

From the Old to the New Way

30th Sunday – Ex/22:20-26 & Mt.22:34-40 with 1 Th.1:5-10 – October 29, 2023 By Fr. John Phelps, C.Ss.R. – Priest in Solidum

We are to reflect upon the clear message from the "Eye for an eye and tooth for a tooth" teaching to "Love of God and neighbor" by Jesus. This is the heart and soul of the shift from the Old Way (Exodos) to the New Way (Odos).

In Exodus, the focus on the way people treated the foreigner was the way God was going to treat them. If they molested and oppressed the widow and the orphan, the ones who are vulnerable, God will do the same.

In Matthew Jesus starts from the perspective of our relationship to God, unconditional love for God and for neighbor. We are to relate to both with the same attitude of love.

Do we hear the difference? Jesus modelled love that would overcome fear, even the fear of death. Paul, once converted from the Old Law, did the same. He wrote in his first letter to his converts. They tell me how you are following our example. Praise God.


When we look to our way of treating each other, are we following the New Way? We may want to say "yes." But are we? When we hear of violence of any kind, do we want to love both sides? Do we want to manage conflicts to want to live together?

St. Paul honored his followers because they had moved from worshipping idols to centering on Jesus who was raised from the dead. This is a fundamental decision to do so. This is a total mind shift that calls for grace to go beyond human nature's way.

We may see the Israeli-Palestinian conflict with Haman as over there. But what about ourselves. Do we hold anyone at a distance? Do we not want to talk to someone? Do we see others – other cultures, other creeds, and so on – as less than ourselves?

To evangelize calls for us to be evangelized by those to whom we are sent. They have ways of acting they hold to be important. Do we want to understand them, though we may disagree? Do we want to show others how we follow the way of loving others? As we do so, we will be modelling the love of God that we were chosen to share!






