Raffle Tickets:

The Raffle tickets are printed and we need each member to take at least one book to sell to the public. We know that it is not something that you like to do. However, the ticket sales generate the biggest portion of revenue for the auction. This year we have some great items and it should make it easier for you to make the sale. The buyer of each ticket gets to choose the raffle that they want.

<u>The first raffle choice</u> is a two night stay in a Mt. Robinson room at Sun Mountain Lodge in Winthrop. It includes 1 breakfast and 1 dinner for two. This is a prize that has been offered as a choice in previous auctions and is very popular choice.

<u>The second raffle choice</u> is a catered dinner for up to 10 people by Frank Koterba and the members of the 4CFF. The venue for the dinner is yet to be determined. This is a prize that has also been offered as a choice in previous auctions and is a very popular choice.

<u>The third raffle choice</u> is a Dogfish pram. This is an 8' rotomolded dinghy made here in Bellingham. It is a tough maneuverable vessel that will fit in the back of your pickup, works in fresh or salt water, and is stable enough to allow you to stand while casting. There are many upgrades available to the base model in the raffle.

Donations:

The auction will be in October at the Bellingham Golf and Country Club. The auction committee needs the help of the membership in finding and soliciting items for the auction. The auction is a club-supported activity and therefore we need each of you to help. I am asking each of you to solicit at least one item from somewhere in the community. The item does not have to be fly fishing related. It could be most anything. It could be something like an oil change at a local Jiffy Lube where you are a regular customer. In most cases all you need to do is ask. The item could be also be an "In Kind" type of donation where the donation is for a free tune up from your favorite auto or boat mechanic. As you can see almost anything is acceptable.

If you find someone that would like to support the club's auction but they do not have any thing to donate. Let someone on the committee know. We will try put together a list of potential items that can be purchased as a sponsorship donation. By the way, we just held one of the Conservation Auction Dinners at Klaus Lohse's.....It was Marvelous.


And definitely worth the \$10 for the raffle ticket!!

Dave Fast, senior scientist and manager of the Yakama Nations Fisheries and prolific author, presents the projects and efforts that are currently in progress to protect the Columbia River and Yakima drainage basins, a presentation that he has delivered to other fly clubs throughout Washington State. Biologists, like Dave Fast, and technicians are out in the field daily, actively restoring areas in accordance with traditions and with rigorous science. He comes to us with a wealth of knowledge and field experience with a Ph.D. College of Fisheries, University of Washington, a M.Sc.Department of Marine Sciences, University of Puerto Rico, Mayaguez, Puerto Rico, and B.Sc. St. John's University, Collegeville, Minnesota.

The Yakama Nation Fisheries is a program of the Confederated Tribes and Bands of the Yakama Nation. From its inception in 1983, Yakama Nation Fisheries has employed scientific expertise in concert with traditional ecological knowledge to develop innovative projects and partnerships credited with restoring culturally important fish runs in the Columbia River. Yakama Nation Fisheries is headquartered on the Yakama Reservation. 

Conservation Report

Hello to all 4CFF'ers,

By now most of you have read about the escape of possibly thousands of farmed Atlantic Salmon from the fish farm operation off Cypress Island. Several of our members have been watching the gradual increase of fish farming in Puget Sound and have voiced legitimate concerns about this expansion to WDFW. Of course, the companies involved in Puget Sound operations have consistently downplayed the possibility of their genetically altered fish from ever intermixing with our native Salmon stocks and thus far have been able to keep restrictions on their operations to a minimum. In addition, the rules and environmental studies required to get licensed for a new fish farming operation have been kept to a minimum at best. We can only hope that now the WDFW will grow up and look at this industry with a much more "jaded eye", and that regulations will be greatly increased in the future.

Went to an interesting movie the other day and highly recommend it to all of you. "An Inconvenient Sequel: Truth to Power "is the second film by Al Gore which deals with climate change. The refreshing part is that this second film primarily deals with what can be and is being done to help turn the tide towards more stable weather patterns worldwide. It talks a lot more about logical solutions and min-


