

What You Do Is What You Meant By What You Say

November 5, 2023 – Mal.1:14-2:10 & Mt.23:1-12 with 1 Th.2:7-13 – 31st Sunday By Fr. John Phelps, C.Ss.R.

Being from Missouri – the Show Me State – the message from the Word of God is clear and direct. It points to the fact that people who talk the talk, but don't walk the walk will be seen for who they are eventually.

Usually, I've heard the word "hypocrite" be given to people who say one thing and do another. Both Malachy and Matthew describe such people. Most of us start to think of others. We would see them worthy of being cursed and condemned.

But what about approaching the meaning of "hypocrite" in reverse? What would happen, if we were to look at ourselves as being more than we show ourselves to others to be? What would happen if we were to be proactive and to be involved?

I listen to people tell me they are not able to do this or that? And I watch people not be involved where they could make a difference. They don't think they know enough or have practiced enough. So, they sit back and do nothing. Do you know such people?

I'll give you a simple example. When many people come to pray, they sit in the back and not in the front. Quoting the gospel of Matthew only Pharisees, hypocrites, go to the front. Really? Could it be we use sitting in the back as being humble. Really?

I suggest more people underestimate their gifts and talents. Most people don't believe in themselves as chosen and sent by Jesus. I call them hypocrites in reverse. I point out that they don't believe Jesus Who said we are the lights of the world.

Jesus gave us the eight beatitudes as His message to change the world. Anyone who follows Jesus needs to listen and take the message to heart the fact that we are to be lights in darkness. We are meant to hear the Word and be doers of the Word!

One gift that we have at St. Peter Claver Catholic Community, if we don't do it, it won't be done by someone else. We decide the life and death of our parish based on what we do. What are you doing in administration, formation, ministry, mission, in evangelization – Don't look to yourself as the reason. Look to Jesus and "just do it"!
