



Our Eyes Fixed On Jesus – What A Trust Walk!
Reflection from Fr. John Phelps, C.Ss.R.
February 28, 2021 - 2nd Sunday of Lent
Genesis 22:1-18 & Mark 9:2-10 with Romans 8:31-34

When we are in prayer together, it is hopefully heartwarming and supportive, even when we come preoccupied with a worry or with things we have to do. We share our hopes and dreams, concerns and needs; for the most part I pray we are at peace.

But what happens when we are faced with hard choices that will affect people we love and cherish? What happens when a friend loses his job or a neighbor finds out her son is depressed and starts to wonder if he can make it anymore?

The “mountain top” experiences with God are good to have. Like Abraham we need encouragement – Sarah and he finally had a child! Like the three disciples we want to see everything in total harmony and that we can stay there.

But the message today is very different. In fact, it’s quite the opposite. Rather than everything going well, the message today is we may have to sacrifice what we thought was essential to our future. We have to go down into the valley of suffering.

The married couple that encouraged us to start what has become our life work among youth and young adults once said to me. “We wish we wouldn’t have such positive experiences in our work. The negative down times seem often too much!”

I remember my reflection at the time. It means even more to me now. “How else would Jesus attract us to Him, except by giving us what we like? When we lose feeling high. Then, the question becomes, ‘Do you love Jesus for Jesus or for how you feel.’?”

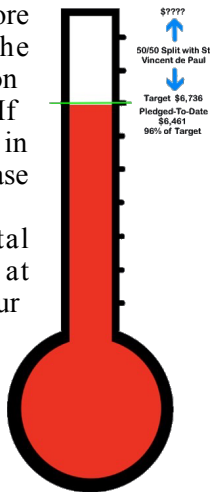
To build on a solid foundation, we want to fix our eyes on Jesus. We put our lives in His Hands. And we say with St. Paul, “If God is for us, who can be against us, His chosen ones?” And when it seems so much is against us. Does it cause us to doubt?

We are all asked the same question in one way or another what Jesus asked Peter “Do you love me more than anyone?” To expand – more than how we feel, more than what we have? If we were to lose and feel like a failure, would we keep our eyes fixed on Jesus? To “do” yes is to know what it means to walk by faith and not by sight!
