President's Message

This morning, there's an edge to the breeze again. It's back into the pile sweater, even though two days ago, I was fishing in a t-shirt. We never own the weather, but during the spring and autumn shoulder seasons, current conditions can be particularly unstable as current meterology thrashes about, looking for a new identity between the Solstice and the Equinox.

From the early years on Boy Scout campouts, when I discovered that the "official" Scout kapok sleeping bag was a guarantee of shivering misery, I've suffered, literally, with the paradox of loving the northern outdoors despite a body that was designed for the tropics. I suspect that

many of us hesitate to recreate when the weather report is hedged with ambiguities, much less overt bad news. To my shame, I've passed on countless opportunities for just that reason.

But fishermen can't hide forever, so we resort to tricks. My standard strategy is overkill: I pack extra layers of insulation, sleeping bag liners, two rain parkas (so that one can dry while the other is in use), neoprene waders for much of the year, a compact stove to keep the coffee flowing. Dealing with the cold is like a protracted war against insurgents: it can never be won, but we can keep it at a level that we can live with.

DOC HACKLE'S FLY CORNER

K & E CADDIS II

Hook: TMC #2312 Size 8 to 14 **Thread**: To match 8/0 or 6/0

Tail: Antron Yarn-Under bronze Mallard **Body**: Fine dubbing to match natural **Thorax**: Dubbing to match natural

Hackle: Dry fly quality, brown, grizzly, dun

Head: Deer Hair-Bullet head **Thorax:** Deer Hair-Wing pad

Wing: Deer Hair

Note: Head, Thorax and Wing = Same clump of deer hair

- Step 1. De-barb hook, anchor thread on and run it down to the bend and back up to mid-point.
- **Step 2**. Tie in a small amount of antron yarn and anchor it on top of the hook all the way to the bend. Wrap thread back up to mid-point and add the bronze Mallard, wrapping it down to the bend. You should end ½ hook shank length beyond the bend.
- **Step 3.** Wrap dubbing on thread and build the body. Starting at the bend and wrapping it up to just beyond the mid-point towards the eye.
- **Step 4**. Take a pencil size bunch of deer hair, clean and stack it. Then tie it in by the butt ends at the point where you left off with the body. The tips must extend hook length beyond the hook eye. Wrap the thread over the deer hair all the way up to the hook eye keeping the deer hair on top of the shank.
- **Step 5.** Tie in the hackle, concave side up at the point where the body ends. Then dub the thorax up the shank to within 1/8 of the hook eye. Now wrap the hackle the same distance up. Then trim the hackle even with the thorax on top.
- **Step 6.** Now fold the deer hair back over the body of the fly, first making a small bullet head tying it down, then move the thread under the deer hair to a point where the hackle and thorax started.
- **Step 7.** Now pull down the deer hair and tie it off at the beginning of the thorax. Whip finish or half hitch a number of times the thread and cut it off. Add a drop of cement to that point and cut a "V" in the hackle on the bottom and you are finished.

Frank's Culinary Corner Grilled Sesame Asparagus

Serves 4

Toast the sesame seeds in a dry skillet over medium heat, stirring frequently, until golden, about 5 minutes

Ingredients

2 tablespoons soy sauce

2 tablespoons vegetable oil

2 teaspoons light brown sugar

1 garlic clove, minced

½ teaspoon grated fresh ginger

1/8 teaspoon red pepper flakes

1 pound asparagus, trimmed

1 tablespoon toasted sesame oil

Salt and pepper

1tablespoon sesame seeds, toasted

Instructions

- 1. Whisk soy sauce, vegetable oil, sugar, garlic, ginger, and pepper flakes in shallow dish. Add asparagus and toss until well coated. Let marinate at room temperature for at least 15 minutes or up to 1 hour.
- 2. Remove asparagus from dish (do not discard marinade) and grill over hot fire, turning frequently, until tender an lightly charred, 4 to 8 minutes.
- 3. Add grilled asparagus to dish with reserved marinade. Add sesame oil and toss until asparagus is well coated. Taste and season with salt and pepper and sprinkle with sesame seeds. Serve.
