Jim Darden (1943-August 1, 2021)

There are very few who have been in the club longer. He was one of those who helped us to get to where we are.

His CV included references in the first Les Johnson tome on fly fishing in the salt for salmon.

He knew his tools! 1 hand, 2-hand, matching line to rod, leaders, and oh, and by the way the man could <u>CAST!!!!!</u> On one of our outings on the lower Methow, we all watched him roll cast to the opposite bank to rising fish. And yea, he hooked one. There is also a tale about a casting contest in Idaho that Jim couldn't pass up. He walked away with top honors. He didn't keep his skills a secret, he was always willing to get involved in our programs teaching casting in the schools. And Jim was ready with advice regarding how to set up your rod. He was also a good source of information regarding where to find a big bonefish in Hawaii.

Jim was also very good to have around a campfire and with an adult beverage and a story to share. Many of us were able to share time with him and Becky. He will be missed.

James (Jim) Donald Darden February 3, 1943 - August 1, 2021



Bellingham, Washington - James (Jim) Donald Darden, 78, of Bellingham, WA, passed away on August 1, 2021 at his home, surrounded by family.

He was born in Cheyenne, Wyoming on February 3, 1943, son of the late Donald and Lucille Darden. Jim graduated from East Senior High School in Rockford, Illinois.

Jim was a determined and hard worker. Not only did he work his way through college, but he also served in the Naval Reserve. He received a Bachelor's and Master's degree in Mechanical Engineering at the University of Idaho. He was a member of Kappa Sigma Fraternity. He began his 25 year career as a mechanical engineer in Eastern WA at Kaiser Aluminum (Spokane, WA) and Hanford Site (Tri-Cities, WA.) Then, Jim moved west to work at Arco-Cherry Point (Fern-dale, WA) and Anvil Corporation (Bellingham, WA).

Every summer during his childhood, the family would travel to their cabin on Twin Lakes in Idaho, with a stopover at Yellowstone National Park. These trips inspired Jim's interest in fishing and the outdoors. Jim loved the challenge of new adventures. His many interests included hunting, scuba diving, sailing, ski instructing and traveling the world. Jim is most remembered as an avid fly fisherman who enjoyed a good campfire with great friends.

He is survived by his spouse, Becky Darden, and eight children: Mike (Becky) Darden, Lisa (Kerry) Hunter, Brian Darden, Laura (Mario) Cabrera, Cindy Gresen, Kristi Kent, Chad (Katie) Bedlington, Tiffany (Adam) Buck, 18 grandchildren, and 6 great-grandchildren. Jim was preceded in death by his brother Gregory Darden, and survived by his sister Maryann Vanwert and brother William (Lisa) Darden.

August Zoom Presentation 7:00 PM

Douglas Thomas, CEO & owner of Bellingham Cold Storage: Proposed salmon hatchery. A Conservation Committee Pick

Douglas Thomas, a second generation executive, CEO, and part owner of Bellingham Cold Storage, the largest portside, full-service public refrigerated warehousing company on the West Coast, will present the proposed development of a salmon hatchery pilot project at a site on Bellingham Bay near the mouth of Whatcom Creek.

The model for this proposal is the Douglas Island Pink & Chum's (DIPAC) Macaulay Salmon hatchery in Juneau, Alaska. DIPAC started operations in 1976 and today is one of the most successful salmon hatchery programs in the world. The Macaulay facility releases well over 138 million juvenile chum,



chinook and Coho salmon, and rainbow trout each year for commercial, sport and subsistence uses. Annual returns range between 2.5-5 million harvestable adult salmon with an estimate value of \$6-20 million. For more about the Macaulay facility: Macaulay Hatchery in Alaska.

His presentation will include aspects of the Alaska hatchery that have made the model so successful, why Whatcom Creek was chosen as the site for the hatchery project, how it relates to fisheries co-management between WDFW and the Puget Sound Treaty Tribes, the impact on native stocks, how it will help the southern resident Killer Whales, the stakeholders, the cost, and what the current proposed legislation (Salmon Repopulation Act, Senate Bill 6509 and House Bill 274 includes.

As a club our mission and purpose is working to protect wild fish and the habitat which sustains them and working for the betterment and preservation of angling and surrounding lands. It is in our best interest to gain knowledge and information to better understand the issues, form educated opinions and work towards our common goals. 


Monthly Un-Zoom Meeting

Casting Challenge

Fly Casting Challenge:

Fly casting is an essential skill in fly fishing. Increased casting knowledge and proficiency improves enjoyment and success. Participating in the Casting Skills Challenge will help you become a better caster and fisher as a result of mastering the Skill Challenge levels.

The Casting Skills Challenge levels (Bronze, Silver, Gold) have been crafted to represent increasingly challenging casting situations commonly encountered when fishing. For example, accuracy casting is integral to fly fishing, so each level has an accuracy challenge. Likewise, there is not always room for a back cast when fishing, so roll casting is included. There are no "trick casts" only casts that can be used frequently when fishing. Levels increase in difficulty from novice or experienced beginner skills (Bronze), to intermediate skills (Silver), to advanced skills (Gold).

If you wish to participate, plan into your day about an hour and a half for the event: warm-up, directions, the skills challenge, coaching on difficult tasks with an opportunity to redo. The challenge itself should take about 30 minutes to complete.



Bamboo Rod Tips

- ♦ Always keep your rod clean and dry.
- Never keep your rod in a tube. It's for protecting it in transit.
- Hang your rod in a bag with the thin ends up.
- Always point a rod straight down the line and pull the line to free a snagged fly.
- Never varnish, oil, or wax a cork handle.
- Keep ferrules clean inside and out. Do not coat them with grease or wax. These attract dust.
- Never twist or wrench a ferrule.
- To disassemble, make sure there is plenty of room around you. Hold the rod pieces a foot or so from the ferrules and pull. For a better grip, pack and use old inner tube pieces.
- *Most rod tips are broken around the truck or campfire.*
- Never leave your rod leaning against anything or store a rod horizontally.
- *Never stand the rod with the ferrules on a hard surface.*
- Never put a hook in the cork. It's best to use the hook keep or hook it in the stripping guide, wrap the leader around the reel handle, and tighten.
- You can clean your cork handle with steam and mild detergent.
- *Never use lines too heavy for your rod.*
- Never play or land a fish with the rod pointing up at an acute angle. To do so places all the strain on the rod tip and fails to bring the rods full action to bear on the fish. The lower the angle the rod is held, the more the lower and stronger sections of the rod will be able to absorb strain and apply pressure to the fish.
- Try to hold a rod with the guides pointing upwards, "Guides to the Sky" when possible, particularly during protracted struggles with big fish. This will greatly reduce the chance of straining the bamboo's power fibers of the upper side of the rod. This technique is not as awkward as it sounds, and does much to promote the longevity of the rod.


