State Representative James Bush III

State Representative James Bush III is a career educator, a Baptist minister, and a Florida state legislator from Brownsville. He has served as a member of the Florida House of Representatives from the 109th District for over fourteen (14) years, from 1992 – 2000, from 2008 – 2010, and from 2018 – 2022. Bush was born in Panama City, Florida on February 13, 1955, and grew up during the Civil Rights era. He was the first Black person born in Panama City to be elected to a State-wide office in the State of Florida. When Martin Luther King Jr. was assassinated in 1968, Bush's father, also a Baptist minister, took him to the funeral in Atlanta, Georgia. The experience inspired Mr. Bush to train in the Kingian philosophy and he completed multiple levels of training under the guidance of Coretta Scott King, ¹ and Dr. Bernard Lafayette.

State Representative Bush moved to Miami, Florida in 1972. He graduated from Miami Northwestern Senior High School in 1974. He was voted by his senior class as the "Best All Around Male" and inducted in the Miami Northwestern Hall of Fame. He received his Bachelor of Science degree from Bethune-Cookman University in 1979, his Master of Science degree in Educational Administration and Supervision from Nova Southeastern University in 1984, and a Doctorate from Smith Chapel Bible College in 2004. In 1982, he began working in the Miami-Dade County Public School system and he continued working there for 32 years. He has lived in Brownsville for many decades. He is an associate minister of the Antioch Missionary Baptist Church in Brownsville.

Bush worked and associated closely with civil rights leaders Reverend Jesse Jackson, Joseph Lowery, Coretta Scott King, Congressman John Lewis, Fred Shuttlesworth, Bernard LaFayette, Dick Gregory, Martin Luther King III, Ray Fauntroy, C. T. Vivian, and Sevell Brown. In the 1980s, Bush served as president of the local Miami-Dade chapter of Operation PUSH (People United to Serve Humanity), Jesse Jackson's national civil rights organization that was created to "improve the economic situation in Black communities across the country." During his service in the Florida legislature, Bush introduced a successful bill to create the Florida Martin Luther King Jr Institute for Nonviolence, with the support of Coretta Scott King. It was the second such organization founded in the United States, after New York City.

Bush has persistently advocated for the Brownsville community throughout his political career. He was an early supporter for restoration of the

Brownsville Residents Rally And Save Park

Area parents and neighborhood children rallied last week to save Brownsville Park, located at 3100 N.W. 50th St.

The park was one of several county parks scheduled to close as a result of the county's financial crisis.

In an effort to protest the closing of the park, James Bush, former State Representative candidate, organized the rally and called on Metro Commissioner Arthur Teele for support. According to Bush, Teele responded immediately. During the Nov. 27 County Commission meeting, Teele, along with other County Commissioners, worked to ensure that the park would remain open.

During the rally, Teele informed the crowd of 50, which included

Historic Hampton House and in his role as a State legislator, he secured over \$212,000 in funds for the restoration of Georgette's Tea Room. He gathered petitions from Brownsville residents to save Jefferson Reaves Sr. Park from closure. He conducted the Brownsville Clean Up Day in 1996, and he conducted volunteer projects to clean up the historic Lincoln Memorial Park Cemetery as well. Bush worked tirelessly to restore the vibrancy of Brownsville's NW 27th Avenue. As a state legislator, he passed in the Florida House of Representatives the Brownsville Commercial Business District designation for NW 27th Avenue, he sponsored the dedication of the street for Congresswoman Carrie P. Meek, and he helped to secure the Brownsville Renaissance Shopping Mall at 2655 NW 54th Street.

Bush has served on the National Board of the Southern Christian Leadership Conference (SCLC)- served as Acting National President and Past Board Recording Secretary; Past President of the Miami Chapter of Operation PUSH; Past First Vice-President of People United to Lead the Struggle for Equality (PULSE) and a past member of the United Teachers of Dade, serving as a Building Steward. He also serves as the first vice-president of Brownsville Civic Neighborhood Association and he has been appointed by the Speaker of the Florida House of Representatives as the Florida State Commissioner on Ethics. He continues to work to support the residents of the Miami Dade County community.⁴
