

Dear 4CFF Members,

It's August, now, with lovely weather marred only by a persistent red haze – a haze filled at least in part by fires that still threaten some of our favorite eastern Washington fishing destinations. It's hard to think of the devastation and loss – and so much easier just to plan a trip to some other environs where the water will be cool and the trout hungry and naïve. Well, since there's not much that any of as individuals can do about the fires and the changes in the environment that make their recurrence more likely for the foreseeable future, it's tempting to search for some good news coming from the dry side of the State.

Fortunately, there is some very good news, demonstrating at once the value of wild fish and that there are inexpensive, natural ways to preserve their contributions to our society. I'm referring to an article penned by Linda Mapes for the Seattle Times on August 3rd, dealing with a spectacular return of wild Sockeye to the Okanagon River. The article correctly attributes the strength of the return to changes in the flow regimes of water flowing through the Columbia River hydro dam network as a result of the development of a sophisticated water management program developed in 2004. The computer model helps managers operating Canadian dams avoid scouring salmon eggs out of their nursery gravel when water is released. They also are better able to maintain enough water and flow in the system so that salmon eggs don't freeze or dry out. They can even time the release of fresh, cold, oxygenated water to help juveniles and adults survive in late-summer heat. The article also mentions that a new hatchery constructed by the Douglas County PUD at a cost of over a Million Dollars has failed to build up populations of out-migrating juvenile sockeye. South Sound Beaches: As I write this I am also thinking what I need to load in the truck to take down to the south sound for our first foray to the beaches. First Coho Outing!!!

This newsletter announcement is to promote our club's first Coho outing at the Sandy Point area. The date we will meet at the beach launch site will be Saturday August 23. Low tide that morning will be around 10AM so we will meet at 9AM to help each other with launching, gearing up and parking. To get to the beach launch area take Slater Rd off I-5 and travel West past the Silver Reef Casino, then past Barleans fish processing plant until you reach a sign that says Maple Lane/Sucia Beach Way. Go straight at this juncture on Maple Lane one block and turn Left until you pass the row of houses on the right. The open space just past the last house is a public access site. Unload your equipment there and I will assist you in finding a parking spot. All participants will need to have a pontoon boat or carry able pram/small boat with oars and a seriously weighted anchor (8-16 lbs.) Trolling motors or small outboards can be added on if desirable

Sorry, NO float tubes as the current wreaks havoc with these crafts when only using fins. Everyone must have a Personal Floatation Device to be part of this outing. Fishing equipment should include a 7-9 wt. rod . Best line is a clear, slow sinking line but floating lines and medium sink tips will also catch fish. Leaders can be 6-8 ft with 2-3 ft of tippet material in the 6-10 lb class. Flies are predominantly baitfish patterns with the occasional crab larvae or shrimp Pattern. Scott at Confluence Flyshop can supply you with several good Coho fly patterns and any other items you need.

We will be fishing the incoming tide for several hours that day so bring a hat, sunscreen, water and something to eat. Unfortunately, this area is not suited for flyfishing from shore as the fish hold or run outside the Bullkelp bed which is over 100 feet offshore. I know some of you will have other questions so please feel free to E-

mail me at the following address dwjmcoombs@g-mail.com or call 360 3981637. This is a great opportunity to learn about a wonderful fishery that is very close to home. See you there, Dan Coombs PS If anyone wants to launch a larger boat there is a fee launch ramp at the Sandy point Marina. You will need to call me if that is your plan so I can give you detailed directions to the ramp but also on how to find the rest of us after you leave the Sandy Point harbor.


