

Dear 4CFF Members,

It's interesting to reflect on our collective good fortune, living in the relative comfort of the Pacific Northwest at a time when much of the country: North, East, Midwest and even South, is buried in snow and otherwise feeling the uncomfortable power of winter's remaining presence. And it's also interesting to reflect that humankind in those other areas of the country, North, East, Midwest and South, have managed to nearly entirely extirpate wildlife of all types, including wild game-fish, from their midst.

Again, reflecting on our collective good fortune, it appears that it is not too late to save our part of the world from suffering a similar unhappy and nearly irreversible fate. Interestingly, a companion to the efforts of NSEA, Native Fish Society, Wild Fish Conservancy and other organizations dedicated to protecting what's left of our wild fish is the enduring presence of beaver colonies in our part of the world.

Well-respected NOAA biologist George Pess, a periodic speaker at 4CFF Meetings, and others recently conducted a study to determine how to restore coho salmon in the Stillaguamish River. Historical data showed a natural summer Smolt Production Potential [SPP] in the Stilly of 2.5 million smolts, and a winter SPP of 7.1 million smolts, for a total of nearly 10 million coho smolts annually. Pess' team assessed the current and historic distributions of beaver ponds and other coho salmon rearing habitat in the Stilly and found that the greatest reduction in coho salmon smolt production capacity originated from the extensive loss of beaver ponds. They estimated that current summer smolt production potential (SPP) was only 965,000 smolts, and found that summer habitat capacity had been reduced by 61% compared with historic levels, and that most of the reduction resulted from the loss of beaver ponds. A more dramatic reduction in winter habitat capacity was found; current winter SPP was estimated at only 971,000 smolts, or 13%

historic abundance. In terms of winter habitat capacity, Pess estimated a 94% reduction in beaver pond Smolt Production, a 68% loss in SPP of sloughs, a 9% loss in SPP of tributary habitat, and an overall Smolt Production Potential reduction of 86%. Most of the overall reduction resulted from the loss of beaver ponds. Pess' analysis suggests that increasing beaver populations may be a simple and effective means of restoring the slow-water habitat that these salmon depend on, without large expenditures of public funds.

Outings 2014:

want to welcome you all to the new Outings program for this year. Given the mix of all the new members with the experience of those who have been around awhile, it is about time we utilized them both. It is also time to free up the program by getting more people involved in choosing and planning the events.

Earlier this month our new outings' committee put together a schedule that is more robust and extensive. We are keeping some of the old standards like Pass Lake, the Silver Lake breakfast, the trips to the Methow area (including the Classic), the upper Skagit, and the salmon trips here and in BC. As a matter of fact, we will probably have more trips for salmon than we have had recently. And with the new structure we can go to more of the waters that we have only visited sporadically.

The Yakima is back, as well as Chopaka Lake, and we will have several forays up to Peterhope Lake and the Hwy24 area in BC. In addition there is a float on the lower Skagit and a steelhead trip to the Stilly. As far as new additions we have added a guided saltwater trip to the South Sound beaches, a Sandy Point saltwater trip to chase Coho and finally a run over to Montana to sample some of those waters you have read about. All in all it should be a memorable year.

The key to working will be the guest host. This year we will have at least one guest host for each outing. They will be responsible researching and providing the basic information on the trip. Where are we going? What are the accommodations? What is the schedule? Is there a potluck? And last but not least, what are we fishing for and how do you catch them? They will also be the host for the event and write up a report on how it went. All this information will be collected in the "Outings Detail Document" (ODD). This will be available online shortly and you can use it to plan your outings. They are also good sources of information to plan a trip to the location whenever you want to go.

It should be noted that as far as how we have done things in the past do not assume that they will be the same this year. The food and the fly boxes and all the rest are going to be optional and check in the ODD to confirm the details.

A NEW BOOK BY A MEMBER

A 4th Corner Fly Fisher wrote a new book on a fact-based tale of the horror and brutality of war – and the compassion and courage hidden in us all to fight for survival...and salvation.

The Russian Army has invaded its long-time foe, Finland, while pursuing the German troops fleeing from Hitler's self-destructive attack on Russia. Aimo Kekkenen and the children of his village are put on a train for Nilstad, Sweden – and safety. But not for all. Aimo's sister finds a warm, loving home with Constable Sten Valheen and his family; but Aimo is taken in by the Blixdals: the Reverend Björn, a sadistic, egomaniacal collaborator; and his desperate, loveless and childless wife, Karen. And the remaining refugee children who are not taken in find themselves trapped in the hell of the town orphanage. The question isn't whether Finland will survive to welcome home its lost sons and daughters – but whether its sons and daughters will survive to return home.

In "Sunpath: The War Orphan Train," Aimo, his sister, cousin and best friend are torn from their

idyllic lives in the countryside of Finland and thrust into a maelstrom. They are the "Finska Krigsbarn" (Finnish War Children): the estimated 70-80,000 children evacuated to neighboring Scandinavian countries, mostly to Sweden, throughout World War II. At war's end, over 15,000 evacuees never returned home – and of those who did, most did so to parentless lives.


Based on author Michael Maryk's interviews with

survivors and local research, "Sunpath" is, at its heart, an examination of the good and bad in all people and the toosoon shattering of childhood innocence – a theme sadly familiar in our world today.
