Veni Sante Spiritus – Tongues of Fire – I Send You! Reflection from Fr. John Phelps, C.Ss.R. May 31, 2020 - Pentecost Sunday Acts 2:1-11 & John 20:19-23 with 1 Corinthians 12:3-13

We're different. We're not the same. This is what follows if we have spent two and a half months reflecting on the past with a view to discerning what tomorrow will mean for us? Are we feeling the Holy Spirit as Jesus breathes, as fiery tongues come?

It is happening to the extent we are confused. The old questions received their answers before Jesus. Jesus revealed new answers to the old questions. The Holy Spirit speaks with zeal and enthusiasm coming as tongues of fire to send the chosen.

We are celebrating our Birthday as the Body of Christ, the Catholic Church. It was conceived with the Resurrection and now born on Pentecost. The old answers – that Jesus would save us and heaven would be open to all – worked before. Not now.

That's done. That answer made it possible for us to be ready to hear the new answer to the old questions. Who is God? What does it mean to be Catholic? What's the purpose of Life? Why is there so much suffering and death? Get the drift?

Before Pentecost, before Confirmation, we were looking to the Messiah to come with the answers. Once we had the answers, we would set up Churches and schools, rectories and convents. People would join our Church and be saved.

Pentecost is a "game changer". Mary birthed the Son of God in the flesh that she was asked to name – Jesus. He would kill no one and forgive all except those who will not forgive. Now Mary births the Sons and Daughters of Christ to do what Jesus did.

We now are the answer to the age-old questions. Who is God? We are His ambassadors. What does it mean to be Catholic? We are chosen to be sent. What's the purpose of Life? We have seven-fold gifts to heal the wounds of the seven sins. Why is there suffering and death? We are wounded healers to renew the face of the earth.

Everything we think and say and do because we are following Christ we are now to share. We are given "tongues of fire" to speak with zeal. Renew the earth. Gather to go. See the needs out there! Respond and be free. God almighty, let all be free at last!

Pentecost Sunday is the birthday of the Church, so it is appropriate that today we resume public celebration of the Eucharist here at Marygrove. In approving the resumption of public Masses, Archbishop Vigneron stressed the importance of safety for all the faithful. We thank the Archdiocese for providing guidelines to assist us as we celebrate together, and we thank the wonderful staff here at Marygrove for going above and beyond to ensure a safe environment. The church, restrooms, and all other surfaces likely to be touched have been sanitized, and will be again following Mass. Hand sanitizer is available in the front and rear of the church, although we continue to encourage you to bring your own. The blue tape is in place to assist in maintaining safe social distancing. You must wear your mask at all times, except when receiving communion; Father will provide instructions for the safe reception of the Eucharist. There will be no coffee and donuts after Mass. The lounge is closed. When leaving, please exit directly to your cars. We ask for your patience as we attempt to ensure the safety and health of all who join us at Eucharist.

We understand that, due to health risks, not everyone is able to attend Mass right away. Accordingly, we are providing this Mass live via Zoom. A link is available on our website, **spcccdetroit.org**. Note that the Zoom experience will also be different, as we will not be able to have the interaction as in past weeks, but we are still glad that you are with us!
