



There's A Difference Between Crying for Help And Grumbling 3rd Sunday of Lent - Ex.3:1-15 & Lk.13:1-9 and 1Cor.10:1-12 - March 20, 2022

Moses is going about his business. God has been listening to the "cries of the people" in slavery. The angel brings their pleas to Moses. God wants to free the people. He is choosing Moses to be sent.

Jesus calls people to repent. He tells a story that has meaning. Three years with nothing to show for a person's work. He wants to cut it down. But the gardener begs to have another year. Give him another chance.

What's the message? What does the first reading and the Gospel have in common? First, God calls for change. Second, we can't keep doing business as usual when so many are suffering. Third, God uses Moses and the gardener.

Today a lot of people are suffering due to the pandemic, due to natural disasters, due to violence. Christ wants to respond to the cries of the people. We can't just keep doing what we used to do. Christ wants to send His chosen to set others free.

Paul makes his point. We are not to be like the followers of Moses, who took God for granted. We are not to be grumbling, complaining about the way things are and keep on doing what we have been doing. We need to be sent believing we are needed to act.

To pray for God to answer our needs is good. We know we are encouraged to ask and we shall receive. But we do know we are called to do our part to be part of the solution. Moses to the Jews, the gardener to the crops, now it's our turn to get involved.

Did we hear what Paul said? We can't take what we have for granted. We can't keep on with business as usual. Too many people think life is about them. They have a right to what they want while others are suffering and losing hope.

Those of us who know Christ, who have been baptized and confirmed, who are given the Risen Christ as our food and drink, Jesus expects us to produce for others. He expects us to respond with hope when we hear discouragement. He expects us to share our faith when others doubt. He expects us to love when others fear. Will we?
