life, there have been many such encounters. He would say his career has been rewarding and his experiences life changing. Recently, Bill was inducted into UNI's "Hall of Excellence". The University of Northern Iowa (Cedar Falls, IA) nominated him for this recognition in 2013, and a committee researched his professional education, professional experiences, scholarly endeavors, professional service record and activities, awards and honors and bestowed this prestigious award on him in a 3 day whirl of events this October, 2014. Bill hadn't been back to UNI since 1956 when he got his Master's degree there, so you can imagine he was surprised to be one of six people this year to be inducted. Over the past eleven years this University has honored 108 recipients. It's been about 30 years since Bill's doctorate degree from University of Iowa (Iowa City, IA), but almost 60 since he was at UNI. We can all imagine it took them a year of research to identify as accurately and completely as

possible his candidacy for this award.

Bill now has a bronze plaque with an artist's rendition of his face and a short biographical sketch of his career posted in UNI's "Hall of Excellence". That biographical sketch reads:



#### (Award Continued)

"William R. Hall was a fighter pilot (1943-1947) for the Army Corp and United States Air Force before graduating from the University of Northern Iowa with a Bachelor of Arts degree (1949) in Physical Education. He served the Waucoma Independent School District, Waucoma, Iowa as a high school teacher/coach/principal while he continued to serve his country by serving in the Air Force Reserves. Hall joined the Dubuque Community School District as a teacher (1956-1983) in Dubuque before graduating from the University of Iowa with a Doctor of Philosophy degree (1985) in Educational Administration.

Dr. William R. Hall served as president of both District #1 and the Iowa Association of Elementary and Middle School Principals, and as a member of the UNI Graduate Advisory Committee. He served as president of District #1 Elementary Principal Association of Iowa and later Director of the Institute for School Executives (1983-1985), University of Iowa, Iowa City, Iowa. Hall served the College of Education, Western Washington University, Bellingham, WA as a visiting professor (1985-1995). He was a member of the USA Air Force Reserves twenty four years (1950-1974) retiring at the rank of Major, serving as coordinator for the Iowa Air Force Reserves and liaison officer for the United States Air Force Academy. He received an honorary life membership to the Scottish American Military Society in 2009."

The plaque was limited in space to the above information, and Bill would be the first one to note that years of service to FCFF since 2002, or the Bellingham Police Department senior volunteer department for 12 years, or coming up this next year (2015) 70 years of membership in Free and Accepted Masons when he will receive his 70 year pin was not engraved on it. **Congratulations Bill!** 

Bill's induction speech typified his philosophy of recognizing others for their influence and who played a major role in his life. AND, HIS FAMILY, FRIENDS, SPOUSE CAN ATTEST TO HIM DOING THIS IN ONE MINUTE AND FORTY SECONDS!!!!
