I will be assembling the team for this year's Conservation Auction shortly, so if you feel that tap on your shoulder just say yes!



Dinner follows at 6:45. The evening's program begins at 7:30 P.M. After the program, members are invited to stay for a business meeting: fish stories, introduction of guests, announcements, and various committee reports. It concludes with a raffle for ticket holders who are in attendance.

This month's program:

John Hicks and Paul Huston will be presenting on techniques and skills to use while fishing the Cowlitz River for steelhead and sea run cutthroat. They will also include a bit on fishing the coast, specifically the Olympic National Park. In addition they will briefly share about their conservation work that includes, Veterans, TU, Soul River.

John Hicks, a life long resident of the Pacific Northwest and Washington State, is the owner of Sea Run Pursuits, a guide service that focuses mainly on the Queets, Clearwater, and Cowlitz Rivers. He is a member of Allen Fly Fishing's Pro-Staff. Participating with a friend, Chad Brown he supports with both his time and energy, Soul River, a project that brings at risk youth and veterans together. He is also the Vice President of the Olympia chapter of Trout Unlimited.

Paul Huston, John's business partner in the guiding business was born and raised in Colorado, is a Master Sergeant in the Army, and partner in Sea Run Pursuits. Paul dedicates his time to both Project Healing Waters, and Native Fish Society. Paul is the River Steward for the Nisqually River. He not only guides people on a swung fly, but is also proficient with gear and especially a center-pin.


The gilly collected \$6 at the April meeting.

Greetings 4CFF'ers


On a non-conservation note, Frank and I visited the NSEA offices last week and made preliminary plans to host our club picnic at the new Nooksack Salmon Enhancement Assoc. property this August. They have plenty of parking, open and covered areas for folks to gather and plenty of room for a host of activities. We are aiming for a Saturday date in late August and will hold the picnic from 3 PM till about 7:30 PM with dinner being served about 5:30. We are homing in on the exact Saturday date so please tune into the July newsletter for exact date and map of NSEA's location on E. Bakerview Dr.

As a notice to any members who have a boat at Squalicum Lake we need to have all "marked" boats temporarily removed to a safe location above the kiosk before July 5. On July 6 Dick Skeers has arranged a backhoe contractor to come in an fall a large dead birch tree that is hanging over quite a few of the boats. Our club will be helping cut up the dead limbs and removing them from the area. All boats not removed to the "Safe Area" will have chains or cables cut on July 6, they will be moved and then replaced back to their original spots once the work is completed. Call any non-club friends who have boats stored to give them this information so they won't have chains etc cut. Signs will be posted this week at the launch site and the "Safe Area" will be marked with spray paint. All boats to be moved will be marked with a small number on their bottom that will aid in proper replacement after the work.

On a similar vein, the NSEA tractor guy met with us about 10 days ago and mowed the trail and launch area so it's in good shape again after a very wet Spring. Any questions about boat moving etc just call me 360 398-1637.



Wild Fish Conservancy

The first fish I remember lived under a big rock that was in a pool not to far from my house. To my 5 year old eyes, he was a monster and very, very, smart.

Two or three of us, all about the same age, would crawl out on the rock, drop a single salmon egg ovr the edge and watch it sink slowly toward the bottom. The fish would glide out from under the rock, inspect the egg, then suck it in and go back under the rock.

We would then put a hook in an egg, have lots of slack in our leader material, then drop the egg into the pool. Again the fish would come from under the rock, inspect the egg, bu he wouldn't take it. We would then repeat the process, egg with no hook, egg with hook, with the same results.

We tried the same process with worms, with the same results.

I moved from there when I was 8 and the fish was still there, just as smart as ever but measurably larger from all the eggs and worms we fed him.

I hope he died of old age.

May 6, 2017, Ladies of the Lake Property (south end of Lake Whatcom). 4CFF volunteers had a busy and gratifying morning performing conservation work.

We finished removing the rusty, old barbed wire on the Fir Creek side of this property. We made great progress with non-native plant suppression! And before calling it quits, we walked the adjacent South Bay Drive roadway and the Whatcom County Park/ South Lake Whatcom boat launch area, picking up trash.

With the barbed wire fencing removed, wildlife in the area can now return to their natural movement patterns avoiding risks from hazardous detours and injury by brushing too close or becoming entangled in the barbed wire.

About two years ago, 4CFF volunteers helped plant native tree and bush "starts" at this property. I'm pleased to report that they are growing well! Our continued non-native plant suppression efforts are paying off, helping the young plants to take hold and grow! On this event we also did battle a with blackberry bush growth too close to the to the creek.

We will have at least one more conservation event at the Ladies of the Lake property this year, probably in late September. Again I will ask for WLT to put out a call for volunteers to join us. Teaming with WLT allows our members to meet new people and benefits our Club with positive community exposure!
