The Unfolding Of The Truth – God Knows What He's Doing Reflection from Fr. John Phelps, C.Ss.R. May 23, 2021 - Pentecost

Acts 2:1-11 & John 15:26-27; 16:12-15 with 1 Corinthians 12:3-13

Happy Anniversary of the birthday of the Chosen. The first disciples were chosen from their fellow men and women. Jesus gave them a three-year formation process. He entrusted His Way to the Truth to us.

We are followers of the Apostles who were sent to share the life entrusted to them in the Breaking of the Bread and in the Blessing Cup. We are chosen, each of us, to respond, with our sponsors, having received the seven-fold gift of Confirmation.

The message we are sent to bring into our everyday life is what Jesus did, when He redeemed us. Jesus gave us a way to understand our human condition that is absolutely revolutionary - the most positive meaning of the word – Revolution.

The power of Pentecost is found in tongues of fire that speak in all the languages and cultures of the people. Christians are among all 5,000 languages, all cultures and ethnic communities. And all have One Message – One Body – One Proclamation.

To speak of the revolution needs to see how it is done peacefully. We need to do what we say before we speak. Jesus lived 30 years before He spoke. God loved the world and gave His Son to love us. He healed then spoke and forgave as He spoke.

Some of what He said is written down. We know His Words as we listen and share the Gospels. He fulfilled the revealed truth given to the Jews to write – the Old Testament preparing us to understand what Jesus did and said.

Paul's letter today, like all the Apostles' letters and works, are written for the chosen as they are entrusted to bring the Word to Life among each relationship. We are chosen to bring alive the message. We are given the seven-fold gift of Confirmation, nourished by the Bread of Life and the Cup of Blessing, to do the message!

But we want to do what we say. We want to have the grace of the Resurrection to be faithful to the Revolution of Hope that our Faith makes possible. What we do can be believed by others. They see we mean it – to heal, to forgive, to love! Let's Rejoice!

Temporary Relocation

Beginning on May 31 and running through June 30, the Marygrove Conservancy, which manages the Marygrove campus, will be upgrading the fire suppression system and performing other maintenance activities here in the church. Accordingly, for all liturgical functions during June, we will utilize a temporary space in the Madame Cadillac Building, which is the building to your left as you exit this building.

COVID-19 Protocols

This week, based on revised COVID protocol recommendations from both the Centers for Disease Control and the Michigan Governor's Office, the Archbishop of Detroit issued a letter to the faithful which approved the relaxation of certain liturgical protocols by parishes, including

- Fully vaccinated individuals no longer are required to wear face masks in church or to maintain social distancing.
- Anyone who is not fully vaccinated must continue to wear a face mask and maintain social distancing in church.
- The sign of peace can resume in a manner that respects each person's decision as to how widely to share the sign of peace.

The AOD continues to recognize that each parish and each individual has unique issues and concerns, and every attempt should be made to respect these. However, we do want to stress that concern is for both the individual and for the common good. The parish is not responsible to verify that someone has been vaccinated. Accordingly, if you have not been fully vaccinated, please follow the protocols regardless of how you feel about them - and please make every effort to get vaccinated.



As Cardinal Elio Sgreccia, former President of the Vatican's Pontifical Academy for Life has said, "The Church must speak out in today's context on fundamental rights, the right to justice, the right to peace, but above all and in the first place, the right to life. If the Church did not speak, did not proclaim the truth, it would be abandoning its duty; it would be unfaithful to society, to the good of society. Therefore, its precise duty is the very liberty to intervene with word, and also with example -- the example of promoting human life, of intervening for the salvation of mankind."
