Does Jesus Have to Prove Himself to Us? Reflection from Fr. John Phelps, C.Ss.R. August 1, 2021 - 18th Sunday in Ordinary Time Exodus 16:2-15 & John 6:24-35 with Ephesians 4:17-24

3,300 years ago according to the author of Exodus the people were complaining. 2,100 years ago the people were demanding a sign from Jesus after He fed the 5,000 men with their families. It's no different today. And I wonder why we complain?

Paul tells us to knock it off, as I read what he said. If we learned Christ, the resurrected Redeemer, and if we "put away the old self... former way of life," let's have the spirit to "put on the new self." Where are you? It's the question I'm asking myself.

Today is the 58th Anniversary of my becoming a Redemptorist. In a hot summer day in southern Missouri, I prostrated myself in our Community Chapel with 23 other men and vowed for life – poverty, chastity and obedience. I am one of two alive.

I joined a way of life to live totally dependent upon my community. We share all we have in common. This means we don't pay taxes. We share our lives together in a capitalistic system where most people are motivated by money. It has its challenges.

When it comes to chastity, our unconditional love relationship centers on Jesus, our Redeemer. This is not a way of life for people who don't relate to women. It means I am to channel my love in such a way that no one person excludes others.

Obedience is the most difficult of the three as it calls me to let go of doing what I want and let the community's way of listening to Jesus direct all of us according to what constitutes our way of life. My being your Pastor is the decision of my leadership.

In 1966, after living these three vows, there were 12 of us taking a fourth vow – the vow and oath of Perseverance. Put simply, we were to pray to be open to being sent to hopeless situations where the Church has no idea what to do, nor do we. Just go!

This last of the four vows has been my vision – into public schools, working with young adults from the ages of 13 to 35 who don't go, in fact, won't go to Jesus as their Number One. The training we received centered on our self-esteem. What I heard was, at the end of the day, if you are not esteemed by anyone, deal with it and be faithful.
