



God Is Love – When They Choose, The Journey is Joyful!

Reflection from Fr. John Phelps, C.Ss.R.

May 9, 2021 - 6th Sunday of Easter

Acts 10:25-48 & John 15:8-17 with 1 John 4:7-10

Mothers hold the secret to joy. From conception to birth the ebb and flow of feelings is a lesson that cannot be captured by our imagination. We can get close to it. But it is an experience that can be celebrated more than be understood.

John's letter today is the same. Christians hold the secret to joy. From the conception, we call baptism, to the birth, we call confirmation, from Resurrection to Pentecost – it is an unfolding of what God choosing us to be free brings to life.

Surprises are in store for us when we see life after death as the position we take to enjoy the journey of struggle. Why? Because we know suffering and struggle, despair and death all give birth to L.I.F.E. – Love Includes Forgiving Everyone!

The moment of child-birth hears the first “scream” and people naturally smile and laugh. I think the only person who isn’t happy is the baby crying. Of course, the natural response will be to put the child in the arms of his or her mother. She’s got the touch!

The message Peter stumbled into was the joy of the Holy Spirit is for both Gentile and Jew. Jesus said to His chosen that they would know complete joy. His disciples are chosen to be His friends. The grace of being friends of Jesus bears fruit that will last.

What an awesome God we have! To teach us a lesson as we begin life. To call the moment before birth “birth pains” and to celebrate the moment after as “the breath of life” – sure, fathers can see and hear. But mothers, touch and feel.

It takes a mother’s way of loving to comfort the confused, to understand the doubting, to teach the questioning, to empower the weakened. I call this insight into life God’s way of being C.U.T.E. (Comforting Understanding Teaches Empowerment).

Peter finally got it – all people can be born again! Jesus said they would get it only after He rose from the dead. Yes, God loves us first, comes into our way of living, dies at our hands only to rise and come back to forgive us lovingly. Only then was His Mother ready to be our Mother. Isn’t it not fitting that our Church is called Our Mother?

Novena to the Holy Spirit

The Church will celebrate Mary, Mother of the Church, on May 24, the day after Pentecost when the Holy Spirit descended, giving birth to the Church. In preparation, we are providing a Novena to the Holy Spirit with prayers and petitions to Our Mother of Perpetual Help (one of the many titles the Church uses to honor Mary throughout the world). This nine-day novena, which will begin on May 14 and end on May 22, is meant to help us open ourselves to embrace and use the gifts of the third person of the Holy Trinity to reaffirm our Confirmation commitment as “chosen to be sent.”

Even though we pray this novena as a preparation for the feast of Mary, Mother of the Church, you can also pray a novena to the Holy Spirit any time you want. So, let us pray with great confidence and trust in our God who is all Good and Loving.
