We Need The Doctor Before We Bring On The Judge Reflection from Fr. John Phelps, C.Ss.R. September 6, 2020 - 23rd Sunday in Ordinary Time Ezekiel 33:7-9 & Matthew 18:15-20 with Romans 13:8-10

Sometimes the Word of Life is so intimate that it is a comfort in times of troubles. As I listen to Paul, "Owe nothing to anyone, except to love one another," I am coming to understand what it means to take people where they're at before I say anything else.

With all the public outcry over Black Lives Matter, over politicians on one side or the other, over jobs, housing and schools, we can get distracted from those who love us and whom we love the most. The Message today in the Word is up close and personal.

Love between two people who conceive and birth a child – this is very personal. As we deal with all the other relationships that will unfold, there is so much we can learn from such a moment. I invite us to slow up and enjoy God's Way to reveal Life.

There is always meant to be three in every partnership. It's the way God is. Father-Son-Spirit is the synergy creating. When this energy engages two people the importance of discipline to be mutual is the ideal.

All of us are born of two people who are growing into such an ideal. So let's be real. To judge is important but it's mutual. Between wife and husband and among members of the same family, it's the way to move from good to great.

Ezekiel says it's the way we express our love for those we claim to love. Matthew builds on the teaching by sharing the mature way to love. Begin one-on-one. Bring a friend, if it's hard to express or difficult to hear. Only then bring the issue to the Church.

This is the way lovers who believe and trust each other grow. It comes second nature to those who are sincere. As Paul wrote, "Love does not evil to the neighbor; love is the fulfillment of the law."

To get to the point of fulfillment I suggest we begin with healing at its heart. Let's begin "where two or more gather in my name" says Jesus who will go on to share to forgive seven times seventy. Healing is forgiving that has no beginning or ending. This is the way Jesus taught the meaning of a faith-community. What a gift we are together.
