

"The river banks are brimming with activity by late March. Schools of juvenile salmon and steelhead emerge from winter hiding, competing, and darting around in search of food. Juvenile coho are especially common in off-channel sloughs and wetland ponds where mating newts are ubiquitous, careless, and single-minded. Chinook are out too, but are a bit more wary than coho. Adult steelhead are spawning and the eggs of their earlier spawning counterparts remain buried in the gravel. Water ouzels flitter into and out of the water, incessantly bobbing, with males courting females like kamikaze pilots in an aerial duel. Newly arrived swallows dart, glide, and dive over the river. In the riparian forest canopy and understory, the avian symphony ranges from the raucous, scolding rattle of the belted kingfisher to the melodious serenade of the courting winter wren. Along the river and its floodplain, trees, shrubs, and flowers are starting to bloom, painting the forest and forest floor with a fresh tinge of greens, yellows and whites. As the first act of spring winds to a close, the dampness [of early March] begins to fade away as the warming rays of sun and the vitality of nurturing water start priming the biological pump for the coming spring and summer..."

CONSERVATION REPORT

Fellow Members,

The Conservation committee has taken on a new project that requires club members' help: a Steelhead redd survey for certain creeks that feed into the Nooksack. The Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife has OK'ed our club's participation with these surveys as long as we do them in conjunction with the Nooksack Salmon Enhancement team. (NSEA) Bob Johnston will provide you with information and will have a sign up sheet for these redd surveys at our meeting on Thursday night. There are 7 redd survey dates that will need to be filled by one member per date because the WDFW is allowing one 4CFF member to accompany NSEA on each date listed. This project is in response to several members request to do steelhead redd surveys.

Those who participate will learn how to properly access streams and to recognize and locate steelhead redds. NSEA will provide transportation to and from the survey sites, and will supply all needed equipment. You should take your own waders and boots just in case. Volunteers will meet at the listed times at the NSEA offices at the intersection of E. Bakerview and Hannegan Road. Total time involved for each survey day will be 4-5 hours, so take water and a snack.





This month's program features the first (to my knowledge) '4CFF Movie Night.' We will be viewing a new documentary called Low and Clear. The film's website gives the following description:

During a winter flyfishing trip to Canada, two old friends, J.T. Van Zandt and Alex "Xenie" Hall, learn they've have grown apart in more ways than one. J.T., the thoughtful even-keeled son of a songwriting legend believes there's more to fishing than catching fish. Short-tempered Xenie, a "firewood salesman," sees it differently and fishes like it's a race against the clock. Their different approaches to fishing and life emerge and clash on the snowy river banks and damp hotel rooms of British Columbia in this true story of a friendship stretched to the breaking point. An exploration of life in the disappearing wilderness of the West, Low & Clear unfolds with moments of humor and pathos, success and failure, as J.T. and Xenie find themselves on a fishing trip that could be their last.

The website also has biographies of the filmmakers and a list of the many awards the film has won since it's release. This promises to be a great show and I hope you all can make it. Also, in the event that you aren't able to attend, the movie will be placed in the 4CFF library for you to check out and view at home. [Note: The movie is not rated, but does contain a some well-placed profanity – if you don't like cursing about getting your fly caught in a tree, you might want to approach the film with caution]

<u>Silver Lake Pancake Breakfast:</u>

The club has rented the large gazebo at Silver Lake Park for our pancake breakfast and trout opening day. As we did last year we will be collecting a small fee to pay for the food. Members and those covered by family memberships will \$4, guests will be\$5. Once I get an idea how many will be attending I can figure out the costs. Casting Classes:


This is a great deal. I would recommend it to just about everyone as a way to get your technique tuned up for the year.



March Culinary Corner



Continuing on from last month and its Mediterranean theme, there is a staple of region that transforms a lemon into an extraordinary condiment. You can buy preserved lemons but you can also make them. After you have done it once, you will want to have several jars around all the time. Especially now, when seeing the sun for a day can raise your spirits.

Preserved Lemons:

Begin by sterilizing a wide mouth jar with a good air tight lid, either by immersing in boiling water or running it through the dish washer. Make sure that they are dry. Water in this process can cause all kinds of problems.

For the lemons use, Eureka or Lisbon varieties which are the ones at most supermarkets. Pick out those that are heavy for their size and that have no surface blemishes. I also recommend picking up organic as the peel is what you will end up using. You do not want to use Meyer lemons for this as the skins are too thin. They can be preserved in a different process.



Ingredients:

- •6-8 lemons
- •4-6 more for juicing
- •2 cups kosher salt or more as needed

Optional: you can add any number of spices the process to alter the flavor. Bay leaf, whole allspice, peppercorns, sticks of cinnamon, cardamom, fenugreek, cumin seed, whole coriander, and many more

Procedure:

- •Begin by washing the lemons and drying them (Be careful with that water thing)
- •Next zest and juice 4 of them (I save the zest in plastic wrap and freeze it for later)
- •Cut the lemons almost into quarters leaving about a quarter inch at the stem end



- •Put about ½ cup of salt in the bottom of the jar
- •Take each lemon and pack as much salt (2 tbs.) as you can between the quarters
- •Pack them into the jar as tightly as possible do not be afraid to jam them in there
- •If you are adding additional spices add them between the layers
- •When the jar is full pour in the lemon juice until it covers all the lemons
- •Leave just a little space between the lid and the juice
- •Seal the lid and store in a cool dark place for a month

You can check after a day to see if you need to add any more juice or need to push down the lemons again. I usually put a sheet of plastic wrap over the lip before I close the lid as the liquid is really corrosive and will attack a regular ball jar lid. Of late I have gone to the glass lids with the rubber gaskets.

After a month you can use these little beauties to add a punch for many dishes. In most cases you will be using rind. The flesh and jelly can be used as well when mixed sparingly into things like vinaigrettes.

When you remove them do so with a sterile instrument. You do not have to refrigerate this as long as you keep it dark and cool. The shelf life is well over a year. Assuming they will last that long.

I preserved a jar of limes as well and will probably try oranges next.
