Dear 4CFF Members,

Protecting the Nooksack River Through Wild and Scenic Designation



A group of local boaters, anglers, salmon recovery experts, recreation enthusiasts, and business owners have developed a proposal to designate 100 miles of rivers and tributaries in the upper Nooksack watershed under the Wild and Scenic Rivers Act. As a representative of the "Nooksack Wild and Scenic Work Group" and as a policy expert with American Rivers, Darcy Nonemacher will present on the Nooksack Wild and Scenic proposal, explain what designation means for rivers and recreation, answer any questions, and provide information on how you can help.

Darcy is a lawyer and a former whitewater guide, and she has a passion for river conservation and promoting sustainable recreation. Darcy grew up in the Flathead Valley in Northwest Montana, and has worked in environmental policy and law for about a decade.

When you again turn your attention to our fly club this is what you will find:


Impromptu outings:



The Methow Classic:

This outing should be a well......Classic. We will see the inaugural appearance of the Cooper/Dahl beast roaster. With it we will be carried to the heights of porcine gastronomy! We will have some of Ed Ruckey's great flies to give away. As an added incentive they will be housed in one of our 40th Anniversary boxes. (Check out the pics!) In addition to the boxes we will again be drawing for 2012 Classic hats. The big event will be on Saturday night. We will eat at around 7:00 pm. Budget:

There are many ways to interpret the budget that was sent with last month's newsletter. July Culinary Corner



Summer is finally **Here**!! And with it comes all those local ingredients that are available. I just finished off a flat of great strawberries from Joe's Garden. A couple of pounds became *Strawberry/Lemon Sorbet* and the rest went into this month's recipe *Strawberry Gazpacho*.

As I have mentioned before I spend a fair amount of time cruising the web to get ideas related to food. Recently I was back up on <u>Food52</u> and ran across this version of a classic cold soup. Instead of the usual tomatoes to drive the flavor you use the freshest thing available...Strawberries!

This concoction is served at Eleven Madison Park in NYC where Daniel Humm is running the kitchen.

Eleven Madison Park's Strawberry Gazpacho (Serves 4 to 6)

For the Gazpacho:

- •1/2 tablespoon plus 1/2 cup extra-virgin olive oil
- •2 cloves garlic, crushed but kept whole
- •1 1/2 cup whole grain bread, crusts removed, cut into 1-inch cubes
- •2 sprigs thyme
- •6 cups strawberries, hulled and quartered



- •2 1/4 cups English cucumbers, peeled, seeded, and diced
- •1 1/4 cup diced red bell pepper
- •3/4 cups diced green bell pepper
- •6 tablespoons tomato juice
- •3 tablespoons red wine vinegar
- •1 1/2 teaspoon salt
- Tabasco sauce

For the Garnish:

- •2 tablespoons extra-virgin olive oil
- •2 cloves garlic, crushed but kept whole
- •2 cups diced (1/4 inch) whole grain bread, crusts removed
- •3 sprigs thyme
- •1/2 teaspoon salt

Heat a small sauté pan over medium-high heat. Coat the bottom with 1 tablespoon of the olive oil and add 1 clove of garlic. When the garlic begins to sizzle, add the bread cubes. Toss occasionally until the bread begins to color, being careful not to burn. Add the thyme and continue to toss until the bread is golden brown. Transfer the bread to a large bowl. Discard the garlic and thyme.

Add the strawberries, cucumber, peppers, remaining garlic clove, remaining 1/2 cup of olive oil, tomato juice, vinegar, and salt to the bowl. Toss to combine and cover tightly with plastic wrap. Marinate at room temperature for 3 to 6 hours. Puree the ingredients and their juices in small batches in a blender on thigh speed until very smooth. Strain through a chinois and chill in the refrigerator until very cold. Taste and season, if necessary, with Tabasco sauce and additional salt and red wine vinegar.

Heat a small sauté pan on medium-high heat. Coat the bottom with the olive oil and add the garlic. When the garlic begins to sizzle, add the diced bread. Toss occasionally until the bread begins to color, being careful not to burn. Add the thyme and continue to toss until the bread is golden brown. Quickly transfer to a baking sheet lined with paper towels. Discard the garlic and thyme and season with the salt. Once cool and dry, store in an airtight container line with paper towels for up to 1 day.

Enjoy!

Fly Tying Thread

Fly tying thread can get confusing. This is an article out of "Better Flies Faster" by David Klausmeyer that takes some of the mystery out of it.

"The traditional system of describing the size of fly-tying thread in pattern recipes -A, 3/0, 6/0, 8/0, etc. - is giving way to a more accurate method of rating thread. The garment industry has used the denier standard for many years, and some suppliers of fly-tying threads are adopting it to describe the products they offer. Why make this change?

Under the old system, there was no standard for listing the diameter of a thread, and one company's size 6/0, for example, might differ from another manufacturer's size 6/0. With the denier system, the listed size is based on the weight (in grams) of 9,000 meters of a thread. This improved method leads to greater uniformity so you will know the exact spool of thread to purchase when visiting a fly shop.

Use the following chart when selecting thread to tie the flies you find in books, magazines, and on the internet."

Size A = 280 denier 3/0 = 220 denier 6/0 = 140 denier 8/0 = 70 denier
