# Education Report



## Fishing New Zealand, Economy-Class

The rosy image of fly fishing in New Zealand involves a tastefully rustic country lodge, a guide who dresses like a retired mercenary, and frequent day trips to stream headwaters in a helicopter. That style is beyond the financial means of some of us, and is not necessary.

I recently spent three weeks on the South Island, wandering about on my own, fishing streams large and small. I rented a small Nissan Cabana campervan for about \$2200, including insurance. It had a fold-up padded sleeping platform for two, pillows and a duvet, a pullout propane heater plate, a sink with a hand pump for the 25 liters of water, fold-down mini-table, loads of dishes, and a small cooler

powered by the car's battery. (Larger campers are also available.) A folding chair added to my leisure-time comfort.

My tourist-class roundtrip airfare was \$1883, after a \$50 discount from The Best of New Zealand Fly Fishing, a L. A.-based travel agent. I strongly recommend sleeping pills and a seat pillow for that 12-hour flight across the Pacific.

After consideration, I picked mid-February to early March, late summer in New Zealand. The weather was nicely warm and mostly dry. However, because of a semi-drought there, too many small streams were dry or trickles. December/ January is probably better watered, for better or worse, although that puts the angler tourist in competition with families who are out and about during NZ's vacation season, when schools are out. The road system is good, generally in better repair than ours.

By law, NZ fishing is open to the public. Landowners may post their property if they feel the need, but I didn't see a 'No Trespassing' sign during my whole trip. A nonresident season fishing license is \$160 NZ (currently 77% of the U.S. dollar). The streams were mostly quite clear, except after two days of rain.

New Zealand is thinly populated, like the western U.S. In the 19th Century: about one million on the South Island, mainly in the large cities. (An exception is farm animals: 15 sheep for every Kiwi, cattle, goats, and fenced European red deer.) That goes for hatching insects, too (except for the #\*%+@! sandflies). Adams and Deer Hair Caddis are among the most popular dry flies. (I hooked my largest brown trout on a No. 12 Royal Humpy.) Despite the popular drill of identifying and stalking visible trout, 60% are caught by conventional fishing-the-water.

Kiwis are friendly, energetic, and helpful. It may be the least-threatened by terrorism of any tourist destination in the world. The landscape is strangely familiar (but different) and always beautiful.
