Do You Want To See What Jesus' Life Produced? 8th Sunday – Sir.27:4-7 & Lk. 6:39-45 with 1Cor.15:54-58 March 2, 2025 By Fr. John Phelps, Priest In Solidu



. The fruit from a tree is simple to understand. It applies to each of us and to our community of hope. What we say reveals what we mean and will do – trust in God or not. The plank causes blindness needs explanation. Together the message is clear. We who believe death is passing into life should be grateful Jesus turns loss into victory.

To receive the insight of the parable, walk with me with your imagination. The saw to cut the tree is long and strong. The energy to cut comes from the younger person standing on the plank above the elder. If a splinter blinds the elder, the younger one must come down from standing above. Stop pushes. Take the splinter out.

We have a book called <u>33 days Day Of Eucharistic Glory</u>. I am going to use these reflections to focus on the fruit of our journey of 7 or more years here at Marygrove. I pray it shows how to remove the splinter from another's eye. I pray we see and walk.

There are six sections to this little work. Each section brings its own awareness. The layout reminds us of the 33 years that Jesus was with us the first time. I encourage you to reflect on the 3 or 4 pages as a way to walk with hope to free all to produce.

The introduction tells what will be the result of the journey – the Eucharist is the answer. Eucharist is the Real Presence of the Resurrected Christ. It happens when we remember Jesus' death turning our death into victory, as Paul witnesses to us today.

To begin the first week, we receive Jesus in Communion under the form or bread and wine as pilgrims on the journey to L.I.F.E. (Love Includes Forgiving Everyone). The second week will lift of 7 saints whose fruitful lives and humility witness to what can be.

The third week centers on how we see ourselves. Do I want to see myself as Jesus sees me? Amazing grace to see myself as Jesus does. Then the fourth week will position within 20 centuries of the Eucharistic journey. The end is its fruit – surrender.

I see this book as God's Providential Sign (GPS) for our journey from Mary's grove to Loyola's mission. Led by Mary who mothered us at our Confirmation we now bring the victory of the Eucharistic Heart of Jesus for others to see who they are.
