"For many years I was content to apply [a] theory to my fishing – for anything that went wrong I was prepared to blame myself, for anything that went right I was prepared to take all the credit. Fishing, I argued, was an exact performance, a simple contest between man and fish. If the man judged his conditions right and did the right things, he would catch his fish; if he did not, he would not.

On the whole it works out fairly well, especially so far as the blame is concerned. Such things as the frayed leader, the know that should have been re-tied, the good lie approached too carelessly, the clumsy cast, the poorly timed strike, the fish held too hard or too lightly, or hurried to much in the final moments, are all errors of judgment or performance which fully justify the disasters they may, and often do not, produce. But I am beginning to find it very salutary to remember just how much "happening right," if not downright luck, has been in nearly all my little triumphs. Often there has been so little between success and failure that I feel little inclined to take much credit unless for perseverance, and that is no virtue because I do not persevere in fishing unless I am enjoying myself.....And this in turn makes me wonder just who and what is a "good Fisherman" or a "skillful fisherman." I sometimes suspect he may be one like me who fishes often enough and hard enough to get the breaks."

Fourth Corner Classic on the Methow:

Another successful Classic Outing is in the books! The collection of attendees included our own members, a few from the Methow Valley Fly Club and several members of the Osprey's from BC. In addition there were a number of spouses, children and significant others for a total of 36 souls. We were able to once again secure a great quantity of quality ribs and brisket from Thompson's Meats in Twisp. After spending the better half of a day in the confines of the recently christened "Cooper Cooker" both were transformed into some pretty good table fare. And along with all the other contributions from everyone the pot luck was a success.

A few classic hats were auctioned off to members of the three clubs and yes one did go to one of the Roelofs as required and the Ruckey box was won by Kevin KcClurg, on his first outing!

With the range of angling opportunities in the Valley, the week had us hitting the Methow and Twisp Rivers, several lakes including Big Twin and covering some new and longstanding small streams. In the latter case some of the small streams were very low and the water temps were warm making them inappropriate to fish. The Methow was a different story. There were several parties who floated different sections from Winthrop to Carleton. There were fish throughout. Gary Jones and Ralph Lloyd hit the lakes and as usual were able to produce results.


One additional note:

August Culinary Corner

Chimichurri Sauce

I have served this sauce with beef and fish several times this summer. After the response of my family at the beach in North Carolina, and those who made it over to the "classic" I think it is time to put the recipe out there one more time. This particular one came out of "Seven Fires" by Francis Mallman, a chef from Argentina who loves to cook over wood fires. It uses fresh herbs and be can be made and held refrigerated for weeks. This is also a basic recipe and experimentation is the mane of the game. The acidity and flavor are a great balance for the brisket we made for the classic and you will see it again at the picnic.

cup water
tbs. coarse salt
head garlic, separated into cloves and peeled
cup packed fresh flat-leaf parsley leaves
cup fresh oregano leaves
tsp. crushed red- pepper flakes
1/4 cup red-wine vinegar
cup extra-virgin olive oil



Bring the water to a boil in a small saucepan. Add the salt, and stir until it dissolves. Remove from heat, and allow it to cool. Mince the garlic very finely, and put in a medium bowl.

(1) Mince the parsley and oregano, and add to the garlic, along with the redpepper flakes.

(2) Whisk in the red-wine vinegar, then the olive oil. Whisk in the salted water.(3) Transfer to a jar with a tight-fitting lid, and keep in the refrigerator. Let the flavors mingle for at least a day, and serve with grilled meats. The sauce can be kept refrigerated for up to 3 weeks.

Another Chimichurri: Recipe by the Bon Appétit Test Kitchen Ingredients

- 1/2 cup red wine vinegar
- 1 teaspoon kosher salt plus more
- 3-4 garlic cloves, thinly sliced or minced
- 1 shallot, finely chopped
- 1 Fresno chile or red jalapeño, finely chopped
- 2 cups minced fresh cilantro
- 1 cup minced fresh flat-leaf parsley
- 1/3 cup finely chopped fresh oregano
- 3/4 cup extra-virgin olive oil



Preparation

Combine vinegar, 1 tsp. salt, garlic, shallot, and chile in a medium bowl and let stand for 10 minutes. Stir in cilantro, parsley, and oregano.

Using a fork, whisk in oil. Remove 1/2 cup chimichurri to a small bowl, season with salt to taste, and reserve as sauce. Put meat in a glass, stainless-steel, or ceramic dish. Toss with remaining marinade. Cover and chill for at least 3 hours or overnight.

- Remove meat from marinade, pat dry, and grill.
- Spoon reserved sauce over grilled meat.






