President's Message

President's Corner

Welcome to March and the first club fishing outing of the year. We'll be at Pass Lake on the 31st. In addition to fishing, Frank Koterba is making his famous chili lunch, and there's a fish census going on during this time you can contribute to. Hopefully these bits of warm sunshine from the last few days will also make an appearance. In addition to Pass Lake, Kevin McClurg has put together a great calendar of outings for the year, and I hope to see you at many of them.

The 2023 salmon forecasts were published last week, and the November floods of 2021 didn't have quite as bad an impact as feared. The Pink forecast for the Nooksack is similar to the previous couple seasons (down from the 10 year average), the Skagit forecast is down with a little more than half its recent average (but still over a half million fish). The bright spots are the Stilliguamish, forecast to have about 4 times its normal Pink return, and the Green blowing it out with over 800,000 Pinks forecast! The Puget Sound Chinook forecast is up compared to the last few years but still lower than the 10 yr average, with the Nooksack and Stilliguamish ranked as Good and Skagit as Neutral. The local Coho forecast is mixed with the Nooksack ranked as Good and Skagit as Poor. The Chum forecast is down compared to recent years and the 10 year average, with both the Nooksack and Skagit ranked as poor. If you like to fish the Fraser basin, the Sockeye forecast in 1.6 million and Pink forecast in 6.1 million. Getting back into our old pre-COVID activities, we're also returning to more educational activities. Conservation Report

Greeting from Your Conservation Committee,

First, I would like to thank John Leighton for leading our Conservation Committee the past few years and for helping me orient in becoming the new committee chairperson. Thank you John. John has agreed to remain our main contact with the Skagit Fisheries Enhancement Group and I'm sure/hope he will remain active in conservation projects.

My initial focus will be to add a Whatcom County project into our mix. Ideally I'm seeking a smaller project for which our club can take ownership. I've already reached out to NSEA to help identify projects. If you are interested in working on such a project please email me at <u>MichaelRiber@comcast.net</u> or give me a call. There will be further opportunities to volunteer once I have more details, but I want to get a sense of how big of a crew me might have to call upon.

<u>Squalicum Lake Update</u>: I've compiled the creel census cards from Squalicum Lake for 2022 and also talked to WDFW. The number of anglers submitting cards was down considerably in 2022. The catch rate also dropped slightly to 0.81 fish/hour with the average fish ranging from 8-12 inches. There are a few reports of bigger fish. WDFW confided in me that they have not done what they consider to be a full plant in the lake the last two years because of access issues. They have assured me that this year there should be a full plant (1,500 rainbows, 11-13") in the May/June. I informed WDFW that if access issues remain our club would be willing to take that on as a project. Our club has three boats at the lake and the combination lock in the club PO Box number (1543). I find the lake a great opportunity for an easy/short evening outing. If you have questions about the lake let me know.

Club COVID Protocols

COVID Notification Guidelines:

We managed to go 3 years without a club event having a COVID transmission, and congratulate you all for that success. Following the February 23rd meeting three people tested positive, notified the board, and the club sent an email to all meeting attendees to inform them.

We didn't have a plan for how to handle this, but the board agreed we should. Our COVID notification guidelines will follow the pattern we used last month. We ask that if you test positive for COVID within 72 hours of a club event, that you notify the board immediately. The club will send an email to all attendees informing them someone tested positive who as at the event.

That email will include the email address of everyone at the event. This is to make it easy for anyone testing positive to reach out to others and let them know "*I was the person*" who tested positive. The club does not want to be in the position of sharing members' medical information so its up to you - if you choose to reach everyone who was there and say "*it was me*", or just those who you spent time in close proximity, or no one.

Fingers crossed this is all moot and may never happen again, but at least now we have a plan.

With a new fishing season approaching its time to get your gear in order. We (Marion Hiller our own <u>C</u>ertified Instructor and I) suggest you add a casting tune up to the list! No matter what piscatorial pursuits you have planned this year, improving your casting will make all your other tools work that much better. Especially if you are venturing into a new fishery.

The current sessions are scheduled on:

Saturdays: March 25, April 1, 8, 15.

Sessions start at 10:00 am and run to noon.

The location is Cornwall Park, 3424 Meridian St, Bellingham, WA

Use the southern entrance off Meridian St.

We will be setup in the field near the pickleball courts.

offers learning opportunities.

For fly casting, **two all-day casting offerings** are held at "no charge" to participants. One is a **Walk-in Casting Clinic** with one-on-one casting help provided by certified instructors and/or instructor candidates.

The other is a **Casting Skills Development** program which provides the opportunity to evaluate casting skills when applied to realistic fishing situations targeting all anglers from new-beginners to advanced casters. Click **Casting Skills Development** for details about the program.

To highlight a few class offerings (requirements: registration, fee, and limited to a set number of students):

- A beginner's class to learn fundamental casts, getting the angler off to a great start.
- An advanced beginners-intermediate class for women to refine the fundamental skills of a PULD cast, a overhead cast, and accuracy casts and become a more efficient angler.

- An intermediate class offering a self-help methodology and understandings to self-correct casting errors when one sees the fly line misbehaving.
- An advanced caster class designed for anglers who want to really enhance their casting ability, which teaches techniques to see his/her and analyze his/her casting errors and learn how to fix them-note taking is highly encouraged.
- A two-handed Spey class for non-beginners who want to refine TH skills.

Classes and clinics include instructors from the greater Seattle area and Bellingham. Three members of our 4CFF are providing instruction throughout the day.

For Fly tying, tying opportunities in the main building are offered thought out the day, much like what you would see at a fly fishing show. It's an opportunity to watch fly tying demonstrations, to ask questions, and to gain insights to better your tying skills.

Doors open at 6pm


